Welcome to

South County

What is South County? It's the southernmost region of the state of Rhode Island. South County is known for its beaches. You could say South County is the reason why Rhode Island is known as "the Ocean State." We're known for our unspoiled nature and are a haven for those who enjoy the outdoors. Hike or bike miles of trails through lush forests and wildlife preserves that spill into a 100 miles of coastline lined with 20 public beaches. Paddle through peaceful inlet waterways that lead to secluded sandbars. Catch a glimpse of migrating birds as they make their way north or south depending on the season. If you love nature, South County is the place to be.

We are comprised of eleven towns, each one unique and each with something to offer. In the north Coventry is steeped in history. Its most famous citizen, General Nathanael Greene, at the age of 33 served as the youngest second-in-command to General George Washington during the Revolutionary War. Tour his homestead that was restored and refurbished in the period style. Walk, bike or roller blade on the paved path along the Coventry Greenway or the Trestle Trail from Coventry to Connecticut.

West Greenwich is the headquarters of URI's Whispering Pines Conference Center and it's considered a Southern Rhode Island sportsman's paradise where 80% of the area consists of woodlands. Stepping Stone Ranch is a retreat for families who love horseback riding, hayrides, camping or hiking. Rock climbing is a challenge in the Wickaboxet Area's Rattlesnake Ledge, and Big River spawns big fish waiting to be caught.

East Greenwich is known as Southern Rhode Island's dining destination due to its wide variety of outstanding restaurants ranging from waterfront dining to eclectic Main Street establishments. Main Street is also home to the Varnum Memorial Armory, where you will find uniforms and armaments from the Revolution through Vietnam. Main Street is renowned as Rhode Island's bridal capital, lined with exquisite shops featuring elegant apparel and gifts from precious antiques to stunning wedding gowns. Visit the Odeum Theatre, Varnum House Museum and the New England Wireless and Steam Museum for a piece of South County history.

North Kingstown is notably one of the most popular places to visit in South County because of its location, natural harbor, and great shopping. The historic village of Wickford, one of the "10 Best Main Streets in the U.S.A.," is lined with shops offering unique merchandise and waterfront dining. Leading up to Halloween, Wickford's Wicked Week is a spooky treat with different events and ghoulish decorations. At holiday time, the luminaria and holiday decorations make it Hallmark movie material.

Exeter is classified as one of the few remaining rural communities in Rhode Island. Outdoor adventure abounds in the natural beauty of the Arcadia Management Area, a state-owned 14,000 acre park. Thirty miles of hiking and walking trails, campsites, freshwater beaches and ponds for fishing, boating and kayaking, guarantee an invigorating experience, especially during Fall, when the beautiful, New England foliage emerges. Yawgoo Valley Ski Area and Waterpark will keep the kids busy no matter the season. And don't forget to visit the state's only museum dedicated to the indigenous people and culture, the Tomaquag Museum.

First inhabited by the Native American Narragansett Indian Tribe, Charlestown residents and visitors now call this coastal community "the best kept secret in Rhode Island." Miles of secluded, unspoiled, sandy beaches offer visitors a chance to enjoy many outdoor activities or just some relaxation under the sun. Stop by the Fantastic Umbrella Factory for a walk through a bamboo forest as well as beautiful greenhouses and shops full of products made by local artisans.

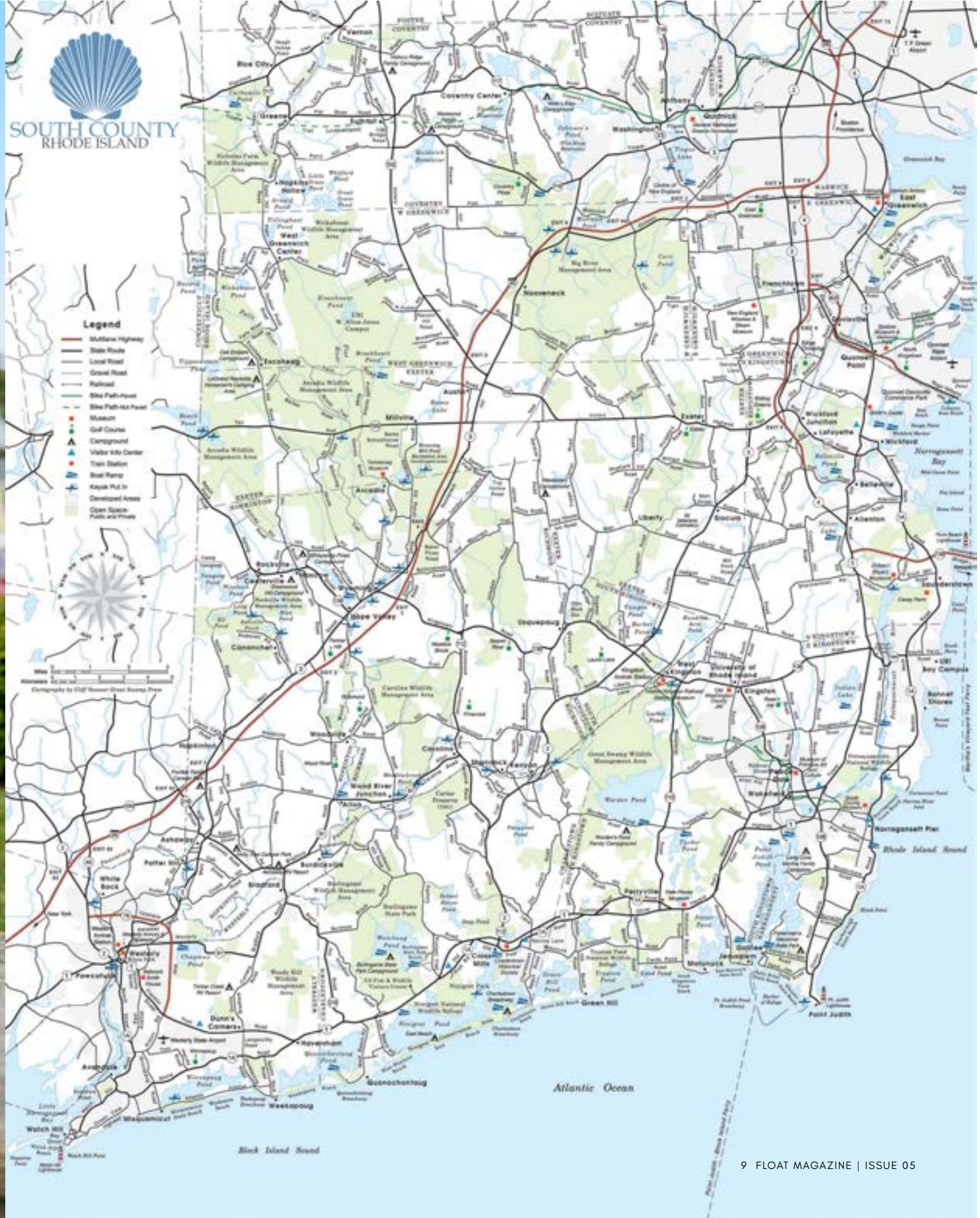
South Kingstown is home to two of South County's scenic beaches, tranquil farmlands, and historic landmarks. Downtown Wakefield is situated on the revitalized Saugatucket River, an architectural sight to behold. Unique shops and restaurants line Main St. featuring exquisite antiques, garden supplies, apparel, gifts, crafts, and more!

