A Century of Wild Pony Preservation

itting with my toes buried in the cool sand and admiring a sky streaked in brilliant hues of orange and pink, I listen to the waves break

rhythmically on the shoreline. As the sun rises over the horizon, excitement begins to build amongst the few hundred people that woke well before dawn to witness a spectacular sight. This is no ordinary beach vacation, but the kickoff to one of Virginia's most unique experiences — the Chincoteague Pony Swim.

This annual event funds the care and protection for wild ponies that roam the marshes and maritime forests of the Eastern Shore. The animals gained fame following the 1947 children's novel "Misty of Chincoteague" (and the 1961 movie of the same title), but species.

the wild ponies have inhabited the area for centuries; historians theorize that the ponies are descendants of Spanish mustangs washed ashore after a catastrophic shipwreck.

Established in 1925, the Pony Swim was organized by the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company to solve several emerging problems; a small-town budget spread too thinly, an exponentially-increasing pony population, and the protection of local habitats for rare and endangered

This weeklong event includes the sunrise beach walk, a nightly carnival, and a raffle to win your very own Chincoteague pony, but the signature event — the Pony Swim — is the biggest draw for

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




Hours before the swim is scheduled to begin (the Coast Guard makes the ultimate call for when to start based off the tides), I join the media crews on the dock located at the end of the appropriately-named Pony Swim Lane. Despite high water levels from a week of rainy conditions, thousands of people stand along the marshy shores, some knee-deep in mud and missing shoes from their trek through the challenging terrain. The anticipation is palpable, and I witness a comradery of sorts among the crowd; instead of grumbling about the less-than-ideal weather, attendees give each other a hand to cross the swamplike areas of the shore, laughing together about missing footwear and reminiscing on pony swims past.

Finally, red smoke begins to rise over the water — the signal for the start of the swim — and 20 minutes later, I spot the first ponies as they come into view. Only their heads break the surface of the water, and the moving herd is surrounded by Saltwater Cowboys atop their own horses. These local men and women spend years learning the skill of corralling swimming ponies, often following in the footsteps of their parents, grandparents, and even great-grandparents.

The crowd waits for hours for the swim to begin, but the actual crossing only takes about five minutes. As the herd reaches the shore, the announcer notes the first foal to swim to safety and crowns him or her (her in the case of the 2024 swim) King or Queen Neptune. This foal is raffled off to one lucky winner at the end of the carnival.

The ponies rest for about an hour, then the journey continues toward the fairgrounds in a parade through downtown Chincoteague. Residents and visitors line the streets to get a closer look at the beautiful wild creatures (at one point, a pony escapes the guard of the Saltwater Cowboys to trot casually into a backyard). Eventually, the ponies are all safely transported to the fenced fields of the fairgrounds, where they are examined, given veterinary care when necessary, and vaccinated against illnesses.

The cowboys mark 150 of the ponies to return to the wild, which is the maximum number allowed through the national wildlife refuge's permit, and choose foals that will be sold during the auction the following day. The ponies are coveted by equestrian enthusiasts from around the country, and prize ponies, such as descendants of Misty, sell for tens of thousands of dollars. Not only do these sales maintain the legally-allowed wild pony population, but the auction also helps fund the herd's veterinary care throughout the rest of the year.

The entire week is a blur of pony mania; I love every minute of the action, and am eagerly anticipating the magic of next year. While this swim was an incredible experience, 2025 marks the 100th anniversary of the Chincoteague Pony Swim, and undoubtedly this centennial celebration will be one for the books.

A Century of Coastal Opulence

he Roaring Twenties were an era of wide economic disparities and wild social changes in response to Prohibition, and nowhere exemplified these trends better than Virginia Beach's Historic Cavalier Hotel. Officially opened in 1927, the original resort spanned 350 acres along the waterfront and included a 290-acre golf course, a luxurious indoor swimming pool filled with filtered sea water, a private train depot with direct routes from America's biggest cities, and the opulent Beach Club.

During the peak of Big Band music, this oceanfront club brought the biggest performers, from Frank Sinatra to Ella Fitzgerald. Over the decades, the historic hotel also attracted the rich and famous; F. Scott Fitzgerald was allegedly inspired to write "The Great Gatsby" after his visit, and 10 U.S. presidents stayed here over the 20th century.

Today, the renovated Cavalier is back to drawing huge celebrity guests. Although it has only been open since 2018, the hotel has already hosted stars such as Pharrell, Jimmy Buffett, Pusha T, and Gwen Stefani. With celebrities returning to the historic luxury hotel, it's safe to say that this decade is yet another booming

My goal was to make wine more approachable and exciting for consumers through special events, introducing a line of canned wines, and sharing the magic of the settings in which wine is enjoyed.

In addition to tastings and tours, many Virginia wineries are now offering unique experiences to bring in new audiences, allowing visitors to sample some of the best Virginia wines in a fresh and interesting way!

King Family Vineyards hosts its Roseland Polo event every Sunday from Memorial Day weekend until October. Reserve a spot and bring a tent, the family, and snacks as a wine cart makes its rounds. This approach brings in people of every age to enjoy everything good wine should be about — family, friends, and good times! Their Crose wine is a particular favorite, as the rosé embodies the spirit of wine, horses, friends, and family on a warm summer afternoon.

Veritas Vineyards & Winery offers vineyard tours on horseback, providing a leisurely ride through the grapes with an awe-inspiring backdrop of the Blue Ridge Mountains. In the summer, the winery's Starry Nights series features live performances, local food truck fare, and delicious Veritas wines throughout the day and into the evening. Veritas also hosts a supper series featuring chefs from across the country.

I recently attended one such open-fire dinner led by Chef Sarah Rennie, a private chef who collaborated with Veritas. The experience was incredible, to say the least — each course was paired with an amazing wine selection that brought out the flavors of the dish. As the fireflies and hanging lights blended together, the strawberry full moon peeked over the Blue Ridge Mountains, creating an unforgettable ambiance.

If you love cooking, Pippin Hill Farm's cooking class experience is a must. Greeted with a glass of wine, you'll take in the beautiful backdrop of the Blue Ridge Mountains and roll up your sleeves under the guidance of Pippin Hill Head Chef Tori Cosner. She will take you on a tour of the garden, where you'll gather fresh ingredients, and then it's off to the kitchen to prep and cook the food (and, of course, drink some marvelous wine). Once we did our part, it was time to let the professionals do their magic and cook the rest of the meal. With a familystyle dinner and wine being poured, the evening was filled with laughs, memories, good food, and great wine.

Boxwood Winery offers the very interesting experience of sitting in a wine cave built into a hillside, seemingly underground, surrounded by aging wine barrels. This tasting experience includes a small cheese board and wines to pair. Make sure to bring a jacket as the temperature in the wine cave is a cool 55 degrees.

This new approach of pairing Virginia wines with one-of-a-kind experiences is drawing travelers from all over the world, and the special events scene has also been bringing in new demographics to Virginia wineries. Events like Daze of Rosé, Two Up Wine Down, and The Neptune Wine Festival have broadened the idea of what wine drinkers look like and how they drink, making it clear that wine is for everyone! Both events take place in Charlottesville, a mountain city along the Monticello Wine Trail. Daze of Rosé kicks off the spring season and includes the best rosé Virginia has to offer, with attendees deciding on the





favorite. Two Up Wine Down takes place in October during Virginia Wine Month, and highlights Black and brown wine lovers and those in the industry doing great things for the wine community. The Neptune Wine Festival in Virginia Beach takes place every year at the end of May with all the food and wine that you can eat and drink (not to mention, it's at the beach!).

The Virginia wine scene has a lot to offer, and there are so many great things about this blooming and booming industry that can't be ignored. From wine shops like Penny's in Richmond to brunch at CrossKeys on a late Sunday morning, there is no shortage of ways to experience Virginia wine. Special events? We've BOXWOOD WINERY

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

VIRGINIA OYSTER TRAIL


A trail centered along the Chesapeake Bay that showcases eight distinct oyster regions and the culinary delicacy harvested from Virginia's waters.

All Aboard for Gorgeous Views From Virginia's Historic Railway

taunton is one of the oldest cities west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, with the first settlers arriving in the 1720s. But it wasn't until the late 1800s and the establishment of the Virginia Central Railroad that Staunton became a thriving hub for commerce. From the 1870s to the 1920s, the town saw a drastic boom in population, investment, and construction - and the railroad was at the forefront of it all.

While train travel became less popular with the advent of airlines, the joy of traveling by rail can still be felt in Staunton. The Virginia Scenic Railway offers two regular routes-one heading west through the Shenandoah Valley, traversing George Washington and Jefferson National Forests, and the other winding east and passing through the Blue Ridge Tunnel. Each experience takes place on historic trains originally built in the mid-1900s and renovated with modern amenities. Your ticket includes a delicious meal with dessert and unlimited non-alcoholic drinks in a souvenir glass.

Take a ride on one of these scenic train adventures to travel back in time to the golden age of railroads in Staunton, Virginia.









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
