# The Woodlands Waterway Arts Festival

## A Springtime Tradition in The Woodlands

When artists and art enthusiasts first gathered in Town Green Park for The Woodlands Waterway Arts Festival, The Woodlands Waterway was only a few years old. The area was still being built – there was no Waterway Square, only a handful of businesses, and swan boats were still a dream of the future.

"The thought was to activate The Waterway with a big, signature event," said Nick Wolda, Co-Founder of The Woodlands Arts Council and President of Visit The Woodlands. "I was part of the Town Center Improvement District at that time, and it was our job to bring people to The Woodlands for shopping, dining, hospitality and entertainment."

It was 2005, and The Woodlands had just turned 31. Known as a great place to live, it wasn't necessarily seen as a must-visit destination. What better way to draw in travelers from around Texas than an arts festival along the new waterway?

Fast forward 18 years, and The Woodlands Waterway Arts Festival has become one of the top-ranked arts festivals in the nation. It's grown from an initial 5,000 attendees in 2006 to an impressive 23,000 in 2022. Locals and visitors both regard it as a long-standing springtime tradition, and time and time again, the community has voted it the best event in The Woodlands.

Best of all, many of the volunteers who brought the event to life in 2006 are the same ones who spend time and effort transforming The Woodlands Waterway into a beautiful waterfront art gallery during the festival today. Jenny Carattini-Wright, now Executive Director of The Woodlands Arts Council, first began working with The Woodlands Waterway Arts Festival as a volunteer.

"I came into (The Woodlands Waterway Arts Festival) because I really wanted to participate, share my love of art and culture, and see what we could do to make it grow," Carattini-Wright said. "It was definitely a small, hometown effort – just as it still is today. The whole community came together to make it happen."

According to Carattini-Wright, between 500 to 1,000 artists apply to be part of the arts festival every year. A jury of professionals reviews the applications using a scoring system, and the 200 artists with the highest scores are invited to come showcase their work at the festival. Clay, ceramics, painting, photography, sculpture, jewelry, fiber – the best of the best, all right here in The Woodlands.

Once all of the artists are selected, partnerships are developed, performers are booked, and every aspect of the festival is planned out, The Woodlands Arts Council makes the weekend one to remember with the help of 400 to 600 volunteers.

Local families return to see art along The Waterway every spring, and Carattini-Wright says guests often drive in from Austin, Dallas, San Antonio, and beyond. The vision that inspired the festival – to establish a signature event that celebrates art in The Woodlands, attracting artists and art enthusiasts from across the nation to the iconic Woodlands Waterway- has become reality. And with the help of the community, it has thrived.

# Sit and Stay a While

The Woodlands has one of the largest collections of public art in Texas, and some of most unique - and practical pieces - are the art benches. If you've walked along The Woodlands Waterway or the shore of Lake Woodlands at Hughes Landing, you've probably seen a few. Last year, six new art benches were added to the collection, bringing the total number of art benches in The Woodlands to 30.

These benches were created by local, national, and international artists with different styles and techniques. Each bench was underwritten by a local business or individual who filled out a questionnaire about their personal feelings toward the location of their bench. Artists then used this questionnaire to develop designs for the bench, and the underwriter chose which design resonated with them the most.

The art benches are a project of The Woodlands Arts Council, a non-profit organization with the mission to promote public art and the creative economy. Read the backstory behind the new six art benches, then take a stroll and experience their beauty firsthand.

### **1** Seated with Santiago Artist: Michael O'Brien

The looming waves on the back of this bench are a reminder of the impact that we can all have if we push forward through our hardships, continue to swim, and rise above the water.

### **2** Sound of Healing

Artists: Michelle Old, Kevin Giuseppetti, Stacy 5 Angel Wings Moore, and Derek Giuseppetti

This bench symbolizes the journey to healing that patients experience at Memorial Hermann The Woodlands. The windchimes ring out as wind blows underneath the bench, reminiscent of the tradition of ringing the bell at the end of cancer treatments.

### **3** State of Texas

Artist: Carolina Gonzales

The art bench brings together classic western design with a Texas-shaped metal piece that's painted like a turquoise gem, and the live edge cedar bench seat.

### **4** Discovery Art Bench

Artists: Michelle Old, Kevin Giuseppetti, Stacy Moore, and Derek Giuseppetti

This art bench is meant to express that there are always wonders to explore and the three sets of blocks speak to the three different cognitive skills: recognize, see, and feel.

### Artist: Jim Weitzel

Further north along The Waterway, A beautiful bench that's as eye-catching as it is touching. Look on the back of this bench for a heartfelt poem, written by underwriter Maria Holmes.

### **6** Free Spirit

Artist: Paul Reimer

Feathers symbolize different things in a variety of cultures. A reminder that no matter your age or culture, you can experience lightness and freedom.

We talked to Josie Lewis, Director of Sales, to learn more about how she and her team help meeting planners develop successful events and generate a large economic impact for The Woodlands.

### Q: Why are meetings vital to The Woodlands?

A: It supports our local businesses and brings in a significant amount of sales tax and hotel occupancy tax dollars, which gives more opportunity for The Woodlands to develop. The more people we have coming in and spending money at our local businesses and attractions, the more we are able to attract new business and create a better quality of life for our residents.

### Q: What is Global Meetings Industry Day, and why is it important?

A: GMID is an international day of advocacy highlighting the impact meetings and events bring to a destination. This year it falls on March 30, and our team is using this opportunity to push the critical message that Meetings Matter. In 2021, over 1,200 professional meetings and events took place in The Woodlands, which brought in \$14.2 million in total room revenue.

### **Q:** What are the benefits of working with a CVB?

A: Visit the Woodlands becomes an extension of the meeting planning team from the very beginning of the planning process all the way through the day of the event. We help with RFP distribution, site tours, finding the right vendors, resolving problems, and servicing the event with everything from welcome bags to welcome booths, depending on group size.



**The Woodlands Waterway** began as a small drainage system, but that didn't stop George Mitchell and Robert Heineman from envisioning what it could become. In the initial sketch of The Woodlands, Heineman drew a transit corridor through Town Center, and 27 years later, construction began on the iconic Woodlands Waterway. This vision for the future has become one of the most cherished parts of The Woodlands, for residents and visitors.