Recognized as the home of some of the finest beaches in the Northeast, Narragansett provides the perfect place to enjoy a peaceful or fun-filled vacation. While traveling on scenic Ocean Rd, you will get a glimpse of a spectacular architectural structure, the Towers of Narragansett. This well-known landmark evokes scenes from Narragansett's Victorian past. The bustling Port of Galilee, the second largest commercial fishing port in New England, guarantees the freshest fish on the East Coast. Galilee is also the main port for the Block Island ferries and Rhode Island's only whale watching excursion on board the Gail Frances.

Hopkinton is a quaint, historic town where golfers from near and far can flock to beautiful, green golf courses including Fenner Hill, Lindbrook and Wood River Golf Club. For outdoor enthusiasts interested in boating, fishing, canoeing and kayaking, Hopkinton provides the perfect place along the unspoiled banks of the Wood-Pawcatuck River. It is surely the outdoor place-to-be! Long and Ell Ponds are the only designated National Natural Landmarks in Rhode Island.

The open, green spaces in Richmond are ideal for great golf and attracting visitors all year round. Golfers can take advantage of the warm spring and fall days to tee off at one of Richmond's many courses. Enjoy the picturesque surroundings of a beautiful countryside in any season, but especially at the height of growing season. It's also home to the Preserve Sporting Club and Residences - a spectacular sporting paradise where you can stay in a tiny home, cabin or the lodge, dine in a hobbit house or their Double Barrel Steak Kitchen, learn to shoot, play golf or relax at the spa.

South County's town of Westerly, is so named for its position at the south-western tip of the Rhode Island, and includes Watch Hill and Misquamicut, two highly popular summer resort communities that fringe the Atlantic Ocean. Charming downtown Westerly, with its wonderful Victorian architecture and beautifully landscaped Wilcox Park, helped to earn the designation "one of the twelve most distinctive destinations in the country." Tranquil Watch Hill boasts lovely beaches and a waterfront village, making it a perfect stop for outdoor dining, leisurely walks and antiquing.

4 Ways to Bike South County



1. Arcadia Management Area

Arguably the best mountain biking area in RI. Thirty miles, all color coded (green dot-easy, blue square -moderate and black diamond -difficult). Whether you are looking for easy, flat riding or hard woods with elevation, enter this pine forest which finds its way to the edge of ponds and you will be treated to a day of beauty.

2. Coventry Greenway and Trestle Trail

A converted railway, this five-mile, completely paved greenway is popular with many hikers and bicyclists as a great way to enjoy the outdoors. Three miles of the trail have been designated as the first Rhode Island segment of the East Coast Greenway, which will span from Maine to Florida. West Warwick line to Station Street is complete and open year-round.

3. Quonset Bike Path

The path runs 2.5 miles from Route 1 (Post Road) through the Quonset Business Park to the Calf Pasture Point nature area, managed by The Town of North Kingstown. The bikeway is entirely off-road.

4. The William C. O'Neil Bike Path

What is it then? It's an artisan marketplace with a colFormerly known as the South County Bike Path. It is located on the former Narragansett Pier railroad, which connected a collection of villages in South Kingstown, going from Kingston, south through Peace Dale and Wakefield.

5 Unique Stays

From treehouses to glamping and more - here are some of the most unique places to stay in South County.

1. Sleep in the trees

This treehouse by the sea in South Kingstown is a lofty studio that sits on the second story, up in the trees. It's peaceful, bright, and cozy, walkable to downtown Wakefield, and you can bike to the beach! Book this via AirBnB by looking up Treehouse by the Sea in South Kingstown, RI.

2. Why camp when you can glamp?

Glamp Frogmore offers two rustic retreats on 35 acres of private property adjacent to the Maxwell Mays Audubon Wildlife Refuge in Coventry, RI. The Pines sleeps up to six people and The Ferns sleeps up to four. Unplug completely while still being close to civilization. Enjoy hiking in the wildlife refuge, s'mores by your firepit as you stargaze or go for a paddle in the pond with the rowboat provided. Book your stay at glampfrogmore.com.

3. Lavender fields forever

Stay in a luxuriously rustic farm suite on a lavender farm. In season your view will be lavender fields as far as the eye can see. Meet the farm animals including Diego the donkey, Humphrey the camel and more. You can also book a lavender-inspired dinner with Chef Lauren as part of your stay. The dinner is an optional add-on. Book your stay at lavenderwavesfarm.com.

4. Stay like an influencer

South County House is a 1500 square foot home that sits on nearly an acre of land, 3/4 of a mile from the beach, bordering a forest preserve and across the street from a small family farm. It has been featured in Vogue, Architectural Digest, Travel+Leisure and more. A hammock, fireplace, bathtub outdoor shower and deck, bikes, soft-top surfboards, vintage stereo systems with a curated record collection as well as Tivoli bluetooth speakers and radios are all available. Book South County House on airbnb.com.

