

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

The story of Greater Wilmington and the Brandywine Valley is a riveting tale of the past, the present and the future. It is a destination marked by sharp contrasts: town and garden, historic and hip, refined yet relaxed.

HISTORY MEETS DIVERSITY

Settled by the Swedes in 1638, the region is nestled at the confluence of three rivers: the Delaware, the Christina, and the Brandywine. Today, these waterways provide a scenic setting for its colorful communities, each with its own distinct personality. The region's rich diversity is celebrated through its festivals and its food. African, Asian.

Caribbean, German, Greek, Hispanic, Italian, Irish, Peruvian, and Polish cultures are all represented here.

The City of Wilmington, with a population of just over 70,000, is the urban hub. With more than 66 percent of all Fortune 500 corporations incorporated in Delaware, it is known as the Corporate Capital of the World.

TOWN AND GARDEN

In the heart of the Mid-Atlantic region and less than a two-hour drive from both New York City and Washington D.C., this northernmost region of Delaware's most defining feature is the town and garden experience.

Presently, a downtown renaissance is underway in Wilmington. Nationally-acclaimed restaurants and a thriving arts and cultural scene — including the oldest continually operating theater on the Broadway circuit — share space with a diverse mix of retail. On and just off Market Street, the city's main thoroughfare, you'll find bespoke clothing, handmade leather goods, urban street wear, fine jewelry, and more.

A walkable distance from the heart of downtown, the city's riverfront district is a recreational mecca with arts and entertainment offerings, three hotels, more than 15 restaurants — most of which offer waterfront dining — Underground Railroad history, and a mile-and-a-half riverwalk. Its distinctive red-bricked Amtrak station, designed by Frank Furness, is named for Wilmington's

own Joe Biden, the 46th President of the U.S. Currently in the development phase, the east side of the river includes a continuation of the riverwalk connected to the west side by a footbridge as well as more shopping and dining options.

As you head northwest from the city into the Brandywine Valley, the landscape transforms, transporting you to a different time and place. Here, elegant mansions and glorious gardens are a testament to the wealth and cultural influence of the du Pont family. Reminiscent of a "Downton Abbey" episode, each estate has its own story to tell: the gunpowder mill that started a dynasty, a fairy-tale inspired garden, a mini-Versailles, and fire-breathing fountains are some of the wonders that await.

MORE TO DISCOVER

Just down the Delaware River and connected to the City of Wilmington by the J.A.M. recreational trail, Historic New Castle is home to perfectly preserved Colonial-era homes and cobblestonelined streets. Fort Delaware, a former Confederate prison, towers over Pea Patch

Island. The charming neighborhood of Trolley Square; historic hamlets of Odessa, Centreville, and Greenville; and the college town of Newark are all filled with iconic restaurants and quaint shops.

Locally-owned craft breweries can be found throughout the region, and innovative artists and artisans push the envelope with thought-provoking pieces, continuing the Brandywine Valley's long tradition of creative innovation. Their works can be found in galleries and studios throughout the region.

The surrounding countryside remains pristine. Studded with boulders, relics of the Ice Age, these lands are crisscrossed with trails for hiking and biking. They also served as the inspiration for many artists, including several generations of the Wyeth family and the Brandywine School.

All of these experiences are so close to each other, giving visitors a wealth of options for exploration and discovery.

FIT FOR A FOODIE

Wilmington and the Brandywine Valley's culinary scene is quickly becoming as diverse as the destination itself. The region is witnessing an influx of new culinary talent and gastronomic innovation. Hotspots like BARDEA STEAK, THE BRANDYWINE AND BAR REVERIE, THE **HOUSE OF WILLIAM & MERRY. LE CAVALIER** and SNUFF MILL have foodies talking. On any given night, you can dine at a "meat kingdom," an upscale French bistro, a cozy farmhouse, a hip hop-themed vegan joint or a century-old former laboratory turned gourmet pizza place. Explore authentic global fare including Asian, Jamaican, Mediterranean, Mexican, Puerto Rican and Thai, The region's restaurants celebrate a diverse population (and palate!). Don't skip our food hall . . . or, should we say, food halls? **DE.CO** and the **CHANCERY MARKET** offer quick, gourmet bites that won't break the bank. So, what are you waiting for? Dig in!

