

It's Southern comfort food with a seaside twist!

Get Saucy

Irie's Island Food is known for their unique take on sauce. Whatever flavor you're craving, Irie's has a sauce-or several-to match. Avocado lime sauce is zesty and refreshing, while fire dragon sauce heats things up. A shrimp plate from Irie's, flanked by sides and a smattering of sauces, will add some zing to your seafood selection!

For a relaxed atmosphere with world-class food, reserve a mealtime for Lisabella's at Cinnamon Shore. This seafood entrée, like all the seafood dishes the restaurant has to offer, is delectable. The Sea Bass is encrusted in macadamia nuts and drizzled with a saffron and vanilla-infused sauce. It's more than a dinner-it's a delight.

A Seafood Fusion

Seafood enchiladas: proof that seafood can be creative. This fusion of a traditional Mexican dish with crabmeat, shrimp, crawfish, or all three comes together exquisitely at La Playa Mexican Grille. Next time you're craving the coast, why not bring it to you? This quick, easy poke bowl recipe from Castaways Seafood & Gxill is the perfect tantalizing taste of Port A and will have you putting Castaways at the top of your dining list for when you finally make it back to the beach!

Castaways' Poke Bowl

Serves 1

Prep Time/Cook Time: 20 minutes 8 oz. sushi-grade yellowfin tuna 2 oz. sambal chili 2 oz. rice vinegar 2 oz. soy sauce 4 oz. jasmine white rice ³/₄ cup arugula 2 tbsp. candied walnuts 2 oz. fresh cored pineapple 1/4 sliced avocado Spicy mayo to taste Tuxedo sesame seeds to taste

Directions:

Marinate the yellowfin tuna. Cube the tuna into bite-sized pieces. Add diced tuna to a medium bowl with soy sauce, rice vinegar, and sambal chili. Gently toss to combine and set aside to marinate while you prep the rest of the ingredients.

Cook the rice. Cook white jasmine rice using your preferred method. You can also do this step ahead of time.

Assemble the bowls. Add cooked rice into a large bowl. Spoon the marinated tuna over the rice. Arrange the arugula, walnuts, pineapple, and avocado around it. Drizzle with spicy mayo and finish with a sprinkle of tuxedo sesame seeds. Enjoy!

BONUS TIP

Mix up a piña colada to go with your poke bowl. Use the pineapple shell from the recipe as your glass for an extra tropical flair!

There's nothing better to top off a day at the beach than a fresh, ice-cold margarita. While you may know March for the college basketball tournament March Madness, this island knows it for Margarita Madness! There can only be one "Best Margarita in Port Aransas," and every March, this town dedicates itself to finding it.

Margarita Madness is a bracket-style tournament that pits local bars and restaurants against each other in a salty, spicy, and sometimes sweet competition. Do you prefer frozen or on the rocks? Spicy or fruity? Tequila or mezcal? This is your opportunity to share your opinions with the world! Tasters vote for their favorites online as the rounds progress down from the "Salty Sixteen" to the "Top Two."

It wouldn't be right to talk about Margarita Madness without talking about the contestants. The 2021 competition was tough, and over 200,000 votes were cast. Key lime pie frozens battled pineapple jalapeño refreshers, while fresca watermelons had it out with hibiscus-infused creations. Only one contestant rose through them all to the top. Hailing from MacDaddy's Family Kitchen, the winner of the 2021 Margarita Madness competition was the Hot & Prickly, a Tex-Mex style sweet and spicy margarita served on the rocks.

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In the summer of 1982, Dave Maroney was invited to the parking lot of lohn Trice's "Island Surf 'n Sunwear" shop to play the guitar before an outdoor showing of a surf movie. Trice, a buddy of Maroney's, knew he played, and more importantly, knew Ray Summy, who also played guitar and was invited to the parking lot that night. The name wasn't new to Dave; the pair had gone to junior high together. The band formed quickly after that night—Ray was already connected with talented drummer Bill Purcell, Dave's brother Mike Maroney hopped on the bass, and that was the beginning of Aloha Dave & the Tourists.

