Board Chair Karen Cooperstein called the meeting to order at 11:45 a.m. and inquired if there were any citizen comments; there were none.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. On a motion from Board member Clem Lear and a second from Board member Richard Stewart, the Consent Agenda was unanimously approved.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to approve the Related Party Transaction Policy for Irving Convention Center as presented. On a motion from Stewart and a second from Board member William Mahoney, the item was unanimously approved.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to approve the Irving Convention Center Bad Debt Policy as presented. On a motion from Board member Roy Santoscoy and a second from Stewart, the item was unanimously approved.

Approving the 2021-22 ICVB Budget and Marketing Plan

Executive Director Maura Gast gave a presentation on the 2021-22 ICVB Budget and Marketing Plan.

- Last ten years staff has been focused on growing visitor volume, which leads to visitor spending.
- Irving is moving the needle Weekend Business.
- Occupancy in 2011 was 57.6% and 2019 grew to 71.3%.
- Average Daily Rate in 2011 was \$73.05, to 2019 at \$110.56.
- RevPAR in 2011 was \$42.06, to 2019 at \$78.78.
- She further reviewed:
 - Citywide Hotel Occupancy Tax Collection History.
 - ICVB Reserve Fund History and Net Operating Expediture History.
 - Website traffic trends are increasing to pre-COVID numbers.
 - Blog and social media are keeping awareness alive.
 - ICC event leads for 2023 and beyond look more like pre-COVID pace.

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Lost Revenue Estimates were reviewed and Gast noted ICVB lost revenues are captured on the City books, but ICC lost revenues are captured on ICC books. Total Lost Revenues for 2020-21 equals \$11,008,268.

The Hotel Needs Analysis Survey results were reviewed, noting that all group markets are needing help and 100% of respondents will participate in digital marketing campaigns with promotional rates/offers if funding can be provided. Gast noted recovery of rates may be quicker than after a typical "rate war" of 6-8 years for recovery, but it will still take a few years to get back to 2019 performance based on hotelier responses.

Gast reported this year's ICVB plan and budget process will be in two phases: Phase 1/today is based on August 2020 HOT projections and will be presented dually (with and without ARPA funds). Phase 2 will target either the July or August Board meetings when the availability of ARPA funds has been determined, along with updated HOT projections and collections through May 2021.

The proposed budget line items were reviewed along with key expenditure trend analysis (with and without ARPA funds). Key management goals were outlined with emphasis on replenishing Reserve funds. Each ICVB Department proposed program highlights (with and without ARPA funds) were presented.

In summary, the financial position of the General Fund, Reserve Fund, Computer Replacement Fund and Convention Center Reserve/Capital Projects Fund were outlined and the importance to replenish Reserve and ICC Reserve/Capital projects was noted.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to approve the 2021-22 ICVB Budget and Marketing Plan as presented. On a motion from Lear and a second from Santoscoy, the item was unanimously approved.

Approving the Irving Convention Center Capital Improvement Plan

ICC annual events history and primary space utilization history was presented, along with the ICC budget forecast for 2021-22, operating subsidy comparisons and ICC Capital Improvement Plan key goals and projections.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to approve the Irving Convention Center Capital Improvement Plan as presented. On a motion from Mahoney and a second from Stewart, the item was unanimously approved.

Accepting Year 3 Update to the ICVB Board 2018-21 Strategic Plan

Gast reviewed the updates to the ICVB Board 2018-21 Strategic Plan and reminded the Board that the Strategic Plan is an organization-wide plan of the Board's work, with the ICVB staff facilitating.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to accept the Year 3 Update to the ICVB 2018-21 Strategic Plan as presented. On a motion from Lindsey and a second from Kang, the item was unanimously approved.

Accepting the Destinations International Code of Ethics

The Destination Marketing Accreditation Program (DMAP) requires that each accredited organization adhere to this Code of Ethics to reinforce the need and demand for transparency and accountability within the profession. Gast reviewed the items in the Code of Ethics.

Cooperstein asked for a motion to accept the Destinations International Code of Ethics as presented. On a motion from Lear and a second from Stewart, the item was unanimously approved.

City Manager Chris Hillman added he will continue to work with Gast to strategize the use of ARPA funds. Chief Financial Officer Jeff Litchfield and team will look at the regulations and modifications. He appreciates the dual approach to the budget. At the City's August Budget Retreat, the City and Council will review and finalize the City's budget and strategy.

In response to a question from Santoscoy, Gast stated the \$1.3 million and Capital Improvement Projects were based on the value of the building and is a coincidence that it coincides with the Operating Subsidy. The exception of the past year and the first year of the building being open, numbers have always been better and have had the benefit of having a cushion to put back into the Capital Projects Reserve when the building has performed better than the required subsidy.

