Board Chair Clem Lear called the meeting to order at 11:47 a.m.

CONSENT AGENDA:

Lear asked for a motion to accept the Consent Agenda as presented. Board member Rick Lindsey made a motion to approve and accept; second by Board member Jo-Ann Bresowar. With no opposition and no further discussion, the Consent Agenda was unanimously approved.

INDIVIDUAL CONSIDERATION

Lear noted the six-month performance update recommendation for the Irving CVB Executive Director from the Executive Committee includes results through February 2019. The recommendation will include five months of results, and future performance updates will include results for six months. Lear asked for a motion to accept the recommendation as presented. Board member Joe Phillip made a motion to accept; second by Lindsey. With no opposition and no further discussion, the recommendation was unanimously approved.

BOARD CHAIR REPORT

Lear introduced Texican Court General Manager John Thomas and thanked him for hosting the meeting. She commended the Irving Convention Center and staff for the recent City of Irving Boards and Commissions dinner, and commented she only heard great reviews. Lear deferred to Board and Business Development Committee Chair Debbi Haacke for an update on the 86th legislative session.

BOARD AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Committee Chair Debbi Haacke gave a brief recap of the March 15 Committee meeting. Special Guest Jay Barksdale, a lobbyist from Davis Advocates, gave a dynamic report to the Committee on the 86th legislative session and items of interest to the ICVB and City of Irving. He reported the Tourism Public Improvement District (TPID) bill that includes Irving was sponsored and carried by Senator Nathan Johnson in the Senate and passed. State Representative Raphael Anchia will be carrying the bill on to the House with a hearing tomorrow in Austin, and Executive Director Maura Gast will attend. The Omnibus Bill put forth by House Representative Four Price was favorably voted out of the Urban Affairs Committee to the full House for approval. Senator Jane Nelson, sponsoring Frisco and Denton local bills, will carry on the Senate side. These are two parallel tracks and we do not anticipate any difficulty. The Committee also heard updates on property tax, public open records requests, alcohol beverage delivery, oyster farming and transportation. She reported Councilman Al Zapanta gave feedback and input, and the meeting was very informative. The TPID potential roll-out schedule was discussed. Haacke informed Board members talking points will be distributed regarding the TPID to assist in answering basic questions the community may have. She further reported the Board appointment process will be an item on the June 7 Committee meeting agenda. Lear added the earliest implementation for TPID in Irving would be 2020. Board members were reminded Committee meetings are open to all.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Committee Chair Rick Lindsey reported on Thursday, April 18, the Mayor will present a High Spirited Citizen award to Lyle and Sybil Novinsky at the City Council meeting. He encouraged all Board members to come out and support the High Spirited Citizen initiative. He stated the Committee and the ICVB Marketing team are developing a bus tour, like the Irving Chamber's economic tour, as an opportunity to tour the City for Board members and residents. More information on the tour will be distributed as the project develops. He encouraged everyone to attend the April 2 Committee meeting.

DESTINATION DEVELOPMENT

Committee Chair Greg Malcolm reported the next Committee meeting will be held on May 7 and will be a site trip to The Star in Frisco and Legacy Hall in North Plano. All Board members are invited to attend.

CITY REPORTS

Mayor Pro Tem John Danish and Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Oscar Ward added their gratitude to the Texican Court for their hospitality. Danish encouraged everyone to attend the Town Hall Meeting on March 28 to hear what is happening in South Irving.

Mayor Rick Stopfer reported Operation Finally Home helped welcome a retired U.S. Army officer and his family to a home built in Irving. The City donated the land; the Dallas Builders Association, along with Winston Home, NEC, Copart and several others supported the custom-built, mortgage-free home in Irving. He further commented it shows what Irving is all about – a small city with a big heart. Stopfer would like to encourage the business community and challenge other Fortune 500 companies to sponsor a home, with a goal to build one home per year for a deserving veteran and family. Other topics of discussion in Irving include Great Days of Service, Town Hall meeting on March 28, and the Museum.

Stopfer gave a brief update on DART and reported DART is on track with the Cotton Belt line and \$120 million has been added to include double tracking. The cars used on the track will be serviced at the warehouse in South Irving. He commented it gives Irving an opportunity to connect north and south. A new GoPass app is in service that allows riders to buy tickets, track trains in real time, book an Uber ride, and plan a whole trip in one purchase.

