Providence



Festival Ballet Providence built an *outdoor* stage for professional ballet performances that will run three weeks in December. The stage will be used by professional ballet troupes as well as ballet schools from Providence and throughout the state.

An adapted version of The Nutcracker, now called Nutcracker Sweets, will be performed with socially distanced seating, and outdoor heating elements. Some of the infrastructure will also be repurposed for the following seasons as well.

maximum, to ensure social distancing.