BOARD REPORTS

Chair Report:

- Congratulated staff for their work on Irving Olympic Day. She noted the team went above and beyond on top of their everyday jobs. She also thanked all who participated in the 5K race.
- Congratulated Assistant Executive Director Administration/Finance Susan Rose on her 30-year anniversary with the City.

- Independence Day parade is scheduled for 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 3 in the Heritage District. Live music and fireworks are scheduled for Sunday at Levy Plaza. Las Colinas Association is hosting a VIP tent. ICC is managing the event's beer garden, with staff supplying the manpower.
- ICVB Strategic Plan meeting is tentatively planned for September 23-24.
- The Board and Business Development Committee is working on the Board applicant recruitment process and job descriptions for Board Chair and Vice Chair. A taskforce will be formalized to complete the process. Anyone interested in serving as Chair or Vice Chair is encouraged to inform the taskforce.
- The next Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for Monday, July 19.

Board and Business Development Committee

Committee Vice Chair Richard Stewart reported:

June 11 Meeting Recap:

- The Committee discussed formalizing the ICC Bad Debt Policy and ICC Related Party Transaction.
- Texas Special Legislative Session will begin on July 8 and the Committee will be following the outcomes.
- Next Committee meeting is scheduled for September 10.

Community Engagement Committee

Committee Chair Clem Lear reported:

- Congratulated ICVB staff for their efforts on Irving Olympic Day and the ICVB Budget and Marketing Plan.
- Next Committee meeting is scheduled for July 13 and is open to all Board members. The Committee is hoping to discuss High Spirited Citizen nominations and scheduling presentations for past awardees.

Destination Development Committee

Gast reported for Committee Chair Greg Malcolm reported:

• Hotel Ordinance Hotelier Survey is included in the Board packet. The Board had previously forwarded a series of proposed changes to the ordinance to the City Council. Council requested a survey of Irving's hoteliers be conducted to get their input; the survey was postponed until this May due to the pandemic. Overwhelmingly, the hotels do not want to see the standards revised in the ways proposed. There were only a handful of the proposed changes that were acceptable. The survey results will be forwarded to the City Council in its Read File this Friday; CVB staff will work with City staff on next steps. Next Committee meeting is scheduled for August 10.

CITY REPORTS

Council Liaison Mayor Pro Tem Kyle Taylor reported:

- City Council continues to work on the budget.
- The final draft of the Housing Study has been completed. The study is important to the City for preservation of production and to have the tools to maintain economic viability.
- Working on the Bond program and determining distribution of funds.
- Taylor is interested in receiving the results from the Hotel Needs Assessment Survey.
- Thanked all who worked on Irving Olympic Day, and he appreciates the input from the ICVB, City, Chamber of Commerce and Councilman Al Zapanta in getting visitors to Irving for this event.



Councilman Oscar Ward

- Echoed his thanks to the City Council and ICVB staff for Irving Olympic Day and noted it was a great event from Opening Ceremonies to completion.
- Ward attended the State Boxing Championship event and reported four finalists were announced and will move forward to Nationals in Nashville, Tennessee.
- Ward and Councilman Zapanta presented medals at the Water Polo event and noted this year in Texas, water polo will be an official high school UIL event.
- A Skateboarding event was held at Lively Park.
- He attended the Whataburger Texas Jam at The Pavilion on Saturday evening.
- The Housing Survey is completed and shows 100,633 properties, 58% are apartments, 42% are single family and duplex properties and 20% of those are rentals.

Councilman Mark Zeske

- He is encouraged looking at the future and appreciates everything the ICVB does for the City.
- He is attending a reunion at University of Dallas in October.

City Manager Chris Hillman reported on upcoming special events:

- A copy of the City's first Popular Annual Financial Report was distributed.
- The City as a whole is doing relatively well financially and coming out of the pandemic better than expected.
- Managing expenses and will continue to have healthy sales tax revenue.
- Thanked everyone who worked on Irving Olympic Day.
- Fire Station #4 had a grand opening recently. The new building replaces the existing 60-year-old station. The new station will secure and identify the heritage of the property and impact the Toler family had on the community.
- Thanked The Las Colinas Association for the new Paws Colinas Dog Park in the Urban Center.
- Christus Health broke ground on their new headquarters building, at the corner of 114 and O'Connor. The new building will have 15 stories of Class A office space.

BUREAU MANAGEMENT AND STAFF

Sales and Services

Assistant Executive Director Lori Fojtasek reported:

- The Sales team is at 105% of their YTD goal.
- There were 66 leads generated this month; last year in May there were 48 and in 2019 had 127.
- It is a slow recovery, but inquiries and site visits are increasing.
- Currently working on two groups for the ICC in 2022.
- Recently awarded trust fund money for a Ladies Basketball Regional Championship Tournament in October, which will be held at Drive Nation.
- During this difficult time, she expressed her appreciation for the support of the City and Board partners.
- Omni Las Colinas renovation is completed and looks beautiful and is a great way to kick off the summer.