City Manager Chris Hillman introduced Economic Development Project Manager Bryan Haywood, Assistant City Manager Philip Sanders, Chief Financial Officer Jeff Litchfield, and Senior City Attorney Karen Brophy. He asked Litchfield to give a brief report on the core IT system update. Litchfield reported the current operating computer system was installed in the 1990's and it is incredible what staff has done to make it work over the years. The City has embarked on a process to replace both the core financial system and the utility billing system. The utility billing system will go live early August and will take time to rollout, and the financial system will go live October 1. Accounting Director Marianne Lauda has been heavily involved in the project and he thanked her for the support and hard work. Hillman commented this is a "behind the scenes" project and a great undertaking with major investment.

Hillman reported the Westin Irving Convention Center at Las Colinas is scheduled to open at the end of the month. The Certificate of Occupancy has been issued, and everyone is looking forward to the opening. Flowserve announced it is expanding its headquarters in Irving. He congratulated Fluor on the announcement of the \$4.9 billion Los Angeles International Airport. Fluor is one of Irving's largest corporations and a valuable partner. North Texas ranked fifth worldwide in total data center demand, with more than 3.6 million square feet of data center buildings completed last year in the DFW area. Texas' lower cost of power, land available for construction and airport accessibility are cited for the growth. At the Toyota Music Factory, the Green Gator Cajun restaurant has opened, Bar Louie is expanding its space by 3,000 square feet and Gloria's is expanding its patio. The Reservoir restaurant is scheduled to open soon, and concerts by well-known artists are scheduled for the Texas Lottery Plaza every Thursday during the months of April and May, in addition to the bookings at The Pavilion by Live Nation. The *Dallas Observer* recently recognized Hugo's Invitados at Water Street as one of five North Texas' top 10 Rising Star Chef of the Year.

Hillman further reported Irving has made several "best of" lists recently: third in hardest working city by WalletHub; ranked 21 on the list of most affordable city for recent graduates and young professionals by BusinessStudent.com; and one of the happiest cities in the country by WalletHub. Over 14,000 teens and tweens attended the highly popular North Texas Teen Book Festival at the Irving Convention Center. With more than 70 top authors attending, this event has become the largest library-run book festival in the country.

Other projects include: \$700,000 improvements at Cimarron Family Aquatic Center, Senter Park Recreation Center renovations, new playground at A.S. Johnston Elementary School, and work continues on roads, water and wastewater facilities. The citywide Egg Hunt will be April 6 at Heritage Park, Taste of Irving is scheduled for April 13 at Cimarron Park.

BUREAU MANAGEMENT AND STAFF

Executive Director Maura Gast reported the ribbon cutting ceremony date for the Irving Westin Convention Center Hotel is pending for March 30, and a grand opening event is scheduled for April 25. A handout was distributed for a volunteer opportunity at Thomas Haley Elementary School to help with the beautification project of their building. Anyone wishing to volunteer will assist from 8:30 - 10:30 a.m. The Volunteer Visitor Information Center roll out is anticipated to begin June 1 with staffing on Saturday and Sundays from 10:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. in four hour shifts for two volunteers. Recruiting will begin with Board members, former Board members, and High Spirited Citizens. Gast acknowledged Lauda for her extra hours and hard work in the implementation process of the City's new accounting software and the budget process. Top-line budget overviews will be shared at the May Executive Committee meeting and full details of the budget will be presented at the June Board meeting.

VP of Sales and Services Lori Fojtasek reported February was a short month and normally experiences a dip in numbers. Leads for the month fell slightly short; however, more groups were served by the ICVB and 1,500 more rooms were booked than January. The team is at 113% of their YTD goal.

Assistant Executive Director/Marketing and Communications Diana Pfaff noted that RFPs in February decreased to 80, while the number of room nights increased well above average to 49,850. A blog report on the 2018 HSMAI Adrian Award winners is included in the meeting packet, and ICVB took home a Gold award in the digital marketing category for website design. Also included in the packet is an article from MPI showcasing an interview with Gast. The Texican Court also received coverage from a blog influencer and Pfaff noted there has been fabulous coverage on the Texican Court over the last few months. The Marketing Communications team traveled to South by Southwest in Austin and it was the first time for Irving to exhibit. The team attended a four-day tradeshow with great booth location and a dynamic set up. There was exceptional traffic from national and international attendees. A brief overview of the event will be shared at an upcoming Board meeting. The goal was to bring brand awareness and promote Irving to a primarily music audience. Gast added Pfaff and staff did a tremendous job and they are looking forward to showcasing it to the Board.

