Pedal around with Summit Bike Share.

With miles of paved bike paths winding throughout town, there's no better way to get around Park City than a pedal-assisted electric bike that sails along the uphill sections. Summit Bike Share has more than 200 bikes available 24 hours a day, making it the perfect way to explore in the summer and fall.

HOW IT WORKS:

1. To start riding, download the Summit Bike Share mobile app, create an account, and purchase a membership.
2. Unlock a bike using the mobile app.
3. When riding, please wear a helmet. Keep your ride under the allotted time to avoid extra time fees. Enjoy!

Scenic E-Bike Routes

1 MCPOLIN BARN & OLD TOWN

This paved bike path route takes you from Kimball Junction all the way into Old Town. You'll pass Canyons Village and the iconic McPolin Barn, continuing all the way to historic Main Street.

ROUTE DIRECTIONS:

- Starting in Kimball Junction, grab a bike from a nearby station.
- Follow the Park City Blue pathway south.
- Stop at the historic McPolin Barn.
- At the junction of the Blue and Yellow pathways, turn right following the Yellow pathway south.
- End at the Old Town Transit Center station.
- Get lunch and shop in town. Return to Kimball Junction via the free transit system.

MILEAGE	7.1 miles (11.4 kilometers)
ESTIMATED TIME	45 minutes
ELEVATION CHANGE	800 feet (243.8 meters)

2 THE BIG LOOP

A longer ride that takes you through iconic neighborhoods and sights in the Park City area.

ROUTE DIRECTIONS:

- Starting in Kimball Junction, grab a bike from a nearby station.
- Follow the Park City Green pathway south.
- At the junction of the Green and Yellow pathways in Prospector Park, turn left following the Yellow pathway east.
- At the junction of the Yellow and Tan pathways in Quinns Junction, turn left following the Yellow pathway north.
- End at Kimball Junction, where the loop began.

MILEAGE	17 miles (27.35 kilometers)
ESTIMATED TIME	2.5 hours
ELEVATION CHANGE	1075 feet (327.66 meters)

Exploring via free transit

Most of these journeys begin at the Visitor Information Center, which is just a two minute walk from the Kimball Junction Transit Center. Park your car and enjoy the scenery by using our free transit system.

3 CANYONS VILLAGE ●●●●

Hop on the bus for a short ride from the Visitor Information Center to Park City Mountain's Canyon Village. Enjoy a scenic gondola ride, explore, and have some lunch.

- From the Visitor Information Center in Kimball Junction, walk to the Kimball Junction Transit Center. From there, take the 101 or 10X bus to Canyons Village.
- From the Canyons Village bus stop, take the free cabriolet up to Canyons Village to explore the shopping and dining options in the village area. In the summer, take a scenic gondola ride.
- Ride the 101 bus three stops towards Old Town, requesting a stop at McPolin Barn. Stroll through the historic farm and read about the history.
- From McPolin Barn, return to Kimball Junction via the 101 bus.

4 SILVER LAKE VILLAGE ●●●●

This takes you from the Visitor Information Center into the heart of historic Old Town Park City, then up to Silver Lake Village at Deer Valley Resort, where you can enjoy scenic views and a delicious lunch.

- From the Visitor Information Center in Kimball Junction, walk to the Kimball Junction Transit Center. From there take the 10X or 101 bus to the Old Town Transit Center.
- From the Old Town Transit Center, take the 4/Orange bus to Silver Lake. Explore the shopping and dining options.
- During summer, take the Sterling Express chairlift to the top of Bald Mountain. Hike down or take the chairlift back down to Silver Lake.
- Return options: From Silver Lake, take the 4/Orange bus back to town or take the Silver Lake Express chairlift down to Snow Park Lodge.
- From Snow Park, return to the Old Town Transit Center via bus - Teal, Green, or Yellow buses. Change buses to the 10X to Kimball Junction.

Short walks

5 SILVER KING MINE VIA TOWN LIFT

From the center of historic Main Street, ride Town Lift up, and walk over to view the historic Silver King Mine site and buildings.