Marketing and Communications:

Assistant Executive Director Diana Pfaff reported:

- General Marketing
 - May was the third month in a row of record-breaking website traffic with over 72,000 website sessions to both websites.
 - Simpleview also shows that aggregated DMO website sessions finally broke through and passed same-date session totals for the 1st time since March 2020.
 - Blog traffic dropped slightly but was still at its second highest to date with nearly 12,000 pageviews. Top posts were "New Irving Restaurants are Ready to Welcome You," "Top 5 Picnic Spots in Irving," and "Five Splurge-Worthy Dining Destinations in Irving."
 - Advertising engagement also dropped slightly too in May but was still the second highest to date with 33,800 site visits.
 - Social media remained high with over 2,000 new followers bringing total number of followers to 144,680.

CARES Campaigns

- The Staycations campaign has seen a recent surge, with advertising conversions nearing 55%. Since January, the Staycations campaign has generated nearly 120,000 website sessions and over 55,000 hotel referrals, which represents \$7.7 million in potential economic value.
- The OTA campaign, which started in mid-February has generated over 15,000 in hotel room night bookings resulting in nearly \$1.5 million in direct hotel revenue.
- Year-to-date, the Safe-Meetings campaign has generated 96 meeting inquiries and 14,000 website sessions.
- And the promoted content campaign, which highlights local businesses through the blog and social media, generated nearly 14,000 blog visits and over 73,000 social media post engagements.

Finance and Administration:

Assistant Executive Director Susan Rose reported:

- April STR and AirDNA Data Reports:
 - For April there were 469 available listings, with an Average Daily Rate of \$214.81, which
 is an increase of 17.59%.
 - Hotel Occupancy for May shows 62.1%, which is higher than Texas and the U.S.
 - o Current month Occupancy is reporting 125.7%, which is up from last year.
 - Average Daily Rate is \$92.37, up from last year.
 - Occupancy day was Saturday.
 - She congratulated the Marketing/Communications team on the Staycation campaign results.
- Administration and Finance Department:
 - Accounting Director Marianne Lauda continues to work on the budget. Rose expressed her gratitude for the hard work and great attitude.
 - The ICVB staff is returning to the office full time on Tuesday, July 6 with walk-in appointments available.



 The ICVB team participated in a Juneteenth project with Councilman Dennis Webb at Bear Creek Community Church. The team assembled toiletry bags for the homeless and viewed a video on the history of Bear Creek.

Taylor asked for an update on the hotel properties who are slow to pay Hotel Occupancy Tax. Litchfield responded there are two properties with large balances, and some have made partial payments. A penalty cannot be applied until the payments are a full quarter behind. They will be turned over to a delinquent tax collector and lien filings will be processed. Taylor expressed his appreciation for the work with staff to follow up on those payments.

IRVING CONVENTION CENTER

General Manager Tom Meehan:

- Even though May was the best month of the fiscal year so far with 15 events, it is compared to 128 events in previous years.
- Event Income for the year is \$869,000, compared to \$3.1 million last year.
- Catering reports \$164,000 YTD, compared to \$2.4 million last year.
- There is a long way to go but starting to see a slight increase.
- June was busy, starting off with the 11th annual ZestFest, a 700-person brunch for USA Gymnastics and staff flipped the room for a 900-person dinner that same evening.
- There were all hands on deck for the Texas Cornhole League Signature Series, including some ICVB staff manning cashier stations.
- Hosted Steubenville with 2,000 teenagers for a dinner on Friday and Lunch/Dinner on Saturday. Typically, the event has had 4,000 in attendance.
- There are eight events scheduled in July, including the ICC-staffed beer garden at the City's July 4 fireworks program.
- September is full with 18 scheduled events, which will be a good end to the year.

Lindsey gave his compliments to Irving and the ICVB team, with a shout out to Joe Moses for his participation in the Rotary flag distribution. He complimented Fojtasek and the Marketing/Communications team for their efforts with the arm-wrestling group at the Westin Irving Convention Center hotel over the weekend.

RESTAURANT UPDATE

Board Vice Chair David Cole reported:

- Cole announced the opening of the new Irving Starbucks in the downtown Heritage District at O'Connor and Irving Boulevard will be coming later this year.
- Working on the R-AB zoning proposed change to get a blanket ratio across the whole city.

DCURD

Board member Dallas Burke reported:

- Dallas flood control efforts reported 16.5 inches of rain for May/June.
- Upstream lakes are 3 to 8 inches high in flood pool, which makes Elm Fork higher than normal and is delaying some projects in creeks and channels.
- Projects Watering maintenance projects in Southfork, Hackberry Creek, Cottonwood Creek, Lake Carolyn, and Beaver Creek.
- Storm Water Pump Station project is scheduled to be completed in September.