5. Why not shack up?

This cozy little shack, known as the Shuck Shack is right on Ninigret Pond named for the abundance of oysters available in the pond. Bring your own boat or kayak to fully experience the salt pond and paddle out to one of the nearby beaches. Don't have a boat? You can rent one from a number of nearby marinas. Oysters can be delivered to your door courtesy of the owners, just place your order and don't forget to pick up wine to enjoy with them! Book the Shuck Shack on airbnb.com.

It's amazing how just by getting out of the city, the sky opens up and you can see so many more stars. Stargazing is a favorite pastime in all of South County, but the town of Charlestown lends itself to the best stargazing around. That's because Charlestown boasts the darkest stretch of night sky between Boston and New York City.

Tucked into the 227 acre Ninigret Park which was the site of the former Naval Auxliary Air Academy is the Frosty Drew Observatory, named for Edwin F. "Frosty" Drew, a Brown University graduate, who began his career as a writer. He soon became actively involved in major efforts to preserve and protect the natural environmental heritage of RI. He particularly worked to sustain Ninigret Park in

Charlestown, where the Frosty Drew Nature Center is located, and was instrumental in preventing the construction of a nuclear power plant in the town.

Frosty Drew Observatory welcomes visitors most every Friday night. Hours change according to seasons and weather so it's best to consult their website prior to visiting. Sometimes they open for special astronomical events as they happen, such as eclipses, comets and meteors.

Visitors can expect a magical and romantic experience of stargazing under the darkest stretch of night sky within 225 miles.

SOUTH COUNTY, RHODE ISLAND But, most of you will come in the summer and there are so many ways to explore the water. Kids will enjoy learning to dig for clams and catch crabs in our salt ponds. Paddling out to a sandbar for a private picnic is ideal for those looking for a little

romance. Adventure seekers can dive with sharks while leisure cruisers can set sail for a tour of our light houses, wind farms or Block Island.

Here are ten easy ways for you to make the most of your vacation no matter what time of year you visit South County. Keep in mind that the ocean never sleeps and fishing charters, boat charters and activities such as para-sailing on ice and ice fishing are happening here in the winter and are quite the experience. So read on and discover how you'll explore the sea in South County, Rhode Island.

1. 20 Public Beaches

Find your perfect beach whether you're looking for big waves, a quiet cove or a long stretch of sand.

2. Paddle On

Canoe, kayak or paddle board whether out in the open or ocean or on a calm salt pond or rippling river. There are many places to rent canoes, kayaks or paddle boards.

3. Hang Ten

Always wanted to learn how to surf? Take lessons! Warm Winds Surf Shop (you'll see their van at Narragansett Town Beach) offers surfing lessons for those looking to ride the waves.

4. Live Your Yacht Rock Dreams

Whether you choose a little speed boat, a family sized pontoon or a fancy yacht, you can live out your dreams of boating, by just chartering a boat for the day. Drive it yourself or rent one with a captain and sit back and enjoy.

5. Get Hooked!

The port of Galilee offers many opportunities to catch your own fish. Whether baiting squid by night or hooking bass by day, set

out to catch your own and then ask one of the nearby restaurants, like George's of Galilee to cook it up for you.

6. Island Hopping

Take a ride over to Block Island on the Ferry. It leaves daily from the port of Galilee. Go for the day or a spend a night or two on the island.

7. Go Cruising

See light houses, wind farms, whales or seals depending on the season. Several different types of cruises are available all year long. Narragansett Bay Cruises will take you to by 10 different lighthouses in Narragansett Bay. Frances Fleet find you whales in July and August, while Fish 'n Tales Adventures and Save the Bay will bring you seal watching from November to April. Wind farm tours are available via the Block Island Ferry or via private charter with one of the fishing boats.

8. Set Sail

Learn to sail no matter what age you are. Lessons for kids and adults are available at Greenwich Bay Sailing Association.

9. Jet Set

We don't think there's anything

more fun than jetting across the water on jet skis. The Purple Ape in Westerly and INZ Jet Ski Rental in Narragansett will make your jet ski dreams come true. The Purple Ape also has hydro bikes for those looking for a less intense thrill.

10. Shark Bait

For those extreme thrill seekers, boy do we have a treat for you! Go shark diving and get up close and personal with these creatures of the deep. Twilight and night diving are available for experienced shark divers and daytime trips are available a couple of times a month for those daring enough to try this. Marine photographers will be thrilled with the photo opps available on such a trip.