Port Aransas has always held a special place in the hearts of the band members. "Port Aransas is a gem of friendliness and good vibes. You can feel it when you pull into town," Dave says. The entire group has been coming to the island their entire lives, both for surfing and to perform. There's plenty they love about playing here, but Dave tries to put it into words. "It's the atmosphere, that salt sea air, it's knowing when you pull into town that people are going to be smiling and friendly." Those smiling, friendly locals have invited the band into their lives. The group has played at school dances, then at those students' graduation parties, then a few years later at their weddings. Aloha Dave & the Tourists have been there to ring in good times and milestones, and even now have regulars who show up to every single show and dance like they always have.

From the way the band interacts onstage, and the way Dave speaks about them, it's clear these guys have been close for a long time. "I can't put it into words what it's been like all these years being onstage with them," Dave says of his bandmates. There has never been a band argument or artistic difference. They don't even have a setlist. Each member is free to innovate as they go, with full confidence his bandmembers will be there to back him up.

This year, in 2022, the band celebrates their 40-year anniversary-same four band members, same laidback vibes, same love of the beach.

THE ULUES I AND FRIENDLIEST **THE OLDEST**



An island like this one doesn't come without its salt. It's in the water, in the air, and, perhaps most notably, in the characters who populate it.

There's perhaps no better example of the "salt of Port A" than Shorty's Place. This low-slung, unassuming building has been the landmark bar and live music venue of salty Port Aransas locals and visitors since 1946. Take one look around Shorty's Place, or have one conversation with a faithful bartender, and you'll feel it. Every inch of the place has a story to tell.

Floor to ceiling, **Shorty's** is laden with the hallmarks of tradition. Baseball caps hang in droves, the calling cards of visitors past who have tacked up their legacies to the ceiling. Over the bar are a rainbow of koozies waiting for their regulars to pick them out. Pink pig décor fills one wall-the original owner was a fan and a "pig party" is thrown each year in memoriam.

Wander onto the patio of Shorty's **Place** and you'll find out why it's a favorite of music-lovers and musicians alike. The atmosphere is homegrown and relaxed, beloved. This is the type of place where husbands have met wives and celebrated anniversaries, where 21st birthdays have been celebrated followed by 50th birthdays 29 years later. You name it, Shorty's has seen it.

Why is there so much music in Port Aransas? This town fosters a supportive community that entices musicians to come play, and stay, in Port A.

comes during Port A Live Music Fest, an annual weekend-long festival. It's a weekend stacked with entertainment, one where you can let loose and simply enjoy the talent. The festival isn't solely about the music, though—it takes place all over town and showcases the spunky venues that make Port A such an enjoyable place for artists to play.

At the kickoff of the 2021 Port A Live Music Fest, Port Aransas had an exciting announcement to make: the city officially earned the designation of "Music Friendly Community" from the Texas Music Office. Port Aransas passed rigorous requirements to earn the title, which according to the Texas Music Office, means "certified communities are serious about attracting and developing music industry growth." This community of artists will continue to thrive and grow, visitors will continue to relish in the live music performances, and all will know why Port A is the place where musicians come to play.



High Stakes Tight Lines

Port Aransas is called the "Fishing Capital of Texas" for good reason. Here, you never have to go far to wet your line. Cast off from Horace Calwell Pier, from the jetty, or go all in and book a fishing charter.

Charter trips can have you exploring the bay or heading offshore for days at a time. Hire a guide to indulge your competitive side and fish a tournament. **To see all the fishing options in Port Aransas, scan the code below!**



TITUSIDE SERVICE SERVI

In this town, sportfishing is big business, and fishing tournaments are the holy grail. They're competitive, they're impressive, and they embody sports luxury. Here is a glimpse inside the high-stakes world of Port Aransas fishing tournaments.