- Lake Carolyn and pump station keep the Urban Center from flooding.
- Unveiling the Back-up Generator Project in September, which is a \$10 million TIF-funded project. The Board will be invited to the ribbon cutting and pump station tour.

IRVING-LAS COLINAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Chamber Board Chair Sam Reed reported:

- The Chamber Economic team for 2021 is reporting 15 wins, 9 recruitments, \$300 million in capital
 investment, which equates to 3,000 job opportunities and 1.3 million square feet of commercial
 space.
- There are 123 projects in the pipeline, \$150 billion, with 70,000 job opportunities, of which 25% are corporate headquarters.
- Texas unemployment for May decreased from 5.7% to 5.4%, and the national rate decreased from 6.1% in April to 5.8%.
- The Texas 87th legislative session ended May 31.
- Governor Abbott has called a special legislative session on July 8 and no agenda has been filed to date.
- Applications for the Chamber's Leadership Irving Class of 2022 are being accepted.
- July 7 Coffee Break will feature Account Manager Mary Kate Jeffries from Cooksey Communications.
- The chamber staff is returning to the office on Tuesday, July 6 with a 14-day rotation schedule.

IRVING ARTS AND CULTURE



Recycling, Brush and Bulky Waste Collection Delays Through Summer

Public Input Opportunities for Proposed Solid Waste Rate Adjustment: July 1 and 22

The City of Irving Solid Waste Services Department is experiencing a staffing shortage that has impacted recycling, brush and bulky waste collection schedules throughout the city. Increased demand combined with a national labor shortage, competition in the market and immense physical demands have impacted staffing within the department. As a result, residents will continue to experience collection delays throughout the summer.

To help address the staffing issue, Irving City Council directed staff to bring an ordinance requiring two public hearings seeking resident input on increasing the monthly rates for Solid Waste Services. If the proposed rate increase is approved, all Solid Waste field employees will receive a pay adjustment to help attract and retain qualified employees. The two public hearings are scheduled for July 1 and July 22 at 7 p.m. at Irving City Hall, 825 W. Irving Blvd. Visit CityofIrving.org/Agendas for City Council meeting dates and agendas.

Impact on Irving Residents

The proposed rate adjustment would be a pass-through increase of approximately 4% on the monthly Solid Waste rates, or an average increase of about 1% on residents' overall monthly utility bill.

The proposed rate adjustment is the first step in addressing overall solid waste operational needs in Irving. In addition to the proposed rate adjustment, Solid Waste Services leadership is examining incentives for safety and retention, and the department is currently undergoing studies the cost-of-service structure and route optimization plans. Potential revisions to the solid waste ordinance also may help address workload and collection issues.





RESIDENTS REMINDED TO FIGHT THE BITE WITH FOUR DS

Warmer temperatures mark the beginning of mosquito season in Texas. Trapping continues across the city's 57 trap and spray locations, and if traps test positive, Irving's vector control team will spray at night. The city's mosquito control staff works with the Texas Department of State Health Services and Dallas County Health and Human Services to conduct surveillance and testing of diseased mosquito population.

Self-protection is the best method to fight the bite, so be sure to follow the four Ds:

- Dusk and Dawn Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active.
- **Drain** Eliminate standing water, such as in flower pots, rain gutters, etc.
- DEET Make sure insect repellent contains DEET has been tested and approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.
- Dress Wear long sleeves, pants, shoes and socks when outside.

The Texas Department of State Health Services reminds residents to stay safe during extreme heat by taking proactive measures to defend against heat-related sickness. Hot weather is part of life in Texas. Prolonged or intense heat stress can be fatal to anyone; however, children and people ages 60 and older are typically more at risk.

During heat waves, be mindful of the following heat safety tips:

- Stay in air-conditioned buildings as much as possible.
- Avoid direct sunlight.

- Those without an air conditioning system should seek refuge in an air-conditioned shelter during extreme heat.
- Do not rely on a fan as a primary cooling device during an extreme heat event.
- Drink more water than usual, and do not wait for signs of thirst to drink.
- Avoid alcohol or liquids containing large
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.
- Seek medical care immediately when experiencing symptoms of heat-related illness such as muscle cramps, headaches, nausea or vomiting.
- When planning activities, choose cooler hours to be outdoors.
- Listen to weather forecasts before prolonged work or exercise away from air conditioning, as forecasters often provide heat warnings.

Two additional public hearings will be held on the proposed budget following the budget retreat in August. Irving Radio Tower Replacement Project Underway



The City of Irving is part of a regional public safety radio network used by many cities across North Texas, including Fort Worth, Euless, Grand Prairie, Mansfield, Arlington, Grapevine, Southlake, Keller, Colleyville, Waxahachie, Midlothian,

Burleson and Bedford. The North Texas Interoperable Radio Network supports departments including Information Technology (IT), Traffic and Transportation and Water Utilities.