Top 10 Restaurants for Seaside Dining in South County

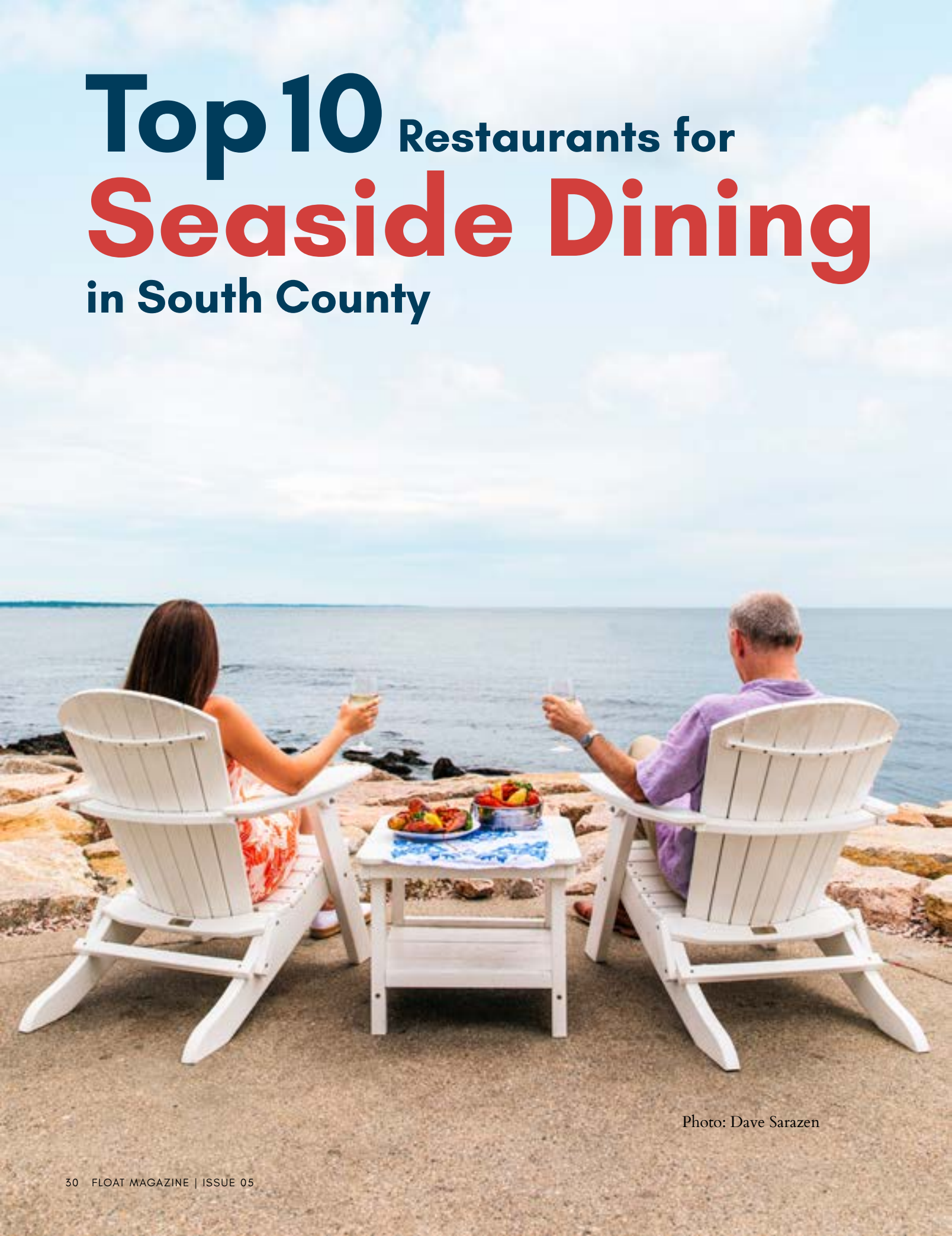

Listed below in **alphabetical** order are the Top 10 restaurants for seaside dining in South County according to our visitors:

1. **Chair 5** in the Break Hotel in Narragansett – get ocean views from the rooftop deck.
2. **Coast** at Ocean House – gaze out at the ocean from this luxury hotel’s fine dining restaurant.
3. **Coast Guard House** in Narragansett – breathtaking views of Narragansett Town Beach.
4. **George’s of Galilee** – sit inside or outside, even right on the beach at this longtime favorite.
5. **Maria’s Seaside Cafe** in Westerly – Hotel Maria’s restaurant sits across from Misquamicut Beach.
6. **Matunuck Oyster Bar** in South Kingstown– technically on a salt pond, but definitely a lovely view and a visitor (and local) favorite.
7. **Paddy’s Beach Club** in Westerly – dine with your toes in the sand right on Misquamicut Beach
8. **Sea Craft** in Narragansett – the restaurant inside the new hotel The Shore House offers views of the ocean from inside and lawn seating across the street from the sea.
9. **Water Street Kitchen** in East Greenwich offers delicious dishes with a view of the marina.
10. **Wickford on the Water** in North Kingstown – serving breakfast, lunch and dinner with a waterfront view of Wickford Harbor.

6 Things to do with Kids



1. Yawgoo Valley Ski Area and Waterpark

In the winter this is the only ski area in the whole state and a perfect place for kids to learn to ski, snowboard or for the whole family to go snow tubing. In the summer, kids can enjoy the pool and waterslides while the adults can sip on adult beverages such as delicious mudslides at the tiki bar.

2. Biomes Marine Biology Center

Biomes is the only private marine education facility in New England. Their hands on aquarium teaches children and adults about the marine animals of Narragansett Bay and the Atlantic Ocean. It's a great activity for a rainy day.

3. Adventureland Family Fun Park

From mini golf to go karts, bumper boats and more, this family fun destination has something for all ages.

4. The Fantastic Umbrella Factory

It's not really an umbrella factory. What is it then? It's an artisan marketplace with a collection of shops selling artisanal creations. There are gardens everywhere, including a bamboo forest for selfies for the 'gram and a collection of animals for the kids to feed and pet such as emus, ducks and chickens.

5. Living Sharks Museum

This is the first shark history museum in the country. A collection of artifacts from all over the world tell the story of the shark. The collections aim to educate from an unbiased perspective featuring exhibits of shark history, science and conservation. Admission is free.

6. South County Museum

The South County Museum has preserved the rural history of Southern Rhode Island for nearly 90 years. Eight acres house a number of buildings including a print shop, blacksmith shop, carpentry shop, exhibit hall and carriage barn. On the fourth of July every year, the official Rhode Island Red hens hatch their chicks and it's a fun experience for kids of all ages.

5 Unique Dining Experiences

1. The Maker's Mark Hobbit House at The Preserve

Nestled into hillside boulders, our two Hobbit House getaways are surrounded by lush landscapes with tree trunks incorporated into the architecture. No matter which Hobbit House you dine in, you'll feel like you've entered a magical place where a well-worn path leads you to an intricate round wooden door that swings open to reveal an intimate interior with stone floors and artfully stacked stone walls. 2. The Nordic

This is the ultimate buffet! Set in the woods, by a lovely lake, you can eat til you're feeling nappy and then go lay in a hammock and relax. Enjoy unlimited lobster, crab, prime rib, filet mignon, shrimp, oysters, appetizers, salads, fresh fruits, gourmet dessert bar and Haagan Dazs ice cream bar. Delicious food, a full bar and amazing service in a beautiful lakeside, wooded setting await.

3. The Igloos at the Cost Guard House

Dine outdoors no matter the weather! These beautifully appointed igloos look out over Narragansett Town Beach and create a cozy dining experience in the off season.

4. The General Stanton Inn

This reportedly haunted inn has a tavern that is also said to be haunted.