CONVENTION CENTER MANAGEMENT REPORT

SMG General Manager Tom Meehan reported the Convention Center is extremely busy. The North Texas Teen Book Festival hosted approximately 14,000 teens over the weekend. It was an outstanding February for food and beverage, with a net of \$450,000. He stated the ICC will have another great year as things continue over the next few months. The NBM Show is in the building this week and will test the building for power needs. The show markets graphic professionals, screen and digital printing, embroidery, apparel decorating, engraving, etc. It is the first time since the ICC opened that a show will use compressed air on the Exhibit Hall floor. The ICC looks great with updates on the outside lighting, LEDs and hidden lights are spectacular at night, along with the water feature colors and jets. The building will be a great feature from the Westin Convention Center hotel rooms. Sales are doing great and May is another very full month. Director of Sales Matt Tungett reported there were 26 events for the month and 105 for the year. Future guest rooms booked are 3,027 for the month, and 18,577 for the year. This is 15,000 ahead of pace for this year. Several good shows are returning in April: Fiber Fest, Kameha Con, Grocer's Supply, Innotech Dallas and the DFW Restaurant Resource Show. Gast pointed out The NBM Show was displaced

from the Arlington Convention Center after their renovations took out the ballroom for an eSports complex. She is excited to have them and hope they return in the future.

INDUSTRY PARTNER REPORTS

HOTEL REPORTS

Malcom reported from the February 2019 STR report February was a soft month in hotel Occupancy and below Average Daily Rate at \$114.81, up 2.3%. RevPAR was \$80.87, down 3%. March is flat compared to last year and hopefully will turn around.

Board member Kim Limon reported the Hampton Inn Las Colinas ended February 10% down in Occupancy over last year for the current month. ADR held high, up 1.6% over the competitive set and strong.

General Manager John Thomas from the Texican Court reported he is happy with the way things are turning out at this property. February was better than expected, March is a little slow from spring break. It is a new hotel and has done fantastic for opening recently and he is looking forward to a great summer.

RESTAURANT REPORT

Board member David Cole reported the National Restaurant Association 2019 Public Affairs Conference will be held on March 27 in Washington D.C. with several legislative Bills to support.

DCURD

Board member Jacky Knox reported on several projects in the Urban Center. Irving Ambucs will have their second annual fishing tournament on April 13 at Lake Carolyn. This is a rare opportunity for sanctioned fishing on Lake Carolyn for a charity benefit. There are activities for all ages as part of the day's events. Dragon boat racing is a fast-growing team sport. DCURD has approved a proposal to make this a more year-round activity on Lake Carolyn. Texas 22, the home team of DFW dragon boat racing, will train all year, subject to weather conditions, here. Other teams that will be competing in the annual race will have an opportunity to train and local coaches will be available. Two 22-men dragon boats will be moored at the south end of the lake. DCURD has a license agreement with Gondola Adventures, Inc. for these types of activities and will assist in coordinating the club, community and corporate activities. Venetian Terrace on Mandalay Canal has a new operator and is renovating both the indoor and outdoor venues. The Italian theme is being modernized with new menus infusing multi-cultural tastes for lunch, dinner and special event celebrations. They are moving forward with the required processes as quickly as possible to establish a date for full service operations.

IRVING-LAS COLINAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce President Beth Bowman reported 2019 is a fabulous year for economic development with 10 project wins, retentions and expansions (which include Frito Lay and Flowserve), representing 3,800 jobs, and \$300 million in capital expenditures. The Chamber team is committed to existing businesses, while open to those that want to come home to Irving, generating 42 active projects and 4.4 million in commercial space since October 1. Unemployment in January was 3.7%

and 3.5% in February for Irving. The State reported 3.8% and national statistics are 4.0%. The Chamber is busy supporting bills to keep Texas business-friendly during the 86th legislative session. The Chamber has reached out the Irving Hispanic Chamber of Commerce to partner a discussion on driving our legislative candidate conversations around diversity and economic development. An event will be held on April 11 at The Study USA in Irving with panel discussions. The event is open to the public and complimentary, but registration is requested. A Chamber Mixer is scheduled for March 26 at 4:30 p.m. at VentureX in Las Colinas. Microsoft is holding a Blockchain & Cryptocurrency Symposium in partnership with the Irving Chamber and the Technology Leadership Council on April 2. The Chamber has partnered with the Richardson Chamber of Commerce for the 2019 State of Dallas County which is scheduled for May 30 at the Renaissance Dallas Richardson hotel, featuring Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins.

IRVING ARTS CENTER

Executive Director Arts and Culture Todd Hawkins and Irving Arts Board Chair Judy Pierson reported Summer Camp registration is open and begins June 6. Irving Middle School Art Exhibit is in the Main Gallery with an Open House on March 26 from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. "The Night of the Iguana" performance is in Dupree Theatre through March 30. The Irving Symphony Orchestra Grand Finale concert, "A tribute to Motown and R&B", is scheduled for March 30 at 7:30 p.m. Celebrate Earth Day with education, action-packed, and entertaining performance by Steve Trash on April 23. Hawkins gave an update on the museum construction and reported the project should be completed by end of summer. The permanent exhibits will load in when construction is completed. The Irving Trivia Contest is coming soon, and Pierson encouraged the ICVB participation and noted the contest is scheduled on the same day as the Irving Marathon.

