Bicycling Safety Tips

Be Alert and Stay Safe with These Safety Tips

- · Wear a helmet and bright-colored clothing.
- Ride on the right side of the road.
- Ride single-file and predictably.
- Watch for cars at intersections and driveways.
- Riding after dark is not recommended, but wear reflective clothing and use a white headlight and rear flashing red light if you do.
- Never use earphones because you won't be able to hear traffic.
- Select routes according to cyclist skill and age.
- Follow the rules of the road and cycling etiquette.
- Keep your bicycle properly maintained.
- · Use hand signals before stopping or turning.

BICYCLING TRAILS

American Discovery Trail

Part of the national trail system, the region-wide route links a number of trails including the Pennsy Greenway and Veterans Memorial Trail in Lake County. The route becomes primarily rural east of Crown Point, through Hebron, Kouts, and LaCrosse.

Bluhm County Park

This 96-acre park features a 1.5-mile multiple-use trail, as well as six miles of challenging mountain biking trails. The park offers picnicking, shelter rentals, playground equipment, volleyball nets, cornhole (bring your own bags), and a no-leash dog exercise area. C&O Greenway

C&O Greenway is a paved 1.9-mile trail following the abandoned Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad corridor. The trail starts at Innsbrook Country Club and passes through residential areas in Merrillville. SR 55 (Taft St.) to Mississippi in Merrillville

Calumet Bike Trail

This 9.2-mile crushed gravel trail skirts the southern boundaries of Indiana Dunes National Park and Indiana Dunes State Park from Cowles Bog to Mount Baldy. The route parallels the South Shore Rail Line.

At 17-miles in length, the Erie-Lackawanna Trail represents the longest contiguous off-road trail facility in Northwest Indiana. Imagination Glen Park

Iron Horse Heritage Trail

The five-mile Iron Horse Heritage Trail runs east-west through the City of Portage, from Imagination Glen Park east (where the Iron Horse connects with the Prairie Duneland Trail) west to Hamstrom Road. State Rd. 149 (0.75-mile south of U.S. 20), Portage 219-762-1675

Lincoln Memorial Trail

This 1.2 mile loop trail starts at Bluhm Park East near Westville. The trail has a paved and an unpaved portion, which run sideby-side, allowing hikers and bicyclists to share the road. 10335 W. 350 South, Westville 219-325-8315

Marquette Greenway

The Marquette Greenway is a planned regional trail made up of 20 smaller trail segments. When all segments are complete, the trail will stretch 55-miles from the Illinois border to New Buffalo, MI, connecting Lake Michigan's shoreline communities. Illinois to Michigan



Monon Trail

Monon Trail is a 4.4-mile paved trail that connects the Erie Lackawanna Trail to the Pennsy Greenway and Little Calumet River Levee Trail. The Monon Trail Bridge, created from historic rail trestle beams, crosses over the Little Calumet River. The trailhead in Munster has seating areas and a fountain. Hammond to Munster







Oak Ridge Prairie & Oak Savannah Trail

This beautiful 10-mile trail traverses through savannahs, remnant prairies, wetlands, lakes, parks, and urban environments. The trail starts at Oak Ridge Prairie County Park to the west, snakes through downtown Hobart, and connects to the Prairie-Duneland Trail to the east. *Griffith to Hobart* 219-769-7275 nps.gov/indu



Outback Trail

This is a 10-mile multi-use mountain biking trail in Portage's Imagination Glen Park. The trail is available for use by hikers, bikers, runners, and birdwatchers. Pennsy Greenway

Porter-Brickyard Trail

Prairie-Duneland Trail

One of Indiana's "crown jewel" trails, the Prairie Duneland Trail traverses some of the most beautiful natural areas in the state. The 10.3-mile rail-trail passes through remnant tallgrass prairies, dense forest canopies, river, and residential areas. The trail connects to Imagination Glen Park.