On June 16, the City of Irving began construction on a replacement radio tower that sits adjacent to the current tower, located north of the City Hall parking garage off Rock Island Road. The new tower will support the city's emergency response teams, as well as its general government functions. The City of Dallas also will use the new radio tower as part of its emergency response system. The new tower is part of a larger IT "Investing in Our Future" infrastructure project that will involve five radio towers across the city.

The City of Irving's critical communication networks use a mixture of towers, poles and elevated water storage tanks. These systems include the Public Safety Communications Network, Office of Emergency Management's Early Warning System, Traffic and Transportation's Advanced Traffic Management System, and two Water Utilities networks — Advanced Metering Infrastructure and Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition. The radio tower project will replace old infrastructure, move the current systems off elevated water storage tanks and build new towers for expansion and resiliency needs.

The \$3.97 million project is funded through the IT, Traffic and Transportation and Water Utilities departments.

Construction on the City Hall tower includes the foundation work of drilling and pier placement, which will require crews to close the eastbound lane of Rock

Island Road closest to the parking garage. This is the only site that will replace an existing tower.

Construction at City Hall and removal of the old tower is anticipated to run through Sept. 30.

In addition to the City Hall tower, four other towers are being constructed throughout the city. Two will replace communications infrastructure that is currently installed on Irving water towers. The other two new towers will support future expansion and coverage enhancements. The radio replacement project is slated for completion in October 2021.

Joining Forces

More than 150 agencies from across North Texas are members of the North Texas Interoperable Radio Network. These 36,000 users consist of police, fire, emergency medical services and general municipal government departments.

The updated radio communications network supports the following City of Irving programs:

- The Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS) network operates 218 signaled intersections across Irving's 1,440 lane-miles of roadway. Currently, 172 of these intersections (79% of the system) are online and communicating with the Traffic Operations Center. The remaining 21% of the ATMS network will be served from the new radio towers.
- The Advanced Metering Infrastructure Network currently supports 93% of the city's meter reading, which includes more than 51,000 water meters.
- The Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system supports the distribution of 20 million to 70 million gallons of water per day to residences and businesses throughout Irving. SCADA provides communication to more than 30 remote facilities that manage water pressure, drinking water and wastewater.




Meeting-Sales Leads & Inquiries

Meeting-sales leads and inquiries increased significantly in June, with **137 total leads**. Of those leads, 61 were sourced through Cvent, 37 were from click-to-call ads, and 39 came through the websites. With click-to-call inquiries removed from the total, leads sourced solely through Cvent and the websites were higher than the same period in 2019.




Insights provided by Simpleview show that as of June 28th, the aggregated meeting-sales lead volume of more than 200 DMO's continues an upward trend. While still below 2017-2019 levels, the trend is indicating a trajectory toward recovery.

Lead Volume 2017-2021Aggregated Data of 200+ U.S. DMOs




As of June 28th, 2021, data from more than 200 U.S. DMOs report **771 thousand fewer** room nights on the books vs. 2020 and **15.4 million fewer** room nights on the books vs. 2019. CARES Act Campaigns: Phase 2

Staycations Campaign:

The Staycations campaign continues to perform well with a conversion rate exceeding 56%, which generated 17,462 hotel referrals in June. Year-to-date, the Staycations Campaign has generated 11.2 million impressions, 148,309 website sessions and 71,438 hotel referrals. Those hotel referrals represent \$10,109,654 in Potential Economic Value.

Meetings Campaign:

The Meetings Campaign is winding down; however, the landing page will remain live on the website. Year-to-date, the Meetings Campaign has generated 4.1 million impressions, 16,418 website sessions and 150 meeting-sales inquiries.

OTA Campaign:

The OTA Campaign running with Expedia and Priceline is also winding down. Since mid-February, the OTA Campaign has generated 15,103 hotel room nights from 8,155 hotel bookings, resulting in \$1,463,973 in direct hotel revenue.

Promoted Content Campaign:


YTD, the Promoted Content Campaign, which highlights local businesses through the ICVB blog and social media, generated a combined 15,887 blog visits and 89,347 post engagements on social media.

Website Traffic


Website traffic set a record for the fourth month in a row with 85,178 total sessions and 72,184 total users to both websites, which is the highest amount of combined traffic in any month to date. Traffic to the Visit Irving website had 74,236 sessions and 62,974 users, while traffic to the Irving Convention Center website had 10,942 sessions and 9,210 users.

While traffic to the Irving Convention Center website shows significant improvement, it remains below its prepandemic average of around 12,000 sessions per month. Traffic to the Irving Convention Center website is primarily driven by attendees and is highly influenced by events and will remain at lower levels until the facility resumes hosting more frequent events and large public shows.