You can find anglers preparing for tournaments all over the city, including **Fisherman's Wharf**, **Deep Sea Headquarters, Island Moorings, Dolphin Dock, Virginia's on the Bay**, and the city marina. Lines of offshore fishing boats form a gleaming, imposing front on the wharf. Performance shirts with boat photos and names in script fonts denote which anglers fish for which team.

Registration dinners preceding the tournament are crab boils or catered dinner courses, a hearty start to what is often multiple days a hundred miles offshore. Boat owners place money in pots, betting on their teams to win. Keepers are measured and video catch-and-releases reviewed when the boats return, and the anglers celebrate in legendary style, with cheers, drinks, and live music.

DEEP SEA ROUNDUP

The island hosts over 20 fishing tournaments every summer, and Deep Sea Roundup is the grandaddy of them all. This tournament is among the world's oldest saltwater tournaments, boasting a storied tradition dating back over 80 years. It's the most classic fishing tournament out there, and over the years has seen traditions form– generations of families return year after year to fish Deep Sea Roundup. All year long, kids look forward to the piggy perch competition at Roundup that has inspired countless new generations of anglers.

TEXAS LEGENDS Billfish tournament

With a name like that, it's no wonder the Texas Legends tournament is one of three legs that make up the Texas Triple Crown Billfish Series. This premier billfish tournament is dedicated to "all Texas fishermen, past and present, who have made a difference in Big Game Fishing." Over radio, the group is united in prayer to remember that dedication during the Blessing of the Fleet, a centuries old fishing tradition that has made its way to Port A. With over half a million dollars in prize money at stake, the blessing is more than appreciated. When the prayer concludes, the gathered crowd onshore cheers as a cannon is fired and the boats head on their way.

TEXAS WOMEN Anglers Tournament

A departure from the more formal tradition of Deep Sea Roundup and Texas Legends, the Texas Women Anglers Tournament is most wellknown for its weigh-in tradition of elaborate themed costumes and boat décor. At this tournament, only women are allowed to reel in the fish, and participants spend months making a game plan both to fill the box and to win the contest for "best decorated." Boats come in hot decorated from bow to stern with anglers donning intricate costumes and carrying props. At the weigh in, balloons abound and beach balls fly between the competing boats and the huge group watching the show. At Texas Women Anglers Tournament, the more over-the-top, the better.

BILLFISH PACHANGA

The party atmosphere at the Billfish Pachanga tournament is palpable. A stage, white vendor tents, and tables transform the parking lot of Virginia's on the Bay; the whole area is reserved for the event and decked out with sombrero-shaped balloons and entire balloon arches. The registration gift is often along the lines of a Yeti bucket stocked with Costa hats and fishing gear, and the raffles are the stuff of fishermen's dreams. Spectators line the ship channel in droves to watch the boats streak out at the boom of the shotgun start. The boats won't return for two days, but a celebration awaits them complete with an open bar, private concert, and awards for winning catches.












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WHAT YOU **NEED TO KNOW ABOUT FISHING IN PORT ARANSAS**

Perhaps you're not ready to commit to a tournament, or you'd just prefer your fishing with lower stakes. Port Aransas is the "Fishing Capital of Texas" for a reason, and tournaments are not your only option. Here's all the need-to-know information to prep you for fishing the Gulf and bays of Port Aransas.

Traditions & Superstitions

Anglers are known to be one of the most superstitious groups out there. You'll feel better about entering that world if you don't immediately make a faux pas that costs you, or the whole group, a great catch. Here are some of the most common superstitions:

- Place a pineapple in the fighting chair at the start of an offshore trip. This spunky yellow fruit is known to keep the sun shining and get the fish biting.
- Red skies at morning, sailors take warning. It's one of the first things they teach you at captain's school. If that sky is red, go back to bed!
- Put money in the reel. Talk about putting your money where your mouth is, some anglers wrap big bills in the spool. If the fish takes enough line, the money is lost, but you've hooked a catch! Not too keen on spending that kind of cash? Kiss a quarter and toss it in before you cast.
- Pour one out for the fish! Toss a shot of your favorite vodka or an offering from your midmorning snack into the water and let the good luck ensue.
- Above all else, no bananas on board. Don't bring an actual banana, don't bring banana bread, don't eat one for breakfast-unless, of course, you wish terrible luck on the entire boat.