TIF

Lear welcomed newly appointed TIF Chair Michael Randall. Randall gave a brief overview of his background and thanked the Board for the opportunity to serve. There have been no recent TIF Board meetings to report.

LAS COLINAS ASSOCIATION

Board member Hammond Perot reported the LCA annual meeting is scheduled for March 26 and will reelect two Board positions. LCA numbers from 2018 are in the process of being completed but can report that 7,219 single family homes were developed in Las Colinas and 7,755 homes were developed, proposed or under construction, 18,738 apartment units to date were completed and 1,285 total units are under construction. There were 4,100 reported open garage door incidents. Submissions to architectural control were up 10% and 197 construction projections. There were 687 compliance cases closed in 2018. The wayfinding project design is completed and meeting have been held with City staff, the CVB and the Chamber on digital wayfinding around the Convention Center and Toyota Music Factory area with additional analysis to be completed to ensure it is done right. The Charity Bowl-A-Thon is scheduled for April 23 at 6:00 p.m. at Pinstack and he encouraged everyone to participate. With no further discussion, Lear adjourned the meeting at 1:05 p.m.



Commercial Growth, Good for Irving

Corporations, national and international, are attracted to Irving. In fact, last month, Texas won a national award for its ability to land significant new corporate development.

Property Taxes

The City of Irving takes mosquito control very seriously. Trapping continues across the city's 57 trap and spray locations. In the case any traps test positive, Irving's vector control technicians will spray at night.

The city's mosquito control staff works along with the Texas Department of State Health Services and the Dallas County Health and Human Services Department to conduct surveillance and testing year-round of the mosquito population for diseases.

How can residents help? Self-protection is the best course of action, so be sure to follow the four Ds:

- **Dusk and Dawn** When mosquitoes are most active.
- Drain Eliminate standing water, such as in flower pots, rain gutters, etc.
- **DEET** Make sure insect repellent contains this ingredient. DEET has been tested and approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.
- Dress Wear long sleeves, pants, shoes and socks when outside.

City Approves New Hike, Bike Trail near West Irving DART Station



In February, the City of Irving approved the 2.4-mile Rock Island Road bike and pedestrian trail between the West Irving DART station and Irby Lane. The \$3.65 million project includes a 10-footwide trail that will accommodate

bicycle and foot traffic, provide a major east-west pedestrian route, and will offer safe and reliable access to light rail service. The project will include lighting along the trail. The North Central Texas Council of Governments was instrumental in securing the funding through the Federal Highway Administration, Texas Department of Transportation and the City of Irving.

The bike and pedestrian trail is part of the larger Fort Worth to Dallas Regional Trail system. Once completed, the trail will connect the cities of Fort Worth, Arlington, Grand Prairie, Irving and Dallas.

Construction is expected to begin on this section this month and should be completed by spring 2020, weather permitting.

City staff also is working on proposals to complete Irving's Campion Trail. Roughly 15 miles of the city's master-planned, 22-mile greenbelt is accessible for public use. In the future, the city plans to fully connect all sections of Campion Trail. For more information on the city's trail system, visit CityofIrving.org/1127/Trails.




Customer Service Satisfaction Survey Results March 1-28, 2019

Marketing and Advertising Analytics

RFPS

March saw the highest number of RFPs since January of last year with **115 RFPs** (well above average) while the number of room nights remained high for the second month in a row with **48,358 associated room nights** (above average). Year-over-year March 2019 performed better than March 2018 with a 34% increase in the number of RFPs but saw a slight decrease in the number of room nights, which was down 9%.







Website Traffic

March also saw a large increase in website traffic with **49,096 total sessions** and **40,814 total users** for both websites. The **Visit Irving website had its highest traffic ever with 35,409 sessions and 29,403 total users** (well above average). The Irving Convention Center website also performed well with 13,687 sessions and 11,411 users (above average). The year-over-year performance showed that the Visit Irving website traffic increased by 23% while the Irving Convention Center website remained steady.


Blog traffic increased significantly again in March with **7,582 pageviews** and 6,655 unique pageviews, which was a 64% increase over the previous month and second highest number of pageviews in the past year. The average time visitors spent on the blog increased to four minutes and 17 seconds (well above average), and the bounce rate remains low at 14.34%. The top blog posts were "Irving Texas Bluebonnets Guide," with 1,324 pageviews, "We Tried the 3-Day Juice Cleanse at Freshii, Here's What Happened," with 557 pageviews, and "5 Brunch Spots in Irving You Need to Try this Sunday," with 456 pageviews.