5. The Olympia Tea Room

"Famous not Fancy" is their motto. This former soda shop from 1916 serves up delicious food with a unique ambiance. Husband and wife owners Jack and Marcia Felber have kept some of the original fixtures such as the bar/soda counter and added their own flair with pink walls decorated with Marcia's original art work. The restaurant offers an award-winning wine list paired with incredible views of the harbor and spectacular sunsets.

15 Places to take stunning pictures in South County, Rhode Island

1. Narragansett Town Beach

Shoot photos of surfers riding killer waves or seals lounging on rocks.

2. The Towers

This magnificent Narragansett landmark arches over Ocean Road like a fairytale castle. It is the perfect backdrop for selfies and portraits.

3. Point Judith Lighthouse

This beacon for sailors from another time makes for stunning surfer pics,

selfies and beautifully frames the moon.

4. Black Point

The ruins of an old stone carriage house and the cliffs on this seaside hike lend themselves to beautiful photos.

5. Narragansett Indian Monument

Take a selfie with this 23 foot sculpture carved from a single Douglas Fir by Peter Toth. It is one of 74 in the country honoring the American Indian.

6. Shannock Falls

These small but pretty horseshoe falls in Richmond are beautiful in every season.

7. Stepstone Falls

These low falls in West Greenwich were named as the #1 falls by the Weather Channel. The Falls River cascades over gray ledges to form a picturesque landscape.

8. Kinney Azalea Gardens

These six enchanting acres of over

1000 species of azaleas and rhododendrons in South Kingstown peak in mid-May through June.

9. Napatree Point

This sandy trail to the ocean favored by hikers and bird watchers in Westerly is the best place for sunset photos.

10. Watch Hill Carousel

This is the oldest continuously operational flying horse carousel in the country. Photograph the kids as they reach for the brass ring!

11. Port of Galilee

There is no better place to capture the fishing boats, fishermen and lobstermen than this working fishing village in Narragansett.

12. Wickford Village and Harbor

This historic village in North Kingstown with its quaint shops and harbor is always picturesque but in October it's spooktacular.

13. The Fantastic Umbrella Factory

This unique spot in Charlestown is not an umbrella factory at all, but a farm with a petting zoo, cafe, a bamboo forest and lots of shops selling goods

by local artisans. Get a selfie in the bamboo forest.

14. The Farmer's Daughter

This South Kingstown farm is stunning all year long, but at it's best in late summer when the dahlias are in bloom and in the fall when the pumpkins arrive.

15. Frosty Drew Observatory

Nothing beats the night sky photography at this Charlestown spot.

A Day in Watch Hill

The village of Watch Hill in Westerly, Rhode Island served as a lookout point during the French and Indian War and was an alluring escape for Gilded Age tycoons. It attracted classic Hollywood icons such as Jean Harlow and Clark Gable, even Albert Einstein. Today, pop star Taylor Swift has a vacation home here.

But Watch Hill is much more than a sanctuary for the rich and famous. Though its elite privacy appeals to many of its residents, too, its reputation has grown nationally given the community's pristine nature, quaintness and stunning scenery.

This sandy peninsula overlooks the ocean and on a clear day you can see both Long Island and Fishers Island. The cove it forms is known as "Little Narragansett Bay" and it shelters miles of white sand beaches. Its historic resort, The Ocean House, which opened in 1868, still operates today as a magnet for those living, or wanting to live, the high life.

Watch Hill is a beautiful, luxurious day or weekend trip for beachcombing, shopping and dining. When arriving in town, pick up a delicious cold brew coffee from Sift and then head for the beach. Walk toward the historic Flying Horse Carousel – a National Historic Landmark and the oldest operating flying horse carousel in the country. At the carousel, turn left, walk up the hill and there's a sign for entrance to the public beach complete with a sandy path lined on either side by beach roses. The water is clear and calm enough for swimming but with enough waves to keep things interesting.

After enjoying a playful swim and catnap, walk out to Watch Hill Light. The lighthouse was used to warn residents of a naval attack – not to guide ships at sea. The museum is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons from 1-3 p.m. from July until the week after Labor Day.

Lunch is at the historic Olympia Tea Room – “famous, not fancy” for over 100 years. Taylor Swift has been spotted dining here. The decor is a quirky and enchanting mix of old and new. Black and white floor tiles and the original dark woodwork of the booths and tables are accentuated by pink walls and a beautiful bar that was once the soda fountain. Sit at the bar for cocktails and nibble on local mussels in a perfect garlicky broth and lobster salad on a croissant with French fries.

There’s plenty of shopping on Bay Street. Whether you’re looking for souvenirs, designer fashions or original art by local artists – you’ll find it all here. Don’t forget local art is tax free in Rhode Island. After touring the shops, climb the hill for cocktails and dessert at the Ocean House. This luxury resort is a must see. You can sit on a rocking chair on the veranda or in the spacious lobby whether you’re a guest or not. Have a drink on the veranda then head down the outside stairs, past the croquet field on the right, almost to the back to Below Deck where gelato and mini donuts are just the thing to cap off the day. Sit outside and let the salt air wash over you. A more economic option is St. Clare’s Annex where you can get an ice cream cone from the window or enjoy a casual lunch.

Before departing for good, return to the carousel and take a right behind the row of shops, along the water and up over the dunes to Napatree Point – a wildlife refuge favored by bird watchers, beachcombers and photographers. As the sun starts to set, the natural beauty and serenity of Watch Hill will glow fiery pink and sorbet orange. There couldn’t be a more perfect ending to such a beautiful day.

There are various loops at this North Kingstown preserve where many go to see seals in the fall and spring.