Aggregated YOY Overall DMO Organic Website Traffic




Advertising




Paid Search Sessions

If you have ever wondered what spicy cotton candy tastes like, here's your chance.

<u>ZestFest</u> will open this weekend at the <u>Irving Convention Center</u> with spicy cooking demonstrations, a jalapeño eating contest and dozens of spicy foods and drinks to try and buy, from cotton candy to beef jerky.

"We're not just talking about regular old hot sauce," festival owner Greg Bagarozy said.

"People get very creative."

Collector and connoisseur Vic Clinco, who is believed to possess the largest collection of hot sauces in the world, will be on hand, as will Fort Worth chef Jon Bonnell and barbecue expert Eddie Deen, who will be cooking on the celebrity chef stage.

On Saturday, about 100 participants will compete in the Wingstop Atomic Wing Eating Contest to see who can eat the most atomic wings, made with habanero peppers, in just two minutes. A whole pig roast will cap the day.

And on Sunday, 75 to 100 competitors will battle to see who can eat the most raw jalapeños in just two minutes.

This is the 28th year of the festival, which Bagarozy said remains popular for a simple reason.

"Spice enhances every food and makes it better," he said. "It adds an extra kick."

ZestFest is from 1-6 p.m. Friday, 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Sunday at the Irving Convention Center, 500 W. Las Colinas Blvd.







STR

Irving's hotel occupancy rate for May was 62.1%, which is higher than the US and Texas. When comparing current month's occupancy numbers to last year, Irving's occupancy was up 125.7%, while Texas figures increased 71.9% and the US figures were up 78.6% for the month. Demand for the current period has increased 150.2%, and YTD has increased 17% over last year, while STR data reflects a 125.7% increase for the current period and a 12.9% increase in YTD occupancy compared to 2020.

For average daily rate, Irving was \$92.37 up 49.4% in May compared to last year, leaving Irving's YTD average daily rate at \$81.82, down 19% over last year.

As you review the current data, please remember that this time last year, we were seeing the onslaught of the pandemic and the nearly complete stoppage of travel. While the data may reflect an uptick from last year's lowest times, it should definitely not be mistaken for a complete recovery.

AirBNB

For the month of May, there were 457 available listings in Irving which is a 20.6% increase in listings over last year's figure of 379. The average daily rate for May is \$211.07, which is an increase of 24.90% over last year, with an occupancy percentage of 65.8%, which is a 1.55% decrease compared to last year.

For the hotel comparable subset, the average daily rate for May is \$101.75, an increase of 0.46% from last year, with occupancy at 65.2%, a decrease of 9.77% from last year.













DMO/CVB room nights on the books for the fourth quarter of 2021 sits 20% below its pace in June of 2019 ahead of the fourth quarter of 2019.

Air bookings pace over the next three months improved to 46% below 2019 levels from down 73% last month in comparison to 2019 levels.

Booking windows for leisure travel remain shortened relative to 2019 but have begun to extend as uncertainty diminishes. Bookings between 31 and 90 days in advance rose from 94% in April to 97% of 2019 levels as of June 11th.

Air Trips Booked for Future Months




Hotel Booking Activity

Underpinned by stronger-than-expected demand during Q1, STR and Tourism Economics upgraded the latest U.S. hotel forecast (May 2021). Even with 2021 projections higher, full recovery of demand remains on the same timeline for 2023, while close-to-complete recovery of revenue per available room (RevPAR) is still projected for 2024.

Room demand in Q2 2021 is expected to be 15.1% below 2019 levels, representing a strong improvement relative to the 24.7% decline experienced in Q1.


Overall, 2021 room revenue is estimated to average 30.2% below 2019. In 2022, room revenue is forecast to increase to a level that is 14.8% below 2019.

According to the STR Market Recovery Monitor, in May, 36% of markets were classified as depression or recession, compared to 44% in April. Markets are classified as Depression if RevPAR (total room inventory) is less than 50% of 2019 level for the same month, Recession (between 50% and 80%), Recovery (80% and 100%), or Peak (above 100%).



Member Spotlight: Crystal Scanio

President and CEO, Irving Schools Foundation

Crystal Scanio has made it her life mission to advocate for those without a voice, alleviate childhood hunger and advance education for children.

Growing up in Indonesia as an expatriate, Crystal observed the daily struggles and harsh living conditions endured by other children. At an early age, she decided she wanted to serve in a capacity where she could be a crusader for children unable to speak for themselves.

After college, Crystal spent some time gaining expertise in corporate America. Still yearning for the opportunity to serve those in need on a larger scale, she soon received her chance when a friend directed her to an opening for President and CEO of the Irving Schools Foundation.