Steel Wheels BMX, located in Imagination Glen Park East, hosts ABA-sanctioned races on its indoor and outdoor tracks. U.S. Bike Route #36

U.S. Bike Route #36 is a 58.7-mile regional route between Illinois and Michigan, which includes 35 miles of off-road trails. The route starts in Hammond, IN and connects to the Erie Lackawanna Trail and runs along the Oak Savannah and Prairie Duneland trails.  Enter and exit the bike-friendly cars through the
 center doors and insert your bike into one of the
 self-locking bike racks. Bike racks are provided
 free of charge on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Access trails and attractions along the southern shores of Lake Michigan from Chicago to Dune Park.

INDIANA DUNES BICYCLING TOUR

Sand South of the Dunes...

While best known for its world-class beaches, the Indiana Dunes and its surrounding communities offer so much more to explore. Culinary delights and exhilarating outdoor adventures are waiting for you.

Explore the small-town charm, beautiful landscapes, and local flavor south of the dunes on this self-guided bicycling tour. You can follow our itinerary or make it your own—ride just one part, break it up into an overnight adventure, or take on the whole route!

Day One: Ride from Indiana Dunes Visitor Center to Chesterton

This six-mile tour takes you down the Porter Brickyard Trail and ends in downtown Chesterton where you can visit local breweries, wineries, restaurants, and boutique shops.

Day Two: Ride from Chesterton to Valparaiso

This 26-mile tour follows Prairie Duneland Trail and several county roads on its way to Valparaiso. You'll pass through Portage and Hobart, where you'll find Broken Wagon Bison. The tour ends in downtown Valparaiso where you can stroll down Lincolnway to see its many restaurants, bars, and unique shops.

Day Three: Ride from Valparaiso to Lake View Beach

This 22-mile leg of the tour continues through Valparaiso, passing by Valparaiso University where you'll find the Brauer Museum of Art and the Chapel of the Resurrection. The tour heads back north, ending with views of Lake Michigan at Lake View Beach.

Due to the open waters of Lake Michigan and the surrounding beaches, dunes, wetlands, forests, and prairies, the Indiana Dunes offers spectacular birding throughout the year, especially during spring and fall migrations.

Migration Sensation

Why do so many birds migrate through here? The massive size of Lake Michigan profoundly affects the flight routes of migratory birds. During the fall, birds that have nested in the north follow the long shores of Lake Michigan further south and converge at the bottom of the lake—right here in the Indiana Dunes. Whether they're here to nest or just stopping for a rest, you'll see birds seldom recorded anywhere else in the Midwest.

Weather Watch

Migrating birds tend to fly during fair weather, especially when they have a good wind helping them along. In the spring, birders tend to see the most migrating raptors on days with a strong southerly wind, and in the fall, frequent cold fronts funnel migrating songbirds and waterbirds straight to the Indiana Dunes.

Aukiki Wetland Conservation Area

This 650-acre parcel conserves a mix of wetlands, black oak barrens, and sand prairie, offering wildlife viewing, hiking, and hunting. Aukiki is part of the Indiana Grand Kankakee Marsh Restoration Project. The Grand Kankakee Marsh was one of the largest freshwater wetland complexes in the United States, encompassing 500,000 acres in eight counties. State Rd. 49, Wheatfield 219-285-2184

Beverly Shores Project Area

Coffee Creek Watershed Preserve

This beautiful 167-acre preserve showcases an inspiring and aesthetically stunning marriage of nature and culture. The natural landscape includes a mix of restored prairie, creek, wetlands, and woodlands. Preserve planners have added human infrastructure to that natural setting and have done so with careful planning and exquisite attention to aesthetics, function, and environmental responsibility. Cowles Bog Trail

Considered a globally significant Important Bird Area (IBA), this site supports several nesting wetland birds that are species of conservation concern in Indiana, including American Bittern, Sandhill Crane, Little Blue Heron, Blackcrowned Night Heron, Virginia Rail, American Black Duck, and a large population of Marsh Wren. 1450 N. Gabis Arboretum at Purdue Northwest