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KIMBERLY ZAHN ON FAMILY, FISHING, AND THE HALL OF FAME WINTON

Tournament fishing isn't all trophy fish and oversized checks. For some anglers, like Kimberly Zahn Winton, fishing is in their blood, and competition is the natural extension of a heritage extending back generations.

Her parents and grandparents were longtime Port Aransas fishermen, and Kim fished her first tournament when she was just two years old—Deep Sea Roundup's Piggy Perch Contest. Kim would go on to win that contest several times, and by the time she aged out she was already spending much of her time volunteering, not just for Deep Sea Roundup, but at many of the tournaments hosted in Port A.

Even now, Kim doesn't go without the family and mentors who kicked off her love of the sport. This past year, Kim fished several tournaments, including the Ladies' Powder Puff Tournament out of Woody's Sports Center, with her



mother, daughter, best friend, and son's girlfriend. Fishing and family are inextricably linked. Beyond her own family, Kim has watched the fishing community develop over the years. She tells a story of three buddies who fished together in their youth, all now captains and with quite the friendly rivalry. "The fishing is what everybody loves," Kim explains, "the tournaments are just a bonus."

Kim is particularly fond of Deep Sea Roundup, which she helps plan through the Port Aransas Boatmen's Association. Of the 85-year-running tournament, Kim says, "It's about tradition for us. Most people come back, and they fish with their families, and it's generations. We've had five generations of family fishing it." Kim has watched as families return to Port A every year with grandkids, then great grandkids.

Kim saw her longstanding dedication to the sport come to fruition when she was inducted into the Port Aransas Boatmen's Association Hall of Fame in 2021. When asked about what the title meant to her, Kim said, "It's an honor because of the past Hall of Famers. A lot of them are great mentors." Kim is among the ranks of PABA anglers as equally passionate about giving back as they are about fishing.

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





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Nothing compares to waking up in a gorgeous beach house, sun streaming in through high windows and the beach waiting outside.

That feeling of invigoration forms traditions; it's what draws people back to Port Aransas time and time again. To encapsulate that feeling, to bottle up the coast and take it back home, is next to impossible. If anyone has a shot at it though, it's the talented interior decorators that live in Port Aransas.

Susan Castor, founder of Susan Castor Collection, explains her passion for coastal decorating, "People are here for family, friends, and fun or peace and solace."

Here are some tips from local designers to jumpstart you on your journey to create your very own coastal corner.







Visualize Your Space

How much space do you have to dedicate to your oasis? Maybe it's a master bedroom or master bathroom, where you can channel the rest and relaxation of the beach. Perhaps it's a sunroom, where you can stand in the sun and envision a deck overlooking the water. It could be as small as a hallway, but carefully considering the function of your space will impact how you can implement coastal décor. A rope mirror might work well in a bathroom, but not an outdoor space. A shell chandelier would function gorgeously in a dining room or even a hallway but would quickly overwhelm a bedroom.

Colors & Textures

Designing a beach-inspired space begins with the color palette. Stick with colors found in the natural surroundings of Port Aransas—a wide range of blues, some greens, neutral sand colors, and a healthy dose of white. The color blue has a calming effect that will mimic the tranquility felt by the sea, and shades of it can be used on anything from cabinets to textiles. If a space utilizes fixtures, consider using brass rather than nickel to warm up the interior and harken to mariner days of yore.

Another building block of a coastal space is texture. Sandy stretches, nautical instruments, and dune grasses all signal that you're on the coast, and those textures can be replicated in an interior space. Incorporate grasscloth wallpaper for a muted, but interesting wall texture. Add furniture made locally of rattan, or carved wood that's remininiscent of driftwood. Smaller décor moments that feature wrapped rope, an accent of seashells, or mother-of-pearl add texture that draws the eye without overwhelming the senses.