DISTANCE	.5 mile (.8 km) out and back
ESTIMATED TIME	1.5 hours (including 20 minute each direction via Town Lift)
ELEVATION CHANGE	50 feet (15 m). Chairlift ride ascends 1083 ft (361 m)

6 EMPIRE CANYON

This short walk takes you to a few iconic mining relics located on the forested slopes of Deer Valley Resort.

- From the Visitor Information Center in Kimball Junction, take the 10X or 101 bus to the Old Town Transit Center.
- From Old Town, ride the 9/Purple bus to Empire Canyon/Montage.
- Visit the Daly West Headframe. Hike up the hill to see the Quincy Mine Bench and the Little Belle Ore Bin.

DISTANCE	1 mile (1.6 km) round trip to Headframe and Ore Bin
ESTIMATED TIME	1 hour
ELEVATION CHANGE	300 ft (100 m)

7 SPIRO TUNNEL

Explore the coal hopper and boiler buildings, Spiro Tunnel, Ivers Mine and mine buildings, and the foundry building, all steps from one another.

- From the Visitor Information Center in Kimball Junction, take the 101 bus to Prospector Dr., get on the 2/Green bus to Silver Star.
- Walk up to Silver Star Dr. and the Spiro Tunnel.

DISTANCE	.5 mile (.8 km)
ESTIMATED TIME	30 minutes
ELEVATION CHANGE	Little to no elevation change

8 SWANER PRESERVE

Visit the Swaner Preserve and Ecocenter, a 1,200-acre nature preserve and 10,000 square foot LEED Platinum certified building offering interactive exhibits, 10 miles of trails to explore within the wetland ecosystem, wildlife viewing, summer camps, and environmental education for all ages.

- From the Visitor Information Center in Kimball Junction, take the 103 Kimball Junction Shuttle or 104 Bitner Shuttle to Newpark.
- Walk under the Newpark sign that goes across the road and the ecocenter will be straight ahead.
- Choose from miles of various trails, paved and dirt. Ask staff at the desk for trail information.

DISTANCE	10 miles (16 km) of various trails
ESTIMATED TIME	1.5 hours
ELEVATION CHANGE	Depends on route

No more searching for a parking space at a busy trail head. During the summer months, the 9/Purple bus route expands service to Bonanza Flat and Bloods Lake trailheads on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays. The service runs every 20 minutes from the Old Town Transit Center and buses come equipped with bike racks. Use the QR code on page 6 for the most up-to-date schedule.

Explore some of the less-traveled trails.

This section covers some of our lesser-known trails and historical landmarks.

9 DAWN'S TRAIL - Hiking only

Dawn's Trail is a 3.6 mile out and back, hiking only trail that features beautiful wildflowers throughout spring and summer and is good for all skill levels.

- Follow the transit directions to Spiro Tunnel on Route #6.
- From Spiro Tunnel, hike up the Silver Spur Trail for .5 miles until you reach Dawn's Trail.

DISTANCE	3.6 miles (5.7 km)
ESTIMATED TIME	2 hours
ELEVATION CHANGE	846 ft (257m)

10 QUARRY MOUNTAIN TRAIL - Hiking only

This trail is a recently updated and often-overlooked 2-mile loop with great views of Park City Mountain, Deer Valley, and the McPolin Barn.

- From the Visitor Information Center, take the 101 bus to the Park Ave & Meadows Dr. stop.
- Walk on the paved trail north to the Farm Trailhead. Follow trail signs to Quarry Mountain.

DISTANCE	2.8 miles (4.5 km)
ESTIMATED TIME	1 hr 30 min
ELEVATION CHANGE	711 ft (216m)

11 ROUND VALLEY ADAPTIVE LOOP - Hiking/Biking

The Adaptive Loop includes PorcUclimb and Downward Dog trails. Mountain Trails Foundation partnered with the National Ability Center to build this trail specifically with the needs of three-wheeled, off-road handcycle riders by considering trail squeeze points (a point where the trail suddenly narrows due to an obstacle, which might block an adaptive rider), the radius of corners and more. This trail is perfect for adaptive cyclists and offers an amazing beginner loop for families and others on traditional, upright mountain bikes.