Situated atop the Valparaiso moraine, Gabis offers more than 300 acres of woody plant collections, formal gardens, wetlands, woodlands, and prairies. Originally named Taltree Arboretum & Gardens, its founders envisioned Gabis as a place where people could come to be refreshed and restored, find inspiration and creativity in nature, and learn about horticulture and ecology. 450 W. 100 North, Valparaiso 219-462-0025

Great Marsh Trail

Just a short stroll to an accessible observation platform provides a great view of this recently restored wetland. Wading birds like herons and egrets and songbirds such as warblers and red-winged blackbirds are again abundant. During migration periods, see flocks of ducks and geese. Hammond Lakefront Park and Bird Sanctuary

A truly unexpected find. A small, 600-meter tract nestled in the middle of an industrial area may not seem worth exploring, but this one is! Known by locals simply as the "migrant trap," the lakefront and bird sanctuary is a hidden birding paradise. As you crisscross the site on a narrow footpath, keep your eyes open for neotropical bird species that use this small space as a critical stopover during migrations. 701 Casino Center Dr., Hammond 219-853-6378

Heron Rookery Trail and Reynold's Creek

For more than 60 years, herons nested here along the Little Calumet River. Though the heron rookery is no longer active, the 1.6-mile trail is a good spot for viewing other bird species. Indiana Dunes State Park

The park attracts breeding birds more commonly found farther south (including WatchList species Prairie Warbler and Louisiana Waterthrush), as well as more northerly species (Canada and Blackburnian Warblers). Migration sightings include such WatchList species as Kirtland's, Golden-winged, and Bay-breasted Warblers. Jasper-Pulaski Fish and Wildlife Area

This gem of a wildlife area conserves 8,062 acres of wetland, upland, and woodland habitat, providing an ideal stopover for migratory birds. Beginning in late September, sandhill cranes, Canada geese, ducks, and occasionally even federally endangered whooping cranes gather here. By mid-Novemberpeak fall viewing time—daily crane counts swell to 15,000 or more. Kankakee Sands

Kankakee Sands conserves more than 7,000 acres of prairie, savanna, and wetlands—habitat for some of the fastest declining bird species in North America, including northern bobwhite, grasshopper sparrow, and American bittern. Birding Ethics

- Respect wildlife homes. Leave nests and their occupants as you found them.
- In no-hunt areas, blend in with your surroundings. Wear neutral-colored clothing and move slowly and quietly.
- Avoid the use of recordings, calls, or whistles to attract birds, as they can disrupt the birds' normal feeding, mating, and broodrearing activities.
- View birds from a distance to avoid disturbing them.
- Stay on trails and respect private property.
- Share your lunch only with other humans.

You can now hike in a local legend's footsteps at Indiana Dunes National Park's West Beach. Explore the natural wonders of her beloved Dunes terrain while learning about dune development.

GET STARTED

The Diana of the Dunes Dare is a self-guided trail at Indiana Dunes National Park's West Beach, 376 N. County Line Rd., Gary 46403. The trail is marked, and you can take the dare any day of the year. There is a fee to enter West Beach.

Dune Succession

Follow the trail to learn about the four stages of dune development. This scenic, but strenuous, trail includes a climb up quite a few stairs (can you count them all?) for a spectacular view of Lake Michigan.



During the last Ice Age, glaciers created diverse regions stretching from wide-open Lake Michigan to the shores of the Kankakee River. Here, you can fish Lake Michigan tributaries winding through community parks and secluded nature, or head out for some quiet boat or shore fishing on the smaller lakes and streams dotting the landscape south of the dunes.

Seasons

Spring

From March to mid-May, fishermen troll with spoons, spinners, dodgers, and flies for coho salmon along a two-mile band of Lake Michigan shore. Shoreline anglers say that April is the best month for catching Coho in the spring.