Collect seashells on the shores of Port Aransas and display them in a glass bowl-it's aesthetically pleasing and a talking point for entertaining. Procure work from a local artist as the hallmark piece of your room, or book a family photo session with a local photographer and display the results on a driftwood shelf. Details like these individualize a room and take a space from "coastal corner" to your coastal corner.

What really completes a room, though? Herb Lancaster of **H**. Lancaster Co. says, "The people! The space would go untouched and just look lifeless without them. Truly, people are the final touch to any space."

TRADITION TODAY


A step into Farley Boat Works is a step back in time. The unassuming metal building houses history going back to 1915, as much a part of the Port A landscape as the dunes or the palm trees. A trip to Port Aransas that aims to get the full picture of the town, to learn how to love and protect Port A for all that it is, would be incomplete without a visit to Farley Boat Works.

Over the years, the renowned **Farley Boat Works** produced boats—all wooden—specifically for tarpon fishing, skiffs for sailing, watercraft built for speed, and more. Now? Reopened in 2011, the shop is open to you as a living exhibit. Carve out some time to sit and observe as a boatbuilding artisan swipes a pungent, polishsoaked rag over the wooden surface of his skiff until it shines. Watch the careful precision that goes in to chiseling markings to denote the next step of crafting a 60-foot scow schooner. You can even take part by snagging a spot in one of the highly coveted boatbuilding classes, taught by seasoned **Farley Boat** makers. Sitting among the sights and smells will transport you to a simpler time when handmade was just how things were made. When you've spent enough time in the workshop, wander around Port Aransas to see the impact of the shop on a community proudly peppered with uniquely painted **Farley Boat** planters.

Farley Boat Works is such a unique part of Port A's history that a festival has formed around it, called the Wooden Boat Festival. The weekendlong festival celebrates these mariner makers with displays of historic Farley Boats, a boat barn dance, and the signature event, the family boat build. It's about the boats, but more than that, it's about heritage. It's about being Port A proud. See history in action. Visit **Farley Boat Works**.

SALTY STORIES

Over a hundred years ago, the first Farley Boat launched in Port Aransas waters. Over the years, Farley Boats would become synonymous with Port A sportfishing. 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Crafting your Conser-Vacation For the Love of the Coast

Anyone who spends any amount of time in Port Aransas knows that this is a special spot, one that elicits a sense of ownership from those who walk these shores and fosters a desire to protect.

That feeling might be sparked by your first sight of the Whooping Crane family that takes up their winter residence here. It might be that you witness the jubilant release of a rehabilitated turtle from the Amos Rehabilitation Keep. It could be as simple as the wide yawn of Boots the American Alligator as he suns himself in the Port Aransas Nature Preserve.

Whatever the moment is for you, this is where ecotourism comes passionately roaring to life. Here are some of the reasons why:

▼ Nautical Nature

Port Aransas is the place where blue waters extend farther than the eye can see and the sun reflects off the waves. There's a breeze that lifts the palm tree fronds and brings peace to the soul, but there's also far more nature in Port Aransas than first meets the eye. Just off the water there's a rich wetland ecosystem waiting to be discovered. The Port Aransas Nature **Preserve** has four sites, each with hidden natural gems begging to be explored. Hop aboard the Jetty Boat out of Fisherman's Wharf to make your way to San José Island, an undisturbed and unpopulated island just off the Port Aransas coast, for beachcombing and untamed nature.



▲ Beach Birds

Birders flock to Port Aransas every winter to check off their birding bucket lists. Port A rests in the Central Flyway, which makes it the habitat for hundreds upon hundreds of migrating birds. Spot a pink Roseate Spoonbill and immediately know you're in Port A. Spy a trio of Whooping Cranes and know you're seeing one of the only naturally occurring Whooping Crane families in the world. Once in a lifetime sightings are waiting just off every boardwalk and perched on every branch. Six sites along the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail make Port Aransas paradise, and these winged species the birds of paradise.