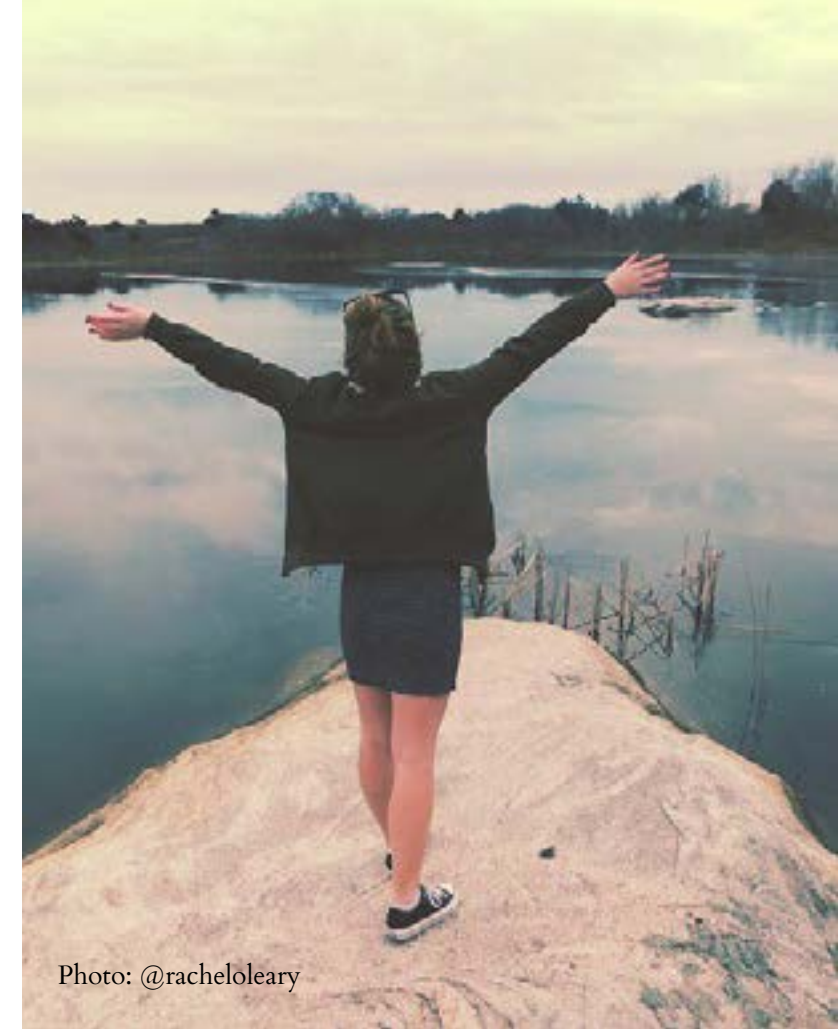

The warmest swim

Twenty public beaches line the hundred mile coastline in South County, Rhode Island. Tucked in between these public beaches are many more secret, more private beaches only the locals really know and those visitors who return year after year and have discovered

them, either by chance or by sheer determination to find them. Look around and you'll find people exploring the water any way they can – paddling, whether by kayak, canoe or stand-up paddle board. Paddle out to a sand bar and you have your own private oasis – perfect for a romantic picnic. Catch some live music down at the Ocean Mist in Matunuck or take the kids to the oldest continuously operated flying

to difficult, woodsy to coastal. You can easily explore a new trail every day you're here.

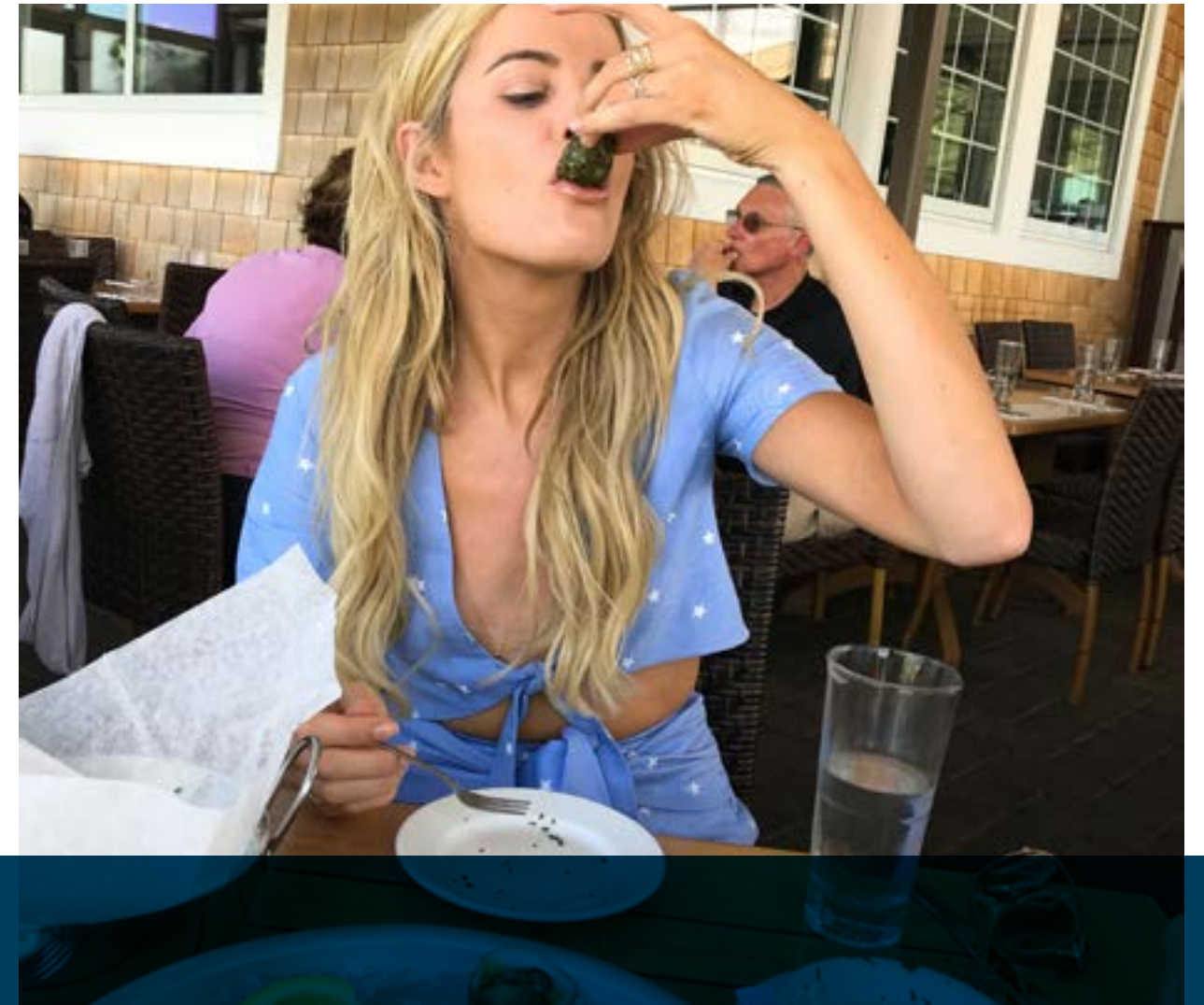

native Narragansett tribe. In Narragansett tour the Towers which are all that remains of the Narragansett Pier Casino and Resort from the late 19th century. The stunning building arches across Ocean Road and is now a popular wedding venue. During a storm, when the waves are high is the best time to watch surfers on Narragansett Town Beach.

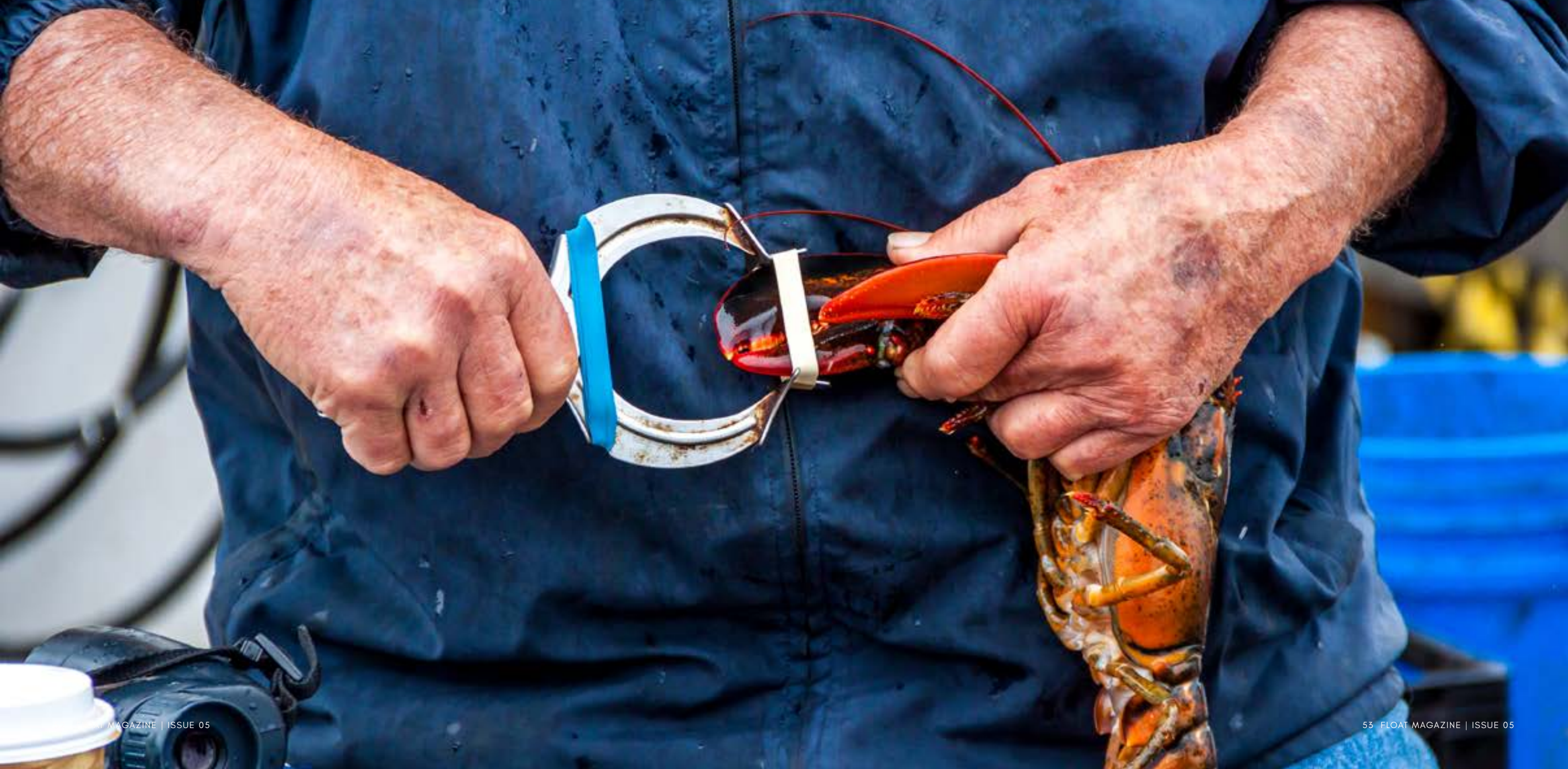
Dine on fresh, local seafood as often as you can. At the famous Matunuck Oyster Bar, the oysters are harvested right from the pond outside and the vegetables are all organically grown on a farm nearby. The Coast Guard House offers breathtaking ocean views and fresh seafood as does George's of Galilee. While in Galilee, visit the docks and pick up some lobsters fresh off the boat

directly from the lobstermen. You can also book a fishing charter for the day and catch your own fresh fish or try digging for clams at one of our many salt ponds. Nothing beats the satisfaction of catching your own dinner.

Summer definitely lingers longer in South County, Rhode Island. I'd say the best month to visit is September.

HOOKED

on a Feeling





Fresh seafood is abundant in South County, Rhode Island. You'll find you can order local favorites such as lobster, clams, calamari, scallops and cod at almost every restaurant. Did you know that more pounds of squid are brought to shore in Rhode Island than any other seafood and that Rhode Island accounts for 54% of all squid landings in the northeast? That's how calamari became the state's official appetizer.

This all happens in the bustling port of Galilee in Narragansett. Here you can buy fresh lobster right on the docks from local lobstermen. Crabs are also readily available, as are other fish.

Fishing charters leave Galilee daily if you prefer to catch your own - and once you catch you're first fish we promise you'll be hooked - pardon the pun. Full day, half day, off-shore and night fishing charters are available from several different companies including Frances Fleet, C-Devil Sport Fishing, Snappa and more. Night fishing is when you reel in striped bass, bluefish and there are special trips for squid. Off shore fishing is for big game fish such as different kinds of tuna - albacore, yellowfin, bluefin, mahi-mahi and more. You can also hook sharks, mako, thresher, hammerhead - all promise a good fight. Mako and thresher are also good for eating. Your catch can be cooked for you at George's of Galilee by request.

Clams are abundant in South County's salt ponds. Clamming is a fun and easy activity the whole family can participate in. If you're a visitor, start on the RI DEM website and get your recreational shellfishing license. Salt ponds are tucked away in every part of South County - use a rake and a bucket or dig with your feet the way the locals do. It's easy and fun and at the end of the day you'll have enough for a whole meal.

You can also fish just about anywhere in region. Drop a line in a pond, river or ocean and relax as you wait for those fish to bite!

Tomaquag Museum

Explore Indigenous Culture

The Tomaquag Museum was founded in 1958 by Mary E. Glasko, better known as Princess Red Wing of the Narragansett/Pokanoket-Wampanoag tribes. It is Rhode Island's first and only Indigenous Museum. With the help of friend and colleague, anthropologist Eva Butler, they opened the Tomaquag Museum in Eva's private home in Tomaquag Valley, a hamlet in Ashaway. Eva Butler provided a broad collection of Indigenous belongings from across America and Princess Red Wing supplied her cultural knowledge to deliver public tours from a first-person perspective.

After the passing of Eva Butler in 1969, Tomaquag Museum relocated to Exeter RI, adjacent to the then renowned Dovecrest Restaurant, serving Indigenous cuisine and owned by Ferris and Eleanor Dove of the Narragansett Tribe.

In 1997, the Board reorganized and began programming for schools and organizations. Lorén Spears became the Executive Director in 2003 and

has continued growing the organization.

In 2016 the Tomaquag Museum was awarded the National Medal for Museum and Library Service, the nation's highest honor given to museums and libraries for service to the community. Tomaquag is the first and only museum in Rhode Island to have been presented this prestigious award.

Visitors to the museum can learn about indigenous culture. There are several different tours and experiences available for adults and some geared specifically towards youth. The museum is happy to customize an experience specifically for you or your group. Experience the museum via an interactive program kicked off by a welcoming social dance, go on a game tour that explores Eastern woodland games and their spiritual and cultural significance. Most popular is a guided nature hike through the beautiful Arcadia Management Area to explore indigenous plants and discover their traditional uses by the Narragansett People. Art

workshops will teach you how to make dream catchers, corn husk dolls, beaded jewelry, trinket baskets and more. Your custom tour can also include storytelling, cultural education and film.

Youth tours feature a scavenger hunt through the museum exhibits and can also be customized with any of the options available for adults.

There is no better way to learn about indigenous culture than from the people themselves and to immerse yourself in their history for a few hours. You will come away with a deeper appreciation of the region and the people who inhabited South County long before white settlers came. It's a great educational experience recommended for children as well as adults.

Next door, the newly restored United Theatre that was a historic vaudeville house dating back to 1926, now serves as a vibrant hub for the arts. You’ll find a state of the art theater, with comfortable seating and an excellent snack bar.

This year, the United Theatre launched Nashville North, a passion project spearheaded by Scott Swift (yes, Taylor’s dad) to create a musical pipeline between Nashville’s iconic Bluebird Cafe, Country Music Hall of Fame & Museum, and Westerly, RI’s historic United Theatre (just minutes from Taylor’s house in Watch Hill, RI).

The Bluebird Café — where stars from superstar Swift to Garth Brooks started out — will bring Nashville singer-songwriters to the United starting in November. The quarterly performances here will be similar to the Bluebird’s famed “In the Round” series, where artists not only perform their music but also talk about the process of writing the songs. These “In the Round” programs have moved beyond Nashville to Santa Fe, Sundance and London, but not to the Northeast until now.

The Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum’s Words & Music program will be used by the United Music School. UMS educators spent a day at the museum learning how to integrate the Words & Music curriculum into the Westerly venue’s After School Arts program. The latter is a free arts education program for Westerly Middle School students. The new curriculum helps students create song lyrics, and then, during a virtual workshop, the students will be paired with a Nashville songwriter who will develop those lyrics into completed songs. This also perfectly aligns with Southwest Airline’s new direct flights from Nashville to Providence, RI.

Together, The United Theatre and The Cafe offer a perfect evening out, beginning with a meal at The Cafe followed by a performance or cinema experience at The United Theatre. Both locals and visitors are invited to partake in this rich cultural and culinary partnership.

A Taste of South County

Matunuck Oyster Bar's Clear Broth Clam Chowder

Ingredients

- 8 pounds small quahogs or large cherrystone clams
- 7 cups water
- 6 cups clam broth (from steaming) or 4 cups clam broth plus 2 cups bottled clam juice
- 3 slices thick-sliced bacon, cut into ¼inch cubes
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 medium-size onions, cut into ¼inch cubes
- 3 ribs celery, cut into ¼inch cubes
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 pounds Yukon Gold or other all-purpose potatoes, peeled and cut into ¼inch pieces
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh Italian parsley
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh chives
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh dill
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

Instructions:

Scrub the clams and rinse them clean. Add 7 cups of water to a large stockpot fitted with a steamer basket or colander, and bring to a boil. Add half the clams to the basket and cover. Steam until the clams open, 5 to 10 minutes. (Discard any clams that don't open.) Repeat with the second batch of clams. Reserve 6 cups of the broth. Set aside.

Cool the clams; remove the meat from the shells and dice it into ¼inch pieces. Keep them covered and refrigerated until ready to use. Put the bacon in a 5- to 7-quart pot over medium heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until golden brown, about 10 minutes. Pour off all but 1 tablespoon of the bacon fat, leaving the bacon in the pot. Reduce the heat to medium-low. Add the butter, onions, celery, and bay leaves, and cook, stirring occasionally, until the onions are softened but not browned, 6 to 8 minutes. Add the potatoes and reserved clam broth to the pot. Continue cooking over medium heat until the chowder begins to simmer. If it begins to boil, reduce the heat slightly. Cook until the potatoes are tender, about 15 minutes.

Just before serving, remove the pot from the heat, stir in the clams and herbs, discard the bay leaves, and season to taste with salt and pepper.

Serve hot.

Coast Guard House Mudslide