Under her leadership, the Irving Schools Foundation has raised millions of dollars for Irving ISD students, and has received multiple awards for these efforts, including the highest award an education foundation can receive: recognition as one of the Top 50 Education Foundations in the Nation for two consecutive years.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, Crystal and the Irving Schools Foundation team jumped into action. They immediately began mobilizing their food distribution format with help from volunteers. While schools remained closed, determined counselors and staff began knocking on doors, calling apartment complexes, hotels and motels to hand deliver food. ISF went from serving 1,300 children each week to 5,000 a week.

Crystal is very passionate about the advancement of women and children in the community. She has previously served as President of the Irving Las Colinas Rotary Club Board of Directors and the Chair of the Board of Governors of La Cima Club. Most recently, Crystal has joined the Irving Police Academy's Advisory Board and the Social Food and Beverage Committee for the Four Seasons Sports Club.

Crystal resides in University Hills with her husband, Tony, and daughter, Layla.

"The day that we shut our schools as a result of a pandemic was such an emotional day for all of us at the Irving Schools Foundation as we knew each day without school meant a day without a meal for our students. We had to get creative and we had to rely on our community to help us get the job done." - Crystal Scanio

Early Start to Summer Travel Fuels Recovery

Signs of travel recovery continue to brighten as virus fears recede. Travelers are back on the road, as auto trips in May matched pre-pandemic levels. Air travel took a large step forward, and trailed 2019 levels by 33% in May. Boosted by leisure travel, hotel demand recovered to within 13% of 2019 levels and short-term rental demand is now 17% above pre-pandemic levels.

Traveler sentiment improved notably in May alongside expanded vaccinations and further easing of pandemic-related restrictions. Over two-thirds of travelers now feel safe traveling outside of their community and 87% have travel plans within the next six months. Business travel sentiment also continues to improve, as 55% of U.S. companies that are not currently traveling plan to resume domestic business travel within the next three months. This mounting optimism is visible in forward-looking indicators, as DMO/CVB website organic search sessions surged to 23% above 2019 levels in the first half of June, and group lead volume rose to 45% of its 2019 level in May from just 23% at the start of the year. While many indicators are trending in the right direction, business travel and international inbound travel are not expected to fully recover until at least 2024.

With reduced fear and loosened public health restrictions, steady incomes and elevated savings for many households, consumer spending is shifting from goods towards travel and other sorely missed in-person services, spurring the travel recovery onto its next phase.

May Economic Impact

National Analysis

- In May 2021, travel spending tallied \$79.6 billion and reflected a drop of "only" 21% below May 2019 levels
- The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in \$645 billion in cumulative losses for the U.S. travel economy through May 2021

 The continual depressed level of travel spending has caused a loss of \$79 billion in federal, state, and local tax revenue

Regional/State Analysis

- Washington D.C. (-62%), by far, experienced the strongest declines in May 2021 compared to May 2019; New York (-49%) and Massachusetts (-47%) followed
- On the other hand, Florida and South Dakota have fully recovered and even surpassed (both +2%) pre-pandemic levels

Just Released: Updated Forecast and Country Profiles

U.S. Travel has just <u>released</u> the latest **Travel Forecast Report**, which provides background, analysis to recently <u>updated projections</u> and highlights the divergent paths of recovery among key travel sectors. The latest forecast presents a rosier picture of domestic leisure travel than earlier estimates but a still-gloomy—if not bleaker—picture of business travel and international inbound travel.

- Domestic leisure spending has already nearly recovered. It is estimated to have reached 92% of 2019 levels in Q2 of this year. The latest forecast projects that it will be 99% recovered (relative to 2019 levels) next year and 102% in 2023
- Domestic business travel spending is still lagging far behind leisure and is expected to reach just 43% of 2019 levels in 2021 and 71% of 2019 levels in 2022 before fully recovering in 2024
- International inbound travel is not expected to fully recover until 2024. International spending is projected to reach just 67% of 2019 levels in 2022 and 87% in 2023.
 International leisure travel is expected to recover slightly faster than international business travel

Domestic Leisure

- A new record high—more than two-thirds of American adults are now comfortable returning to their normal routine and 62% feel comfortable taking a vacation
- More than 47 million Americans plan to travel over the July 4th holiday—the second highest Independence Day travel volume on record and only slightly trailing 2019 levels
 - More than 91% will travel by car, 5% higher than 2019, and while 3.5 million are expected to travel by air, air still travel remains 10% below 2019 levels
- Bookings for the July 4th holiday weekend are starting to extend, a positive sign for increasing confidence and less uncertainty—still, as of mid-June 57% of bookings are still being made within seven days of travel—up from 44% in 2019