▼ Wild for Wildlife

Port Aransas is crawling, swimming, and everything in between with distinctive wildlife. It's not uncommon, while enjoying the outdoors in Roberts Point Park or taking a boat cruise in the bay, to see a pod of dolphins breach and dance in the wake of a large watercraft. Green, Loggerhead, and endangered Kemp's Ridley Sea Turtles all call the area home, and rehabilitating sea turtles can be seen on a tour of the Amos Rehabilitation Keep, or ARK. Kayak paddling trails and catch the glint of a darting fish or the stare of a motionless hunting bird. It will be all but impossible not to fall in love with these majestic nonhuman residents.



▲ Harbored Heritage

The love that inspires a desire to protect doesn't stem solely from the natural. Historical sites tell the story of Port Aransas; they deepen understanding and appreciation. The Chapel on the Dunes is the oldest consecrated church on Mustang Island. Farley Boat Works tells the story of a family dating back 100 years. The Lydia Ann Lighthouse still shines as a beacon to weary travelers. These are the spots that have helped anchor Port Aransas as the destination it is today.

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ECOTOURISM CHECKLIST



There is extraordinary beauty in the wildlife and stunning natural scenery of Port Aransas, but also in the people who dedicate themselves to being dutiful stewards of that environment. Curate your conser-vacation in Port Aransas with these 25 ecotourism must-dos. How many can you check off?

- □ Explore the Nature Preserve at Charlie's Pasture.
- □ Look out over the tidal flats at Wetland Park. Keep an eye out for the wading and shorebirds that call the wetlands home.
- □ Take in the sights and sounds of the two-acre freshwater pond at Joan and Scott Holt Paradise Pond.
- □ Walk the 700-foot-long boardwalk at the Leonabelle Turnbull Birding Center and enjoy the view from the observation deck.
- □ Spot a Roseate Spoonbill, the flamingo doppelgänger and official bird of Port Aransas.
- □ Fill a yellow mesh litter bag.
- □ Attend a sea turtle release hosted by the Amos Rehabilitation Keep. Try not to die of too much cuteness.
- □ Snap a photo of Boots, the American Alligator who resides in the Port Aransas Nature Preserve.
- □ During migratory season, check five birds off the "Wings of Winter" birding guide.
- □ Take the Jetty Boat over to discover the natural San José Island and spend the day sunning, swimming, and beachcombing.
- □ Go on a guided tour of the Wetlands Education Center at the University of Texas Marine Science Institute.
- □ Tour the Amos Rehabilitation Keep to see rehabilitating sea turtles, sea birds, and raptors.
- □ Experience the protected expansive beaches of Mustang Island State Park.

- □ While you're at Mustang Island State Park, paddle through some of the 20 plus miles that make up the "Mustang Island Paddling Trail."
- □ Attend birding events, photography workshops, and expert seminars at the Whooping Crane Festival.
- □ Team up with Keep Port Aransas Beautiful and the Texas General Land Office for an Adopt-a-Beach cleanup.
- □ Pick up chic, reusable drinkware at a local boutique.
- □ Hike with Parks & Recreation on a gorgeous two-hour Nature Walk.
- □ Book a dolphin-watching cruise aboard the Scarlet Lady.
- □ Celebrate Gulf Coast vegetation at the native plant sale and plant swap hosted by Keep Port Aransas Beautiful.
- □ Center yourself with a yoga class at the Port Aransas Nature Preserve on Tuesday mornings.
- □ Go beachcombing and share your unique findings.
- □ San José Island is a hidden gem of the Texas coast. Suit up for a Keep Port Aransas Beautiful island cleanup along the stretches of this private, uninhabited land.
- □ Hunt for the many decorated Farley Boat planters! These uniquely-painted planters dot the town and combine the history of Farley Boat Works with the beauty of native plants.
- □ Kayak the very first Texas Paddling Trail, Lighthouse Lakes Paddling Trail, and catch a glimpse of the privately-owned Lydia Ann Lighthouse.

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