Advertising and Paid Search

Advertising engagement was the **highest to date with 9,580 advertising impressions** and **3,301 site-visits**, which is a **141% increase over the previous month** and a **35% year-over-year increase in advertising impressions**. Tegna Media was the top performer with 2,559 impressions and 1,386 site-visits, follow by MPI with 2,245 impressions and 741 site-visits. Multiview and Meetings Today also performed well with 1,202 impressions and 1,043 impressions. The Google AdWords paid search campaign also increased in March to **56,587 impressions** and **7,094 site-visit**, which generated **22 RFPs** and is the highest number of RFPs from AdWords to date.






Hotel and Flight Bookings

Information available through the ADARA Magellan travel intelligence platform displays approximately 70% of the hotel bookings, room nights, hotel booking revenue and flights booked by travelers who viewed the bureau's digital advertising or visited either website. The attribution window is 60 days, which means that the complete information available to date is from January 2019. In January, 57 hotel reservations were booked, which accounts for 128 room nights and \$19,717 in hotel revenue. Travelers also booked 316 flights in January.



Social Media

The number of new social media followers increased by **1,118 new followers**, which is a **123% year-over-year increase** and brings the total influence to **88,268**. The Visit Irving Facebook Page saw the largest increase with 774 new likes for a total of 57,911 new likes. The Visit Irving Instagram also performed well with 185 new followers.



How Did Irving Become One of the Country's Most Vibrant Nepalese Food Enclaves?

The momo comes in many forms, but in all of them it is Nepal's iconic snack. In the Himalayas, momos can be eaten on nearly every urban street corner and in nearly every kitchen. To call the momo a kind of dumpling would be accurate, but simplistic; it is, in fact, many kinds of dumpling. Some are formed in neat little pyramids of dough and filling, shaped like Nepal's towering mountains, with the wrappers' pleated folds meeting at the summit. Others are made in a more circular fashion, and their tops form a sort of crown. Yet more are folded into enormous crescent moons, and a few resemble the dumplings popular in the country's northern neighbor, China. However you eat a momo, those bites of wrapper, filling and spice are little symbols of Nepali culture. They're as ubiquitous and iconic in their tradition as the taco is in Mexico's. To snack on a momo is to peer through a window onto a mountainous landscape on the far side of the world.

The best place to find momos in the United States is Jackson Heights, Queens. That neighborhood's dozens of vendors participate in an annual "Momo Crawl" festival.

The second-best place to find momos in the United States is on the suburban, asphalt-covered flatland of Irving, Texas. Irving is home to the second-largest Nepali-American population in the country, behind only New York City. Two societies, a spiritual center and at least 13 restaurants cater to the growing community. But start asking around to find out why immigrants from a cool, mountainous country are congregating in a hot, flat suburb, and the answer is surprising: Nobody quite knows how Nepal came to North Texas.

One of the prevailing theories of Nepali migration to Dallas County centers on North Lake College, the community college that serves Irving. (Disclosure: This author is a North Lake College employee.) North Lake reportedly has the largest population of Nepali students of any American college or university. According to an unofficial tally by the college's international student center, the school has around 650 Nepali students – a number which, before the Trump administration, was nearly 900.

Those numbers account for a staggering 80 percent of the college's international student population – all from a country with a population slightly smaller than Texas' and located 8,000 miles away.

Keith Landry, one of the college's international student advisers, isn't sure how to explain this affinity.

"I started here in 2006, and it was already 70 percent Nepalese," Landry explains, referring to the college's international student population. Landry says he visited Chicago a decade ago and met a Nepali-American working at Subway. "I said that I lived in Irving, Texas. 'Oh, is that where North Lake is? I have friends who go there.' Word of mouth."

But not everyone in the community here attended North Lake, and anyone trying to explain why Irving became a Nepali enclave faces a chickenand-egg conundrum. Many NLC students from Nepal say they came to Irving because they had family already here. But many of the locals say their families came here because of North Lake.

Ramesh Giri, one of two brothers who attended North Lake and now jointly own MoMo To Go, sums up the conundrum neatly. making Dallas home," he says. "Another reason is North Lake College and the DCCCD colleges. I went there. All of my friends and all of my relatives went there. The younger populations are because of the school. The people with the families are because there's someone they know."

The prevailing theory inside North Lake's International Center is that the Diversity Immigrant Visa Program, which began issuing visas in 1995, opened up the United States to migration from Nepal, and that in the following years Nepali immigrants arrived at the college and in the city almost immediately. Why they chose this corner of Texas is still unknown. The entire wave of migration may well have started with just one or two people who told their friends and family about Irving, or about its community college.