- Summer travel plans look strong with more than three-quarters of American travelers (77%) planning on traveling for leisure in the next three months
- According to Zartico and Predict HQ, festivals are driving leisure event rebound and July 2021 is 80% of July 2019 attendance levels while concerts are just 25% of 2019 levels and performing arts 15% of 2019 levels
 - Sport event attendance is gaining momentum and July 2021 sport event attendance is now at 60% of 2019 levels
- More than four in 10 recent overnight travelers agree that travel industry businesses are struggling to provide adequate service to travelers
- Nearly three-fifths (57%) of Americans support restaurants raising menu prices in order to pay employees a higher wage



UPDATED: Visitation Trends | National Parks

- More than three-quarters (77%) of visitors to National Parks were from out-of-state during the first week of June—up from 62% in May
- Three-quarters of out-of-town visitors to National Parks traveled more than 200 miles in May

Business Travel, Meetings and Events

- Four in 10 now say their company has resumed non-essential domestic business travel—up from 34% last month
- The vast majority (86%) of business travelers are looking forward to getting back on the road and less than one in 10 are unwilling to travel
- More than four in five decision makers (85%) believe business travel leads to higher profits
- 83% of business travel decision makers are optimistic that business travel will return to previous levels over the next two years
- More than four in 10 planners (42%) and 31% of suppliers believe there may be pent up demand for face-to-face events but budget cuts, the economy and job insecurity will limit attendance
- Nearly nine in 10 meeting planners and suppliers are vaccinated
 - Still, 60% of planners and 41% of suppliers are NOT supportive of proof of vaccination requirements for events

International

- May 2021 overseas arrivals were 81% below May 2019 levels, an improvement from April's -87%—driven mostly from inbound travel from Latin America, visitations from other markets remain stagnant
 - South American arrivals were "only" 38% below May 2019 levels
 - Western European and Asian arrivals in May 2021 were still 96% below May 2019 levels
- Mexican air arrivals were up a staggering 60% in May 2021 compared to May 2019
- While April Canadian arrivals remained 96% below April 2019 levels, starting July 5,
 Canadian citizens and permanent residents would no longer need to quarantine upon return to Canada
 - Canadians can now travel freely to the U.S. by air where there are no restrictions on the U.S. side. This will undoubtedly increase visitations from our

largest inbound market

- Yet, the Canadian land border remains closed to non-essential traffic. While air travel is important, 56% of all overnight travel from Canada took place via the land border in 2019
- According to a recent survey from <u>XBorder Canada</u>, many frequent Canadian travelers are eager to travel to the United States
 - 87% of Canadians who had cancelled plans to visit the U.S. in 2020 are now planning to visit the U.S. in the next 12 months
 - 30% of Canadian travelers are ready to travel "now" if there were no restrictions in place
 - One-quarter (26%) of Canadians planning to travel to the U.S. are more likely to drive rather than fly, compared to past visits. Without the land border reopening, many of those trips may be delayed or cancelled completely




2021 Mid-Year Overview

Solid recovery in the Texas economy continues, although the pace of growth has generally eased in recenth months. State job growth was 2.5 percent in May and a robust 4 percent year to date (annualized rates). More than two-thirds of the 1.4 million jobs lost at the initial onset of the pandemic have been made up during the recovery so far (Chart 1). The Texas unemployment rate ticked down to 6.5 in May, still elevated but down significantly from it's Apr. '20 peak of 12.9 percent.



Real-time data from the Dallas Fed's Texas Business Outlook Surveys point to robust expansion in manufacturing and services (Chart 2). Keep in mind the survey diffusion indices do not track the *level of activity*, but the *direction of change*, with positive index readings denoting expansion and negative readings denoting contraction. The higher June manufacturing reading indicates expansion accelerated this month, despite soaring costs and widespread supply-chain disruptions and hiring difficulties. While the service-sector index slipped in June, it remained well above average and signifies continued broad-based growth. The retail sector remains challenged by supply and inventory shortages and posted slightly negative index readings in both May and June.

Looking ahead, firms are generally optimistic for stronger business activity six months from now, though uncertainty is on the rise. The Dallas Fed employment forecast is for continued job growth in Texas through December, ending the year with jobs up just over 4 percent from last December. This means we expect the overall pace of job growth through yearend to roughly match what we've seen year to date so far. If realized, this forecast would mean the state will fall short of fully making up for the pandemic job losses, leaving employment about 150,000 jobs short of its Feb. '20 level. However, forecast uncertainty remains heightened as intensifying price pressures, widespread supply-chain challenges and mounting labor shortages present downside risk to the outlook.

Perspectives from Pres. Kaplan

Last month Dallas Fed President and CEO Rob Kaplan published an article entitled *The Labor Market May Be Tighter than the Level of Employment Suggests*, found at www.dallasfed.org/research/economics/2021/0527. He suggests that policymakers should be cognizant of a range of supply factors that may currently be weighing on employment.
