Day 1

Rochester Public Market

Rochester's City-run Public Market has served the community at its 280 N. Union Street site since 1905, and is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, year-round. Vendors--over 200 occupying over 300 vending stalls on busiest Saturdays--offer local produce, produce from around the country and world; meats and seafood; eggs and dairy products; ethnic delicacies; prepared and packaged foods; specialty items; general merchandise; and more in three covered outdoor vendor sheds and also a brand new state-of-the-art fully indoor shed. In addition, an array of independent local businesses--cafes, food stands, coffee shops, florists, specialty food purveyors, breweries, and more--can be found on Market grounds and in the surrounding Market District.



George Eastman Museum

Is the world's oldest photography museum and one the oldest film archives in the U.S. Its 4.5 million artifacts include the world's largest collection of camera technology. Eastman's mansion is a National Historic Landmark.

The Neighborhood Of The Arts (NOTA)

NOTA is Rochester's arts district, a diverse cultural hub that attracts creative people and ideas. NOTA is home to many of the city's cultural institutions, as well as a variety of studio, shops, restaurants, and services.

Bitter Honey

Living Roots Wine & Co.

Living Roots Wine & Co. is the only urban winery in the Finger Lakes region in Upstate New York. Located in an old downtown warehouse in Rochester's Neighborhood of the Arts, the 7,500 square foot tasting room and winemaking facility showcases wines from vastly different corners of the globe: the Finger Lakes and the regions surrounding Adelaide. Living Roots sources grapes from different vineyards and growers, and each wine is handcrafted in small batches.

The National Susan B. Anthony Museum & House

This national Historic Landmark was home to the legendary suffragist during her 40 most politically active years.

Anthony meet here with leaders of the civil rights movement, including abolitionist Fredrick Douglass. She was arrested at her home for the “crime” of voting in 1872.



Mt. Hope Cemetery

Final resting place of Susan B. Anthony, Jean Brooks Greenleaf (a president of the NYS Woman Suffrage Association), and Frederick Douglas, abolitionist and early supporter of women’s rights.

Memorial Art Gallery

A visit to the Memorial Art Gallery is a journey through more than 5,000 years of art history. From the relics of antiquity to works in the vanguard of contemporary movements, MAG offers a panorama of the world’s art. Our 14-acre campus is a spectacular public art space that is a popular destination for Rochesterians and out-of-town visitors alike.