Other local schools contribute to the population, too. Dipesh Acharya, manager of Cafemandu Flavors of Nepal, moved to Irving after attending Texas State University in San Marcos. Bipin Thakali, one of the partners at Peak Restaurant, came to the U.S. to get a pilot's license at a school in Arlington, which has since moved to Fort Worth.

Although Thakali's background is slightly different, his theory of how Nepal came to Irving still revolves around education.

"North Lake is in Irving, you know, and UTA is in Arlington, so it's right in the middle," Thakali speculates. "Some students take classes at North Lake and classes in Arlington and stay in the middle."

In 2015, when a devastating earthquake struck Nepal and left almost 9,000 people dead and millions homeless, the student body at North Lake College responded by donating blankets, clothing and more than \$8,000 in cash. Two Nepali students returned home with \$4,000 each. In an interview with the college's student newspaper, Sudip Hamal recalled spending his share to pack trucks with food and drive them to a remote village in the Sindhupalchok District, where the earthquake had destroyed 97 percent of homes.

"It was a four-hour drive each way," Hamal told the North Lake College *News-Register.* "With that money, we helped 200 families. We distributed edibles, things like rice and cereal for them to eat."

There must be 50 ways to eat a momo.

The dumpling's traditional fillings can involve ground chicken, goat, lamb, yak or, most commonly, water buffalo. Vegetarian fillings are increasingly common; pork momos exist, too, and Peak Restaurant in Irving daringly serves beef momos, even though 80 percent of Nepal is Hindu. (Small minorities of the country are Buddhist, Muslim or some localized combination of those faiths.)

Steamed momos are the simplest order of all: The dumplings come out of the steamer basket with little more than a side order of dipping sauce. Panfried and even deep-fried momos can be had, and so can fried momos coated in a zestful rub of seasonings, herbs and diced red onions. Cafemandu is the only restaurant in Irving – and, according to its owners, the only restaurant in the United States – to serve sweet momos for dessert, with a creamy dairy filling. Dairy lovers can pick up a savory alternative at Cafemandu, too: "cheesy white" momo, covered in "creamy cheese" sauce.

For many Nepali-Americans, the perfect cold-weather comfort food is steamed momos served in a hot broth. Jhol momo is, in essence, dumpling soup, with a richly aromatic broth made with tomatoes, chili peppers, cumin, and herbs and spices native to the Himalayas.

One of the most beloved of all preparations has its own shorthand: "C-momo," short for "chili momo," or, as many menus insist on spelling it, "chilly momo." However it is named, chili momo is a steamed or pan-fried order coated with a richly spicy, deep-red sauce founded on the flavor base of indigenous hot

peppers.

Chili momo, too, comes in many varieties. At Cafemandu, it's got a subtle heat that may seem innocuous at first but builds in power with every successive bite. Just across Northgate Drive, inside the Texaco station on the corner, Momostop slathers its C-momo in a sauce so fiery red that it might as well be a warning sign. Peak Restaurant's chili momo are deepfried, with almost crunchy pleats of dough; some of them have menacing slivers of hot pepper on top or hidden inside.

Every Nepali restaurant in Irving serves momos, even if the kitchen's primary focus is on another genre of food. Cafemandu is probably the most prominent momo specialist in Irving, with nine varieties available at any given time. Peak, which is nominally a sports bar, also makes the dumpling wrappers by hand. Some businesses, such as Hot N Spicy on State Highway 183, add momos to a menu that's focused primarily on more generic Indian fare. And, in a happy marriage of Dallas and Nepali food cultures, the momo has found a home inside gas stations. The rest of Dallas may feature convenience store taco counters, but a Fresh Food Store on Northgate Drive, with two pumps out front, is the home of MoMo To Go. Momostop's Texaco location is just blocks away. (A second Momostop location, inside a Chevron on MacArthur, recently closed.)

MoMo To Go was established by brothers Pradip and Ramesh Giri as a delivery-only business that operated out of a small, central commercial kitchen. The location open now, which welcomes dine-in and carry-out orders in addition to serving as a delivery hub, is a mark of the business' successful growth over the course of two years.

"We already used to make momos on the weekends in our house," Ramesh Giri says. "If there is a small gathering or anything, we start making momos, because we expect some food from Nepal. We always thought, you know, there is pizza delivery and a lot of American food that can be delivered at home. With all these Nepalese people in the Dallas area, why not deliver momos?" In the convenience store corner MoMo To Go calls home, specialties include choila momo, chicken dumplings fried in a mixture of spices, and rara momo, steamed dumplings served inside a warm bowl of noodle soup.

