



- **Hopworks Urban Brewery – Vancouver IPA (affectionately known as VIPA)**
 - Our Vancouver brewery's flagship IPA celebrates the West Coast IPA! Laid down on a backbone of two-row and Munich malt, VIPA combines classic NW IPA flavors of pine and citrus with a strong tropical fruit dankness thanks to the combination of cascade, amarillo and mosaic hops.

- **The Heavy Metal Brewing Co. – Move to the Couve for the Beer (NE Hazy IPA)**
 - Why else would you want to be here, except for the awesome beers. We brewed this Hazy to be full bodied and super juicy. Adding copious amounts of Idaho 7, Azaca and Sabro for that Island fruit forward flavor you've come to love. We think you'll be glad you came here when you drink this beer or two!!! (6.9% ABV, 45 IBU)

- **Fortside Brewing Co. – Couve A'licious (Brown Ale)**
 - Old world meets our town: Couve A'licious is a dry but decadent, rich yet refreshing, and, well yes, delicious quaff designed to take one of the penultimate English beer styles to the next level here in our burgeoning beer mecca of Vancouver, WA. An impeccably layered grain bill transports the roasty, toasty, and caramelized flavors of traditional English specialty malts to our Pacific shores, weathered by a calm and clean fermentation and just enough bitterness to balance the eternal waves of malty goodness. Across the ponds and prairies, all those amber waves of grain, not to mention the mountain vistas, Couve A'licious elevates the brown ale to the heights of our beloved Pacific Northwest. (5.2% ABV, 21 IBU)

- **Loowit Brewing Co. – Two-Sixteen Red Ale**
 - Representing Vancouver, Washington's vast outdoor recreation opportunities and natural beauty, Two-Sixteen is a beautifully balanced, easy drinking red ale named for the Forest Service's trail designation for the Loowit Trail that circles the base of Loowit (Mount St. Helens).

- **Mt. Tabor Brewing – The Pub – Bridge Lifter IPA**
 - A classic Northwest style IPA with a huge hop aroma, nice bitter bite, and light malt undertones, Bridge Lifter speaks to the camaraderie within the beer community and those that crossed the Columbia River to be a part of Vancouver. The Interstate Bridge is a recognizable symbol of the border between Vancouver, WA and Portland, OR.

➤ **Barlows Brewery – Kiggins Kreme Ale**

- Light-bodied and highly quaffable, this historical ale brings together the best of the Kolsch and Pilsner styles, imported to North America by German immigrants in the late 1800s. US-grown flaked maize and German-grown Hersbrucker hops combine to create subtle grainy sweetness offset by light floral and spice accents. Raise a glass to the rich history of Vancouver and the people and passion that makes it great – cheers! (5% ABV, 10 IBU)

➤ **Trap Door Brewing – Cruise the Couve Session Pale Ale**

- Low in alcohol but big on hops. Named after a beloved summer event that takes place on Main Street, Cruise the Couve is a drinkable IPA that does not compromise on the hop profile. This easy drinking beer is light, crisp, and refreshing with notes of citrus and tropical fruits jumping out of the glass.

➤ **Trusty Brewing – 1867 Rauchbier & Big River Brown Ale**

- The 1867 Rauchbier is a traditional German Smoke beer made with smokey malt and Crystal hops. It is named in honor of the Vancouver Fire Department, which was founded on January 1, 1867.
- The Big River Brown Ale is made with chocolate malt and nugget hops. It is named in honor of the local Chinook Indians as Big River is their name for the Columbia River.

➤ **Railside Brewing – Coast Starlight Red IPA**

- Named after the Amtrak line that runs from Seattle to Los Angeles (and of course stops in Vancouver), the Coast Starlight Red IPA is a heavily Dry Hopped beer with Centennial, Cascade and Citra hops. The beer is incredibly citrus forward, balanced with hints of toffee and bread. Coast Starlight is one of the most scenic train routes, and like IPAs, it is intrinsic to the PNW. (6.2% ABV)
