The story of Greater Wilmington and the Brandywine Valley is a riveting tale of the past, the present and the future. It is a destination marked by sharp contrasts: town and garden, historic and hip, refined yet relaxed.



HISTORY MEETS DIVERSITY

Settled by the Swedes in 1638, the region is nestled at the confluence of three rivers: the Delaware, the Christina, and the Brandywine. Today, these waterways provide a scenic setting for its colorful communities, each with its own distinct personality. The region's rich diversity is celebrated

through its festivals and its food. African. Asian.

Caribbean, German, Greek, Hispanic, Italian, Irish, Peruvian, and Polish cultures are all represented here.

The City of Wilmington, with a population of just over 70,000, is the urban hub. With more than 66 percent of all Fortune 500 corporations incorporated in Delaware, it is known as the Corporate Capital of the World.

TOWN AND GARDEN

In the heart of the Mid-Atlantic region and less than a two-hour drive from both New York City and Washington D.C., this northernmost region of Delaware's most defining feature is the town and garden experience.

Presently, a downtown renaissance is underway in Wilmington. Nationallyacclaimed restaurants and a thriving arts and cultural scene — including the oldest continually operating theater on the Broadway circuit — share space with a diverse mix of retail. On and just off Market Street, the city's main thoroughfare, you'll find bespoke clothing, handmade leather goods, urban street wear, fine jewelry, and more.

A walkable distance from the heart of downtown, the city's riverfront district is a recreational mecca with arts and entertainment offerings, three hotels, more than 15 restaurants — most of which offer waterfront dining — Underground Railroad history, and a mile-and-a-half riverwalk. Its distinctive red-bricked Amtrak station, designed by Frank Furness, is named for Wilmington's own Joe Biden, the 46th President of the U.S. Currently in the development phase, the east side of the river includes a continuation of the riverwalk connected to the west side by a footbridge as well as more shopping and dining options.

As you head northwest from the city into the Brandywine Valley, the landscape transforms, transporting you to a different time and place. Here, elegant mansions and glorious gardens are a testament to the wealth and cultural influence of the du Pont family. Reminiscent of a "Downton Abbey" episode, each estate has its own story to tell: the gunpowder mill that started a dynasty, a fairy-tale inspired garden, a mini-Versailles, and fire-breathing fountains are some of the wonders that await.

MORE TO DISCOVER

Just down the Delaware River and connected to the City of Wilmington by the J.A.M. recreational trail, Historic New Castle is home to perfectly preserved Colonial-era homes and cobblestonelined streets. Fort Delaware, a former Confederate prison, towers over Pea Patch

Island. The charming neighborhood of Trolley Square; historic hamlets of Odessa, Centreville, and Greenville; and the college town of Newark are all filled with iconic restaurants and quaint shops.

Locally-owned craft breweries can be found throughout the region, and innovative artists and artisans push the envelope with thought-provoking pieces, continuing the Brandywine Valley's long tradition of creative innovation. Their works can be found in galleries and studios throughout the region.

The surrounding countryside remains pristine. Studded with boulders, relics of the Ice Age, these lands are crisscrossed with trails for hiking and biking. They also served as the inspiration for many artists, including several generations of the Wyeth family and the Brandywine School.

All of these experiences are so close to each other, giving visitors a wealth of options for exploration and discovery. Come and experience the many facets of this region. It will surprise you.

Wilmington and the Brandywine Valley's culinary scene is quickly becoming as diverse as the destination itself. The region is witnessing an influx of new culinary talent and gastronomic innovation. Hotspots like BARDEA STEAK, GO VEGAN PHILLY, THE HOUSE OF WILLIAM & MERRY, LE CAVALIER and SNUFF MILL have foodies talking. On any given night, you can dine at a "meat kingdom," an upscale French bistro, a cozy farmhouse, a hip hop-themed vegan joint or a centuryold former laboratory turned gourmet pizza place. Explore authentic global fare including Asian, Jamaican, Mediterranean, Mexican, Puerto Rican and Thai. The region's restaurants celebrate a diverse population (and palate!). Don't skip our food hall . . . or, should we say, food halls? With the success of **DE.CO**, the city's first food hall concept, Wilmington welcomes CHANCERY MARKET AT HERCULES PLAZA, an indoor-outdoor food hall offering fare from around the world. So, what are you waiting for? Dig in!

Join 10,000 music fans in July for the **LADYBUG MUSIC FESTIVAL**, the country's largest celebration of women in music. Experience the **AUGUST GUARTERLY FESTIVAL**, the oldest African American religious festival in the nation. That's just a sampling of our unique festival culture!

