This coastal city also appeals to the wine aficionado. With more than 100 acres of preserved farmland, 60 of which house the vines, Newport Vineyards boasts a robust selection of estate-grown wines. Enjoy a tour and tasting followed by a decadent farm-to-table meal—and be sure to save room for dessert. Follow up your lunch with an afternoon shopping at the iconic Bowen's Wharf or a leisurely expedition courtesy of Rail Explorers.

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To experience Rhode Island's fall foliage at its prismatic peak, plan your trip for mid to late October. Scenic walking, rail, or home and garden tours will provide you with the classic and cozy New England autumnal experience.

Book your stay at Newport Harbor Island Resort, which provides a quiet setting and both a shuttle and water taxi to Bowen's Wharf. Dine in at the Torpedo Bar & Lounge and enjoy views of the marina before cozing up by the firepit. Or head out to White Horse Tavern, the country's oldest operating tavern.