Locations throughout the region bring significant stories to light, allowing visitors to reflect on an inspiring journey of hope and perseverance, including the CORBIT-SHARP HOUSE, the MITCHELL CENTER FOR AFRICAN AMERICAN HERITAGE. **NEW CASTLE COURT HOUSE MUSEUM,** THE REDDING HOUSE MUSEUM, and the TUBMAN-GARRETT RIVERFRONT PARK. While it's important to honor the impact of African Americans in the past, we're proud to celebrate the present, too. Experience the AUGUST QUARTERLY FESTIVAL, the oldest African American religious festival in the nation. That's just a sampling of our unique festival culture!

RICH IN DU PONT HISTORY

Generations of the du Pont family helped to shape Delaware, neighboring Pennsylvania, and the nation, and over the decades their former estates have been transformed into museums, gardens and parks. Step into history at the HAGLEY MUSEUM AND LIBRARY.

where the du Pont's story begins on this continent. Marvel at the 90,000-piece collection of American decorative arts at WINTERTHUR MUSEUM, GARDEN AND LIBRARY. Or admire one of the world's most spectacular horticultural displays at LONGWOOD GARDENS. Meanwhile, MT. CUBA CENTER

is a botanical garden unlike any other.

And **NEMOURS ESTATE** transports visitors to Europe with the largest and finest example of a formal French garden in North America.

THE GREAT **OUTDOORS**

Our seven state parks, scenic trails, and charming riverfront provide a wealth of amazing opportunities to cater to every kind of outdoor adventurer. Stand in three states at one time at WHITE CLAY CREEK STATE PARK, where you can also hike 37 miles of trails. And who says road trips require a car? With a landscape that includes the colonial streets of New Castle and the beautiful Riverfront Wilmington, biking the 7.9-mile JACK A. MARKELL TRAIL is an invigorating way to explore the area. Paddle at LUMS POND STATE PARK, home to Delaware's largest freshwater pond. Here you can find an unforgettable excursion

in nature, which includes kayaking, paddleboarding and canoeing.

TRAVEL WITH YOUR TRIBE

With a mix of parks, museums, and history, family-fun activities are always available. The spectacular Stratosphere climbing structure at the **DELAWARE CHILDREN'S MUSEUM** is reason enough to visit. Discover unusual animals like the pudu - the second smallest deer species in the world or the rare lemurs at the BRANDYWINE **ZOO.** The **DELAWARE MUSEUM OF NATURE** & SCIENCE has a collection of more than 2 million mollusks and bird eggs — one of the largest such collections in North America. The museum features interactive galleries and the only permanent dinosaur exhibit in the state. After exploring on foot, hop aboard the WILMINGTON AND **WESTERN RAILROAD** for one of its popular themed rides offered throughout the year, including the Princess Express, Superhero Express, Holiday Lights, and Santa Express. For families looking to get out on the water, sail the replica tall ship KALMAR NYCKEL, which doubles as a pirate-themed cruise (note: pirate tours are only offered during the summer). It's named for the ship that brought the first European settlers to the Delaware Valley in 1638. 🕊

BY TRAIN

The JOSEPH R. BIDEN, JR. RAILROAD STATION, also known as Wilmington Station, is one of the busiest in the country and offers dozens of options into Wilmington, including the Acela Express. Amtrak is the preferred and quickest option to the region from several locations including New York, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C.

BY PLANE

Downtown Wilmington is about 30 minutes from Philadelphia International Airport (PHL) and 90 minutes from Baltimore/ Washington International Airport (BWI). Fly directly into Wilmington via Avelo from Florida and other select southern locations.

BY CAR

Conveniently located along the Interstate 95 corridor, Wilmington and the Brandywine Valley are just a short distance from all points in the Mid-Atlantic region. Here's the approximate traveling time from several major markets:

- DOWNTOWN PHILADELPHIA 30 to 45 minutes
- LANCASTER, PENNSYLVANIA 1 hour, 15 minutes
- **DOWNTOWN BALTIMORE** 1 hour, 15 minutes
- ATLANTIC CITY
 1 hour, 30 minutes
- WASHINGTON
 1 hour, 45 minutes
- MIDTOWN MANHATTAN 2 hours, 15 minutes

TRANSPORTATION IN AND AROUND GREATER WILMINGTON

Lyft, Uber, cabs, car rental agencies, DART public transportation system, and Zip Car are all available to transport individuals and groups of all sizes around the region.