RICH IN DU PONT HISTORY

Part of what makes Greater Wilmington such a great travel destination is its many historic sites. Generations of the du Pont family helped to shape Delaware, neighboring Pennsylvania, and the nation, and over the decades their former estates have been transformed into museums, gardens and parks. Step into history at the **HAGLEY MUSEUM AND LIBRARY**,

where the du Pont's story begins on this continent. Marvel at the 90,000-piece collection of American decorative arts at **WINTERTHUR MUSEUM, GARDEN AND LIBRARY**. Or admire one of the world's most spectacular horticultural displays at **LONGWOOD GARDENS**. Meanwhile, **MT. CUBA CENTER** • is a botanical garden unlike any other. And **NEMOURS ESTATE** transports visitors to Europe with the largest and finest example of a formal French garden in North America.

THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Our seven state parks, scenic trails, and charming riverfront provide a wealth of amazing opportunities to cater to every kind of outdoor adventurer. Stand in three states at one time at **WHITE CLAY CREEK STATE PARK**, where you can also hike 37 miles of trails. And who says road trips require a car? With a landscape that includes the colonial streets of New Castle and the beautiful Riverfront Wilmington, biking the 7.9-mile **JACK A. MARKELL TRAIL** is an invigorating way to explore the area. Paddle at **LUMS POND STATE PARK**, home to Delaware's largest freshwater pond. Here you can find an unforgettable excursion

in nature, which includes kayaking, paddleboarding and canoeing. You can even zipline at **GO APE**, recently named one of the top five aerial adventure parks in the U.S. If you're ready to take your love for rock climbing on the road, get harnessed up and

climb **ALAPOCAS RUN STATE PARK**'s Blue Rock Cliff, the only natural rock-climbing wall in the state.

TRAVEL WITH YOUR TRIBE


With a mix of parks, museums, and history, family-fun activities are always available. The spectacular Stratosphere climbing structure at the **DELAWARE** CHILDREN'S MUSEUM is reason enough to visit. Discover unusual animals like the pudu — the second smallest deer species in the world — or the rare lemurs at the BRANDYWINE ZOO. The DELAWARE MUSEUM **OF NATURE & SCIENCE** has a collection of more than 2 million mollusks and bird eggs – one of the largest such collections in North America. The museum features new interactive galleries and the only permanent dinosaur exhibit in the state. After exploring on foot, hop aboard the WILMINGTON AND WESTERN RAILROAD

for one of its popular themed rides offered throughout the year, including the Princess Express, Superhero Express, Holiday Lights, and Santa Express. For families looking to get out on the water, sail the replica tall ship *KALMAR NYCKEL*, which doubles as a pirate-themed cruise (note: pirate tours are only offered during the summer). It's named for the ship that brought the first European settlers to the Delaware Valley in 1638.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE

Bardea Steak

Opened June 2022

Named by Vogue magazine as one of America's most anticipated restaurant openings of 2022, BARDEA STEAK is now open in downtown Wilmington. James Beard-nominated restauranteurs Scott Stein and chef Antimo DiMeo expanded their restaurant group to launch their latest concept, following the success of Bardea Food & Drink. Bardea Steak is

a modern take on a classic steakhouse. DiMeo often refers to the restaurant as a "meat kingdom," as it offers a variety of dry-aged and creatively aged meats prepared using an open-hearth, woodfire grill. The steak menu is remarkable, offering traditional cuts and premium rare slabs from the finest cuts of beef in the world. Its cosmopolitan courtyard is divided into dialog sections featuring coffee table fire pits, plantings and fairy lights. Bardea also has an extensive wine and craft cocktail program, with every drink made to order.

WILMA'S is Wilmington's first duckpin and dining concept. It features four lanes of duckpin bowling, retro arcade games, and a full-service Creole eatery specializing in New Orleans-style staples including gumbo, smoked alligator sausage sliders, shrimp and grits, and beignets. Cocktails here are not only cleverly named, but fun. Try the Monkey Gland, Corpse Reviver or Boulavardier.

Chancery Market at Hercules Plaza

Opened Fall 2022

This 12,000-square-foot culinary collective and bar features artisan concepts from across the globe, curated by award-winning chef and restaurateur Akhtar Nawab. Located on the north end of the city's central business district, the market is Wilmington's second food hall (DE.CO – the first food hall – opened in 2019). Guests can enjoy an outdoor seating area that's complemented by activities like chess and cornhole.

Peach Blossom Eatery

This diner-style restaurant on Main Street in the college town of Newark features an open kitchen with counter space, and it serves breakfast and lunch. The menu creates notable dishes like caramel pancakes; the scrapple sandwich (if you have to ask what scrapple is, well . . . you haven't been to Delaware!) with arugula and hot pepper jam; hashbrown-crusted quiche; and "The Greek Freak," featuring roasted lamb neck, caramelized onions and cucumber sumac yogurt. The restaurant also offers grab-and-go items such as pastries and hand pies.

