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Beer Garden blooms in the Village Square

Schuyler County is known as an innovative agricultural community. Lucky Hare Brewing Company and Finger Lakes Distilling are taking it a step further.



Stop by the Village Square once a month throughout the summer for the first-ever pop-up Beer Garden, featuring Glen Ale.

Glen Ale takes us back to the 1930s. It is a recreation of a beer that was brewed in Watkins Glen last century and was just released last month. Although the exact recipe was not available, Lucky Hare brewmasters used a recipe on-file, swapping out two ingredients to make this ale in a style that would have been popular in that era. Beer made during that time period was most often made from a corn and barley base. Lucky Hare Brewing uses New York-sourced products.

"Finger Lakes Distilling reached out to us to collaborate with them to recreate a beer that has historical significance to Watkins Glen," said Ian Conboy, Vice President. "It's a simple recipe of malted corn and 2 row from our friends at Murmuration Malts in Bloomfield. Glen Ale is super drinkable and refreshing with a touch of sweetness from the malted corn. It finishes light and crisp with an aby of only 4.3%."

The Beer Garden will be in the Village Square (at the intersection of Third St. and Franklin St.) on July 17, August 7, and September 10. In addition to Glen Ale (served on draft and in cans), an additional beer will be available on tap along with a variety of single cans.

ID will be required and seating may be limited. People are welcome to bring lawn chairs. Elf in the Oak will be on-site, serving paninis. Look forward to live music, too.

Deciding that one must "walk-the-talk" when encouraging others to take risks, Barb decided to pursue her doctorate (Drexel University) and then

take a position as an Academic Dean at Northern Virginia Community College, where she has been for the last six years.

"I appreciate how welcoming everyone was during my interview and as I was named to the position," said Dr. Canfield. "Community colleges should be places that promote a welcoming environment and Corning certainly is such a place."

Outside of work Dr. Canfield enjoys hiking, bicycling, kayaking, going to the theater and spending time with her husband Greg, and their dog JJ.



Melody master shares musical passion and hope for the community

On sweet Georgia Brown Two left feet and oh, so neat That's Sweet Georgia Brown

Sweet Georgia Brown is one of Ed Clute's favorite tunes. The melody. The lyrics. The spirit. Music, in general, Ed says, is joyful. But, like the namesake in Sweet Georgia Brown, this tune "knocks them dead."

"Music transports me," said Ed, who recently turned 78 years old. "I forget about people and me. I get so wrapped up in the music that I can hear music in my head ... even if it's not playing."

THE EARLY YEARS

Growing up on the "side hill" in Watkins Glen, Ed spent his childhood listening to Frankie Carle's rhythmic strides streaming from his family's Victrola and practicing at the piano. The grandson of Warren W. Clute Sr., former president and general manager of the Watkins Glen Salt Company (now Cargill Salt), Ed was inspired by his mother, Elizabeth Johnston Clute. He developed his own classical technique and studied various aspects of music – including theory and harmony – in high school. He learned to read regular Braille as well as Braille music at the Batavia School for the Blind, attended the Amherst Summer Music Center studying under Edwin Hymovitz, and performed the Schumann Piano Concerto as a guest artist with the Amherst Summer Music Center Youth Orchestra. After high school, Ed studied at the New England Conservatory of Music, where he earned a performance degree in piano. He also studied with Jean Casadesus and at the American Conservatory at Fontainebleau in France.

HIS CAREER

The combination of his mother's influence, his natural talent, and education set the stage for a lifelong musical career. He has played with such jazz greats and band leaders as Benny Goodman, Dick



Naylor, and Turk Murphy, sat in with the Mississippi Mudders and Jack Maheu, and played in Preservation Hall in New Orleans. In fact, he has been to New Orleans four times, participating in the Louis Armstrong Festival in 2010. Ed has performed Rhapsody in Blue with three different symphonies and has played at regional restaurants, including Pierces 1894, in Elmira, and the Belhurst Castle, in Geneva. In addition, he performed for live re-creations of old-time-radio shows at conventions around the country, providing live background music and bridges between the scenes in radio plays. Ed also composed music for a western series and produced a CD with Rivermont Records. In addition to performing, Ed is sought for his tuning skills, having worked with Miles and Mike Kaufman for a period. Today, he leads a Dixieland band – always securing top-notch talent, he says – and plays regularly at the Colonial Creamery (a Chamber member).

OUR COMMUNITY

"We need more culture in our community," said Ed, recalling a summer theatre at the high school in the 50s that drew famous artists. "We need more musical venues, and we need to bring all kinds of bands to Watkins Glen, rock, Dixieland, classical, really all genres. People need to be able to dance and really enjoy music. Music tells a story. It shares emotions. It can make us smile ... or cry."

Schuyler County leadership agrees. Watkins Glen Chamber Executive Director Michael Hardy is currently working with County Administrator Tim O'Hearn and the County Legislators to debut the Performing Arts Center, located at the Middle School Apartments, this fall.

Although Ed is too modest to admit his success, he knows what it took to achieve it.

"Hard work," said Ed. "Success can't come easily. The only way to be successful is with hard work."

From all perspectives, Ed, you've worked hard. Thank you for sharing your success with the world.

Seat belts save lives & "melons"



New York State was the first state in the nation to require adult front seat motor vehicle passengers to wear seat belts. In subsequent years, the law was amended to include child passenger safety requirements. On November 1, 2020, a provision was included to require all adult occupants to buckle up, regardless of where they sit in a passenger vehicle, taxi, livery, or a vehicle being used as a transportation network company, i.e. Lyft or Uber.

Although the NYS seat belt compliance rate is 94 percent, nearly one-third of all front seat occupants killed in a motor vehicle crash are unbuckled. The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee has partnered with eighth-generation watermelon farmer and NASCAR driver Ross Chastain to encourage all passengers to buckle up, every trip, every time through the Protect Your Melon campaign.
