With Coronet Peak, The Remarkables, Cardrona and Treble Cone all now open for business until early October, there is plenty of time for snow bunnies to get their fix during the area's typically crisp, blue sky days over the next few months.

The great thing about this part of New Zealand is all the fun you can have off-mountain too, once you've hung up your skis or snowboard for the day. Here are a few après ski activities to enjoy back at ground level.

FEAST ON WORLD-CLASS FOOD & WINE

The craft beer revolution has well and truly arrived in Queenstown, with new breweries and taprooms popping up throughout the region. There are several excellent beer tours available where you can learn how the magic happens, or head into Queenstown's CBD where you'll find bars and restaurants serving up a rotating selection of their favourite brews.

Central Otago, of course, is known around the world for its sensational cool climate wines. For a change in pace, head out to the rugged landscapes of Gibbston and savour world-class pinot noir and luscious aromatic wines. Self-drive, join a guided tour, or cycle around the vineyards to get a taste of the terroir. Many of the cellar doors have excellent restaurants attached too, so you can sit back in front of an open fire and indulge in seasonal local produce.

DISCOVER THE REGION'S GOLD-MINING PAST

One of the most picturesque parts of New Zealand, Arrowtown has a fascinating history. Settled in the 1860s when gold was first discovered in the Arrow River, the charming township features many of the original buildings which have been restored to their former glory. History buffs should visit the heritage-listed Chinese village and the Lakes District Museum; if you get inspired you can have a go at panning for gold yourself.
