

Where To Start?

Fishing by the Numbers

444 miles

The Susquehanna River flows approximately 444 miles through the states of Pennsylvania, Maryland, and New York.

16th Largest

The Susquehanna is the largest river on the East Coast and ranks as the 16th largest in the entire United States.

The Susquehanna is connected to many well-known bodies of water such as the Chesapeake Bay, Otsego Lake, and the Wiconisco Creek.

Safety

All boat operators are required to have an approved life jacket on board for each person. 80% of boating fatalities happen when boaters are not wearing a life jacket.

Children 12 years and younger who are on a boat that is 20 feet or less in length, and children in all canoes and kayaks MUST wear a life jacket. All water skiers, personal watercraft operators, windsurfers, and anyone being towed behind a vessel must also wear a life jacket.

Boating and alcohol do not mix. It is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance. Penalties include loss of boating privileges, significant fines, and imprisonment. For a complete PA Boating Handbook, contact the PA Fish and Boat Commission.



Fish For FREE Days

There are two days during the year when you do not need a fishing license to fish in PA's waterways. In 2011, those two days are Memorial Day and Labor Day. 




Susquehanna River and Lake Augusta

Fish: Smallmouth Bass, Catfish, Walleye, Muskellunge, Carp, Panfish

At approximately 444 miles long, it is the longest river on the American East Coast. The broad, shallow waters also make the Susquehanna the longest, non-commercially navigable river in the country.

Lake Augusta is the body of water created by the Adam T. Bower Dam. When the dam is fully inflated in late spring through early fall, it raises the water level an average of 6 feet in the main body of Lake Augusta and tapers off to a few feet at the uppermost reaches of the approximately 4-milelong impoundment.

Shikellamy State Park offers transient slips for daily rental.







Penns Creek

Fish: Trout in western portion, Smallmouth Bass in eastern portion

Penns Creek was voted one of "America's Top 100 Trout Steams" and continues to be publicized due to its great fishing. The major reason why this creek is so popular is its large Green Drake hatch May through June. Penns Creek is known for its inconsistent waters ranging from still to some of the most rapid moving waters in the entire state. Penns Creek ranks among the very top in fly fishing within the state of Pennsylvania.





Faylor Lake and Walker Lake

Fish: Walleye, Pickerel, Carp, Panfish, Catfish, Largemouth Bass

Walker Lake, a 239-acre impoundment lake, is owned and managed by the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission. Paddle and electric boats are permitted. Walker Lake is a warm water/cold water fishery and all species of fish are managed under statewide regulations for Commonwealth Inland Waters. The Commission stocks the lake with northern pike and walleye fingerling.

Fish habitat structures have been placed in the lake over the years as part of the Commission's Cooperative Fish Habitat Improvement Program.

Nearby Faylor Lake is a 140-acre impoundment lake near Beaver Springs.



Halfway Lake and Rapid Run

Fish: Trout

The focal point of R.B. Winter State Park in Mifflinburg is Halfway Lake, which is filled by spring-fed mountain streams and contained by a handlaid, native sandstone dam. Open year round, the park provides diverse opportunities for recreation.

The park is a cold water fishery, stocked with brown, rainbow and brook trout. With the exception of the swimming area, the lake and its tributary streams are open to public fishing. The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission stock the lake and Rapid Run regularly during the season. Many anglers gather near the sandstone dam or the fishing pier.



Weiser State Forest (Roaring Creek Tract) South Branch Roaring Creek

Fish: Trout

The Roaring Creek Tract is located within the Weiser State Forest, off of Route 54, outside of Elysburg and Bear Gap. A large valley extends eastward from Shamokin Creek for a distance of 16 miles, and is bounded on either side by continuous mountain chains, Big Mountain being on the south and Little Mountain on the north. Through this valley flows the water of the South Branch of Roaring Creek. The South Branch of Roaring Creek begins at the head of this valley and flows westward about 10 miles before it breaks through Little Mountain at a point known as Bear Gap.

Hiking, hunting, fishing, canoeing, kayaking, electric powered boating, biking, wildlife watching, nature study, and cross-country skiing are all encouraged. All tributary streams as well as the lakes are catch and release only.

Licensing


A license, which must be displayed on an outer garment while fishing, is required for all people 16 years of age and older. Licenses can be purchased from approximately 1,000 license-issuing agents across the state. Licenses can also be purchased online.

All anglers should thoroughly review the Fish and Boat Commission's PA Fishing Summary, which clearly outlines PA's fishing regulations and laws, prior to fishing.