"Somebody who has never had Nepali food before, momo is the first thing I would recommend them to try," Giri says.

Acharya, from Cafemandu, agrees. "It's more like burgers here in the U.S. In Nepal you get in every corner, you drive by and you find momo stalls. You find restaurants selling momos in each and every corner."

That's close to becoming true in Irving, too. We all know the rule: Once we can eat a food inside a gas station, that food is officially part of the Dallas canon.

The use of timur points toward one of the less obvious facts about Nepali culture. The cuisine's overlap with foods of far north India is clear – many menus feature chicken and breads baked in the tandoor oven, or certain varieties of biryani. But Nepal has another neighbor that also casts a massive shadow over its culture and is a major influence on its cuisine: China.

If any street food in Kathmandu rivals the popularity of momos, it's chow mein. The familiar takeout dish of stir-fried egg noodles, proteins and vegetables is a massive hit in Nepal, and almost every restaurant in the Texas community serves its own rendition. Dive into a bowl of bhatti chow mein at Cafemandu, choose from five varieties at Peak or grab a "MoMein" platter from MoMo To Go, which is, of course, a bowl of noodles topped with pan-fried dumplings.

But Nepalese food is stubbornly distinct from the cuisines of its bigger neighbors. The difference lies primarily in the distinctive flavors and spices.

"The spices that we use – it's kinda similar to Indian spices, right?" Ramesh Giri says. "But we have our own flavors. If you try Chinese

momos, it's more sweet, not very spicy. Chinese dumplings are not as spicy. The fillings are different."

Finally, Irving's Nepali community has embraced its new Texas home by building new kinds of fusion foods. Cafemandu even serves a sausage on a stick inspired by the State Fair. More tempting, perhaps, is Cafemandu's "Nepali burrito," with nine kinds of beans and a splash of hot pepper sauce.

"You're in Texas," Acharya explains. "You gotta know burritos."

All of this – Chinese-Nepali fusion, regional thalis, goat and mutton curries, chicken burgers, noodle soups, the ubiquitous momo in its many forms – is an expression of the richness of a culture that simply did not exist in Irving three decades ago. But the growth of the Dallas area's Nepali community faces its own set of challenges. At North Lake College, the Nepali student population has dropped by about one-quarter since fall 2016, part of a general decline in the international student population at the college and across the U.S. This presidential administration has, it appears, been successful in its efforts to discourage migration.

Now Irving's growth is fueled instead by Nepalese-Americans arriving from elsewhere in the U.S., attracted by the city's growing national reputation as a cultural center.

"The people who were in other cities have also moved to Dallas," Giri says. "Because they have friends here or maybe they think it's a very diversified area. Culturally, every item that they need is easily accessible."

He gives an example: Nepali customers here have ready access to spices and home-country products via Irving's Indian grocery stores.

Giri also addresses the question of Irving's topography and climate, seemingly so different from Nepal's. "I think they are not really concerned here about the climate or the weather," he explains. "Most of the time you are inside the house or inside work."

And not all of Nepal is nestled high in the Himalayas. "The northern part of Nepal is really cold, but if you go south it's really close to Texas," Giri says. "For example, where I was born is a place that is warmer than Dallas. We have 115, 120 in the summertime – 45 degrees Celsius."

"The community is growing every day," Bipin Thakali says. "Back when there was only one Nepali restaurant in town, we didn't have many options. But now that we have more than 10 restaurants on the same street, it's all about who has the better food and the service, you know? That brings a healthy competition along with a community of people."

MoMo To Go, in the corner store on Northgate Drive, is thinking about building on its success by expanding further. The Giri brothers have been patient: They waited to open their restaurant until they'd completed their master's degrees. They waited months more before searching for a location to open to the dine-in public. Now they're "actively looking," Ramesh says, at a potential second restaurant in another suburb, perhaps Plano or Frisco. The search for the right place continues.

The rest of Irving is quickly finding out about its new neighbors, too. Muda Flavors of Nepal has since grown into Cafemandu, and Momo Shack is now a pop-up business appearing at local breweries and festivals. But the area's Nepali community has roots going back at least two decades, and even if nobody is quite sure how it happened, Irving is ready to start celebrating that heritage.

Just ask Dipesh Acharya about the goal of the business he helps lead, Cafemandu. His objective is not modest.

"Bringing Nepali food to mainstream around Irving and around Dallas," he declares. "We really want people to know what momos are, what Nepali food is all about. A passion for letting people know our culture, where we come from."