- From the Visitor Information Center, take the 10X or 101 bus to Park Ave. Condos, switch to the 102, and ride it to the Round Valley Dr. Soccer Field. The trailhead is .3 miles past the stop sign by the National Ability Center.

DISTANCE	5 miles (8 km)
ESTIMATED TIME	1 hour
ELEVATION CHANGE	440 feet (143 m)

12 THE RAIL TRAIL - Hiking/Biking

The Historic Union Pacific Rail Trail is a 28-mile trail from Park City to Coalville, perfect for walking or biking. The first 2-3 miles are paved and accessible from the transit system stops around Prospector Park and Quinns Junction, and the remainder is a soft dirt and gravel surface with limited access points.

- Take the 5/Yellow bus to the Ironhorse Drive stop to access the official start of trail. There are other trail access points in Promontory, Wanship, and Coalville.

DISTANCE	28 miles (45 km) to Coalville, 56 miles (90 km) round trip
ESTIMATED TIME	3-4 hours cycling
ELEVATION CHANGE	-1,700 ft (518m)



Scenic drives outside of Park City.

Summit County is a big place, with plenty to see outside of town. Here are some ideas for scenic drives and other areas to explore.

13 CASCADE SPRINGS

This route explores Heber Valley with views of the Wasatch Back. During the summer, the drive ends in Cascade Springs, where you can find luscious springs cascading through limestone terraces and sparkling pools. The paved and wooded paths allow visitors to explore beautiful waterfalls and ponds. In the winter, when Cascade Springs Dr. is closed, drive through Midway and Heber to visit Sundance Resort.

DRIVE TIME	45 minutes
DISTANCE	29 miles (46 kilometers)
SEASONALITY	Cascade Springs Dr. closed during winter months

14 SCENIC WEBER CANYON DRIVE

A mellow out and back drive through scenic Weber Canyon filled with aspen groves that are bright green in the summer and bright yellow in the fall. A perfect destination for this drive is the Smith and Morehouse Reservoir. At one point, the Trans-Continental Railway traveled through the canyon.

DRIVE TIME	50 minutes
DISTANCE	33 miles (53 kilometers)
SEASONALITY	Year-round

15 ROCKPORT STATE PARK

Just 15 miles from Park City, yet remote enough to make you feel like you've escaped for the day. Bring a chair and a fishing rod. Rockport State Park is also one of Utah's designated dark sky areas. At an elevation of 6,000 feet above sea level, the surrounding Wasatch and Uinta Mountains create a protective barrier that blocks out light pollution, allowing for great stargazing. Please remember to pay the State Park entrance fee once you arrive. Day passes and annual passes are available.

DRIVE TIME	50 minutes
DISTANCE	13 miles (20 kilometers)
SEASONALITY	Year-round

16 WOLF CREEK PASS

This paved highway begins in Francis and offers unimpeded views of the Uinta and Wasatch Mountain Ranges, as well as the iconic Mount Timpanogos. There are several pullouts along the route that offer excellent photo opportunities, and there are large aspen groves and open meadows filled with wildflowers in the summer months. The area immediately surrounding Wolf Creek Pass was heavily impacted during the Yellow Lake Fire in the fall of 2024.

DRIVE TIME	1 hour 15 minutes to Hanna, Utah
DISTANCE	58 miles (93 kilometers) to Hanna, Utah
SEASONALITY	Hwy 35 is closed at Nobletts Trailhead during winter months

17 MIRROR LAKE SCENIC BYWAY

One of the most popular driving routes in the state, Mirror Lake Scenic Byway cuts through Utah's highest mountain range, from the town of Kamas up into the Uinta-Wasatch Cache National Forest, before descending to Mirror Lake. Many small lakes, waterfalls, camp sites, and hiking trails are along this beautiful route. There are no retail services within the forest area, so it's best to shop and gas up before you begin your drive.

DRIVE TIME	1 hr 30 min to Mirror Lake
DISTANCE	50 miles (80 kilometers) to Mirror Lake
SEASONALITY	Hwy 150 is closed at Soapstone during the winter
