

## Taking Off

From Danielle's desk, the destinations you haven't thought of for meetings and events, from under-the-radar locales to new neighborhoods you should know about.

incinnati is betting on meetings in a Downtown is in the midst of a whopping \$800 million revitalization, with much of the energy focused on its convention core. The Duke Energy Convention Center is being reimagined to the tune of \$264 million with the goal to be one of the premier convention centers in the Midwest. On track to open in January 2026, sweeping improvements



include modernized meeting rooms, upgraded ballrooms, renovated exhibit hall and prefunction space, a new expansive rooftop terrace on the second level with views of Cincinnati's downtown skyline, and upgrades to building systems and technology making the building more energy efficient.



The game-changing development will pour over Elm Street Plaza—a new two-acre park and outdoor convention area that will be available for event activations and breakouts. A pavilion, walking paths and retractable bollards/posts for easy flow and street closures over Elm Street enhance the area for events and conventions.

That's not all, though. Last month, a new Marriott headquarters hotel was announced, scheduled to open in 2028 across the street from the convention center, connected by skywalk. Developed by Portman Holdings, the \$536 million project will bring more than 62,000

feet of outdoor terrace event space, 700 guest rooms, a full-service restaurant, outdoor bar


the 3,000-plus walkable hotel rooms in the downtown footprint.