Summer


From May to July, as water temperatures rapidly increase, boat fishermen pursue trout and salmon that have retreated to cooler offshore waters. Fishing at depths ranging between 70 and 100 feet with a distance of six to 20 miles from shore, downriggers are used to drop lures for lake trout, coho salmon, chinook, and steelhead.

Fall

From September to early November, lake trout and brown trout can be caught along the shoreline. Indiana's stocking program supports sport fishing in the fall, but for the greatest concentration of fish, head to the Port of Indiana, which is close to a major stocking site.

Winter

From January through March, fishing is popular on inland lakes, fast-current streams, and warm water discharges along Lake Michigan's shoreline. Warm water discharge fishing produces good catches of brown trout in addition to steelhead and coho salmon.

Best Bait

- To fish salmon, most anglers use a mediumheavy action rod with a 10 to 12-pound test line.
- Flies with the most success include black or brown stoneflies, chartreuse flies, green and orange wooly worms, egg sucking leeches, and many others depending upon the time of year and the presentation of the flies to the fish.
- Medium spoons, plugs, spinners, and body baits are used for Chinook.
- Nightcrawlers and wax worms are often successful, especially in summer.
- Small spinners or rooster tails work well for steelhead.
- Smaller spoons and spinners are used for Coho.
- Spawn sacks are used throughout the year.



Kankakee River

Farthest south in the region lies the Kankakee River, where northern pike, catfish, walleye, bass, and bluegill are common. Fishing the Kankakee is a place to immerse yourself in nature for a quiet experience.







Charter Boat Fishing

Head to Portage and hook up with one of the many charter boat companies. Discover Lake Michigan's hot spots, where you can catch salmon, trout, and perch. Most charter boat companies offer both half day and full day charters. Charter fishing season begins early March and concludes early December. All the fishing gear is provided by the charter boat companies.

Just remember to...

- Check to see if your charter boat sells fishing licenses and trout stamps.
- Bring a large cooler and plastic bags to store fish.
- Bring sunscreen, sunglasses, soft-soled shoes, and a hat.
- Pack snacks and drinks or ask if lunch is provided when booking.
- Wear warm clothing and rain gear.



Important Information

Fishing Licenses

Unless otherwise exempted, you must have a valid fishing license to fish in public lakes, streams, rivers, or tributaries in Indiana or its boundary waters. A valid trout/salmon stamp is also required to fish for or take trout and salmon from public waters. License holders must carry their license while fishing and present it upon request to any authorized law enforcement official.


You don't need a license to fish if...

- You're an Indiana resident born before April 1, 1943.
- · You're under the age of 18.
- You have a developmental disability.
- You're legally blind.
- You're a resident of a state-owned mental rehabilitation facility.
- You're a resident of any licensed healthcare facility in Indiana.
- You're a resident engaged in full-time military service on approved military leave.

Please Protect Our Waters

- Avoid in-water hull scraping. Paints used on hulls discourage marine growth and can be harmful to aquatic organisms.
- Do not dump unused minnows into the water. Some may be unwanted species that mature and cause problems. Instead, discard unused bait in the trash.
- Equipment should be dry for five days before being used in another body of water.
- Inspect your boat and trailer to prevent the spread of invasive species.
- All equipment should have mud and vegetation removed. Water should also be drained from the boat's bilge, bait buckets, and other water-holding areas.
- Keep your engine tuned to minimize leaks and look for contractors or marinas that offer a bilge pump-out service.


Hiking Safety Tips

The National Park Service Recommends Hiking Smart

- Call or stop by the Indiana Dunes Visitor Center to ask about the trail conditions.
- Bring a compass, map, or GPS.
- · Wear sturdy and durable shoes.
- Choose appropriate clothing for the season.
- · Wear sunscreen or clothing that protects from the sun.
- Bring enough water to stay hydrated.
- Don't forget to bring snacks to keep your energy up.
- Spray for mosquitoes and check for ticks.
- · Be courteous and cautious on the trails.
- · Let the slowest hiker in your party set the pace and take breaks often.
- · Keep track of the time and distance.
- · Be aware of wildlife in the area.

East Branch Little Calumet Water Trail

With significant stretches in both Indiana and Illinois, the Little Calumet River has helped link cities and towns throughout the Chicago region for centuries. The East Branch Little Calumet Water Trail offers paddlers over 11 miles of varying natural scenery, and two paddling trips are possible. The first takes you from Chesterton through Porter and ends at the Indiana Dunes National Park, and the second route lets paddlers put in and take out near the mouth of the river at Lake Michigan for an up-and-back trip.

Chesterton to Indiana Dunes National Park

When approaching the State Rd. 49 bridge, paddlers should stop on the left and inspect the rapids directly under the bridge before paddling through. A portage along the left shore is suggested to avoid rocks on the other side.

Paddling on the Kankakee River

The Kankakee River National Water Trail provides 133 miles of paddling on a historic, undammed river flowing through several county parks.

Safety on the Kankakee River

- Be aware that there are few support services and facilities, such as washrooms, fresh water, and designated portages along the route.
- Do not attempt to paddle the river near flood stages.
- Know your location as accurately as possible, and always carry a cell phone.
- The river flows through many hunting preserves.
 Contact any preserves along your proposed route for information about hunting seasons.
- Tree falls and logjams can clog bridges with few portage opportunities. Call the Kankakee River Basin Commission for a status report on known logjams.



Paddling on Lake Michigan

The Lake Michigan Water Trail currently covers more than 75 miles along the south shore of Lake Michigan, following the entire Indiana coast from Chicago, Illinois to New Buffalo, Michigan. Paddlers, planners, and access site owners from the four states bordering the lake are working together to develop what will be the longest continuous loop of freshwater sea kayaking in the world.

Safety on Lake Michigan

- Be visible. Wear bright colors so others can see you between waves or in foggy conditions.
- Carry a bright light, a whistle, and flares to signal your position.
- Only use a sea kayak with bulkheads/ floatation in bow and stern.
- Have self rescue skills if paddling in waves or away from shore.
- Take a boating safety class offered by the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.









Lake Michigan Water Trail

Indiana Dunes is a premier paddling destination with more than 50 miles of a continuous water trail along Lake Michigan's southern shore. When paddling upstream from either access point, take the first left turn into the East Branch of the Little Calumet (the right branch is the West Branch of the Little Calumet), and paddle upstream as far as you care. The multiple branches you will reach (from right to left) are Salt Creek, the Little Calumet, and a cooling water discharge from the Cleveland Cliffs steel plant. You will run into logiams on both Salt Creek and the East Branch Little Calumet and can portage around those if feeling adventurous. 
















Drazer Park (Thomas S. Drazer Memorial Park)



Ogden Gardens Park is four acres of professionally maintained botanical gardens with perennial gardens, annual displays, native and ornamental trees, a gazebo, and a Japanese garden. Pinhook Bog & Upland Trail

This true bog is a must-see adventure experience. Located several miles inland, away from the rest of the Indiana Dunes National Park, Pinhook Bog has a floating boardwalk where you can view carnivorous plants, sphagnum moss, and blueberry bushes. You'll walk above the sponge-like layer on the bog's surface in the most unexpected environment in the dunes. The boa is open during select times when rangers are present. Seidner Dune and Swale

This 43-acre property protects globally rare dune-and-swale topography and floodplain marsh along the Grand Calumet River. Impressive wildflower displays include wild lupine and puccoon in the spring and fringed gentians and prairie plants in the fall. Egrets, herons, and cormorants are often sighted along the river during the summer. Restored as a shorebird sanctuary, this former garbage dump is suitable for a swath of migrating birds to rest, feed, and prepare for their continued journeys. Elevated walkways for bird enthusiasts are being built. 