As more Nepali-American migrants come to Irving from elsewhere in the United States, and as more of them open restaurants, bars and pop-up businesses, it seems certain that Nepali culture will continue making its way across Dallas, one momo at a time.

The new style for the property incorporates the rustic heritage of the Texas ranching industry. A

base of warm, modern textures incorporates the color of Bluebonnets, the state flower, as well as the orange of Texas sunsets. Three 750-square-foot Parlor Suites, the largest of the hotel's rooms, are great for small functions. Room amenities include:


- · convenient wall outlets, lamp outlets and nightstands with USB ports;
- luxurious bedding with cotton-rich linens and fluffy pillows;
- high-speed WiFi and large desks with plug-in panels; and

• 50-inch flat-panel TVs with premium cable and movie channels, as well as Enseo in-room entertainment for accessing Netflix, Hulu, HBO, YouTube, Pandora and Crackle.

The property has 27,294 square feet of indoor/outdoor meeting and conference space in 12 event rooms, among them four 550-square-foot boardrooms and a 10,000-square-foot ballroom that accommodates groups of up to 1,000. Events on the 3,000-square-foot Lakeside Terrace take groups outside. The hotel's Bistro Fiera serves American fare throughout the day.

Opening by the end of the month is the Marriott's sister property, the 350-room Westin Irving Convention Center. Across the street from the convention facility, the hotel will have 21,593 square feet of meeting space, the Mesa Mezcal restaurant, the Craft Coffee Shop and the Vibe Pool Bar.

Arlington takes first steps to limit short-term rentals but faces threat of lawsuit

After years of debate, the Arlington City Council on Tuesday took its first step toward regulating short-term rentals.

The City Council approved amending the unified development code by a 6-3 vote to designate a short-term rental district within a one-mile radius of the city's <u>entertainment district</u>, which includes <u>Six Flags Over Texas</u>, <u>Globe Life Park</u> and AT&T Stadium.

Short-term rentals, which are listed on sites like Airbnb and VRBO, would be permitted in areas zoned in the rest of city for commercial and multifamily if subleases are allowed. Any short-term rental operator would be required to get a temporary permit that must be renewed annually.

A second and final vote is scheduled for the April 23 meeting.

The boundaries for the STR zone are Lamar Boulevard on the north, Center Street on the west, E. Abram Street on the south and State Highway 360 on the east.

"We have to start somewhere," said Arlington City Council member Helen Moise, who represents north Arlington. "I think what we have on the table is a good start."

Council member Roxanne Thalman said she would vote against the STR plan since it wouldn't allow those who live in their homes to rent it out on a temporary basis.

Once it passes, Mayor Jeff Williams said there will be time where adjustments can be made before it goes into effect.

"I hope we can stop the feuding that has been going on and move forward together," Williams said.

Speaking on behalf of residents opposed to short-term rentals in their neighborhoods, Joe Bruner voiced support for the measure. Half of the City Council chamber was clad in red-T-shirts supporting the STR plan but they chose to let Bruner speak for the entire group.

"The ordinance, we think, is a good compromise," Bruner said. "It is certainly not a ban and any STR curtailed can be made up in the STR area."

The action taken by the City Council, Bruner said, will be noted in Austin where <u>House Bill</u> <u>3778</u> filed by state Rep. Angie Chen Button, R-Richardson, and <u>Senate Bill 1888</u> filed by state Sen. Pat Fallon, R-Prosper, would curb cities' regulation of short-term rentals.

But STR operators spoke against the city's plan, saying it would hurt their incomes.

"Their wild claims that short-term rentals are taking over the neighborhoods simply isn't true," said Brad Herbert, a short-term rental operator and a member of <u>START (or Short-term</u> <u>Accommodations for Residents and Tourism)</u>.

The city is currently monitoring 14 short-term rentals that have had 10 or more complaint calls between Oct. 1, 2016 and Sept. 30, 2018. Host Compliance, the city's consultant, identified 428 short-term rentals operating in the city.

Herbert asked that all current STR operators be "grandfathered in perpetuitity" so that it doesn't serve as a ban to most of the city but the council did not act on the request.

"Please do the right thing and adopt property regulations that protect all property owners in Arlington," Bruner said.

Ruby Faye Woolridge, who is running for mayor, said she is not a STR operator but believes they should be allowed because they can serve as an additional source of income for elderly homeowners.

Herbert warned the city that it can expect a lawsuit if the plan passes in its current form. Similar litigation has been filed in other cities.

In Grapevine, residents thought they had the approval to use homes as short-term rentals, then the city reaffirmed an existing ordinance that banned them.

Residents sued and a judge issued a temporary injunction against the ban. A trial is scheduled for July 15.

Southlake and Hurst have also banned short-term rentals.