HOTELS

The Quoin

Opened Fall 2022

Downtown Wilmington has welcomed its first luxury boutique hotel. The 24-room property is the latest addition to the thriving Market Street corridor, which features many dining experiences, art galleries and boutique retail. The historic two-story Victorian Romanesque brownstone includes three distinct culinary concepts: **THE QUOIN RESTAURANT**

focuses on fresh wood-fired fare that celebrates craftsmanship and simplicity; **THE QUOIN ROOFTOP** is the first rooftop bar and lounge in Wilmington serving as the perfect spot for social gatherings; and the hotel's craft cocktail lounge, speakeasy-style **SIMMER DOWN**,

Nation of Inventors Opened Fall 2022 HAGLEY

MUSEUM

& LIBRARY just opened its first

new permanent exhibition in 65 years. The two-floor exhibit celebrates the American spirit of ingenuity by taking visitors on a journey from the early years of the patent system



in the late 1700s all the way through to the late 1800s. Nearly 120 patent models will be on display in the exhibit, making Nation of Inventors the first largescale, permanent exhibition of patent models at any museum in the United States. The patent models on display reflect important topics and themes including women inventors, African American inventors, immigrant inventors, improvements in urban living, and the ways Americans have learned about and understood progress and change.



FORT DELAWARE STATE PARK

Delaware Museum of — Nature & Science

Reopened Spring 2022

Formerly the Delaware Museum of Natural History, this totally reimagined site aims to get visitors of any age excited about science and the world we live in. The museum is home to an array of innovative and interactive new displays, including the only permanent dinosaur exhibit in the state. The facility, which was closed for nearly 18 months, now offers exhibits focused on the environment and life both in Delaware and around the globe.

Fort Delaware State Park

Renovations completed in Spring 2022

Renovations to improve the visitor experience were completed just in time to kick off the park's 2022 season. These improvements include a reconstructed tram path that brings visitors to **PEA PATCH ISLAND**; paved park trails; a revamped and ADA-accessible heronry observation platform to view the island's various species of herons, egrets and ibis; and a screened pavilion. Built in 1859, **FORT DELAWARE** housed as many as 12,595 Confederate prisoners-of-war at one time during the Civil War.

Orchid House

Reopened Winter 2022 As part of the initial phase of the **"LONGWOOD REIMAGINED: A NEW**



GARDEN EXPERIENCE," its preservation of the century-old Orchid House has transformed into an open gallerylike space featuring

LONGWOOD GARDENS

The upgrades offer a stunningly immersive orchid-viewing experience allowing the area to showcase nearly 50 percent more orchids throughout the year. Orchids are Longwood's largest single collection, spanning 5,500 plants of diverse origin, size, floral display and color. Next up: a sweeping reimagination of 17 acres of its Conservatory and grounds will open in Fall 2024 and include surprising guest experiences, and new indoor and outdoor gardens.

Playhouse on Rodney Square

Renovations completed in Fall 2021 Patrons of this historic playhouse have been treated to an entirely new theatre experience. Located in the same building as the elegant HOTEL DU PONT, the 108-year-old Broadway-style touring house completed renovations in fall 2021. These included new and wider seats,

Every item is crafted by the designer in her Wilmington studio. McClintock is a Delaware native and self-taught leather craftswoman. As an avid supporter of the slow fashion movement, Liv produces many items that are one-of-a-kind and celebrate the vibrant diversity of the region.

Riverfront Revitalization

Currently in Development

Wilmington's eastern bank of the Christina River is undergoing a complete transformation. The \$100 million **RIVERFRONT EAST** overhaul will include cafes, restaurants, shopping and central recreational space. The footbridge will connect a new trail to the popular trail already on the west side. Riverfront Wilmington on the western bank is a hotspot that offers museums and attractions, a minor league baseball park, and hip dining experiences. 💕

BY TRAIN

The JOSEPH R. BIDEN, JR. RAILROAD STATION, also known as Wilmington Station, is one of the busiest in the country and offers dozens of options into Wilmington, including the Acela Express. Amtrak is the preferred and quickest option to the region from several locations including New York, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C.



BY PLANE

Downtown Wilmington is about 30 minutes from Philadelphia International Airport (PHL) and 90 minutes from Baltimore/ Washington International Airport (BWI).

BY CAR

Conveniently located along the Interstate 95 corridor, Wilmington and the Brandywine Valley are just a short distance from all points in the Mid-Atlantic region. Here's the approximate traveling time from several major markets:
