

Photographing Your Property for Film Production

- 1. You must be the owner of the property or have the owner's permission to lease it for production.
- 2. If your property is part of an HOA or gated community, those entities must agree with filming.
- 3. Properties currently for sale will not be accepted.
- 4. If remodeling, please wait until work is complete before submitting photos.
- 5. You may submit up to 20 photos. Professional photos are not required, but dark or poorly focused photos will not be accepted, nor will those that are too small or low-resolution.
- 6. Files must be in JPG or PNG format, properly rotated before submitting.
- 7. Photo files should not exceed 5MB each, and high resolution, at least 1920x1080.
- 8. Do not submit video clips, screen captures, or brochures.
- 9. Provide a good overview of your property in good weather, when sun is not directly overhead.
- 10. Include exterior, interior, view from the street. Shoot WIDE to capture as much detail of the area as possible.
- 11. Include interior pictures of the property and label them accordingly (living room, kitchen, great room, master suite). Note any areas where interior filming is not allowed.
- 12. Include photos of any rooms that you include in your description (barn, pool, etc.).
- 13. Concentrate on unique features and rooms, even if they aren't traditionally aesthetically pleasing. You never know what a production might need.
- 14. Describe your property: Write a descriptive title ("1910 Creole Cottage") and add detail to the listing – square footage, architectural style, year built, number of bedrooms, special features.
- 15. We will review your photos and, if approved, your property will be added to our online locations database. You can opt to make your property viewable by photos only, without displaying your contact information or address.
